The period for securing initial motor vehicle inspections in Texas has been officially extended until midnight, September 6, 1952.

Attorney General Price Daniel has ruled that the Safety Department might legally extend the inspection date, and that no inspection certificate would be necessary for the 1952 registration.

Under the plans announced by Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, all motor vehicles will need to be inspected and bear an approved sticker prior to next Sept. 7th; following that, a second inspection will be required prior to April 1, 1953, before vehicles can be registered for 1953.

## Early Morning Fire In Downtown Friona Guts Thornton Produce and Feed Firm

### Firemen On Scene In Very Few Minutes

Fire early Wednesday morning swept through the Friona Poultry & Egg firm here, destroying merchandise and equipment of several thousand dollars value. Much of the building was a total loss. Accurate estimate of damage to merchandise was difficult to make at this early date; as yet no thorough check has been made of sacked feed, etc., in the building. All equipment, including office machines, in the front section of the building was lost.

S. T. Thornton, owner of the firm, said the damage was partially covered by insurance. Whether the building was fully protected by insurance was not immediately learned, though reports indicated that it was insured.

The fire was reported to Fire Chief Charlie Bainum by Bert Neelley who discovered the blaze at straight-up 6 o'clock Wednesday morning. Neelley had opened the Star office only a few minutes before and at that time had noticed no smoke or blaze at the corner building. Probably less than 10 minutes later the fire was billowing from the office window of the produce and feed firm, and the building was smoke filled. Firemen arrived at the scene in a very few minutes, playing two hoses upon the blaze until it was extinguished about 7:15 o'clock.

As true in many fires, this one also netted one queer quirk: after the office had been given up as total loss, owner Thornton dug around in the debris and found his accounts receivable file relatively undamaged. Thornton had not opened the firm at the time of the fire, although he had just arrived in town and was at the cafe which he also operates.

The local fire department answered three calls within 24 hours this week: a trash, fence post, and feed fire at the Burl Beene home, a burning National Biscuit Company truck on the highway, and the Friona Poultry & Egg fire!

Tidwell, Methodist minister, will conduct the service, assisted by Rev. Russell Pogue and Stanley Lockhart. Gilliland Funeral Home of Hereford has charge of arrangements.

Survivors include the widow, four daughters: Mrs. Bud Elmore of Friona, Mrs. Alvin Brooks of La Junta, Colorado, Mrs. Floyd Wallace, Wellington, Kansas, and Mrs. Bud Wilson of Castro Valley, California; and six sons, Raymond of Amarillo, George, Jr. of Liberal, Kansas, Tommy, Liberal; Woodrow E. of Tellamook, Oregon; Elton of Beaver, Oregon, and Gene of Beaver, Oregon.

George Franklin Williams was born Feb. 4th, 1878, in Hood County, Texas. He was married to Miss Helen Clark in 1904, and the couple resided at Granite, Oklahoma, living in Beaver County until 1933 when they moved to a farm near Friona. They have been living in Friona about eight years.

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## School Holiday!

Friona schools were dismissed Tuesday afternoon to remain closed until Monday as a result of widespread influenza in all classes. On Tuesday 134 students were absent because of illness, with some 40 more individual students becoming ill throughout the day and having to be taken home.

Consultation between school officials and Dr. Paul Spring resulted in the dismissal of classes. The epidemic reached its huge proportions on Monday.

Dr. Spring recommended that the students take advantage of the school holiday to get plenty of sleep, guarding against excessive play or work bringing on tiredness, and to drink plenty of fluids as overall precautions.

The hospital has been crowded with patients all week, and the doctors have been treating a number in private homes.

## DOWN TO 5500

Drilling at the Sloan Osborn A No. 1 test northwest of Friona has passed the 5500 ft. depth, drilling superintendent O. L. Chenoweth disclosed yesterday.

Work was temporarily halted Wednesday due to casing sticking in a redbed formation some 1800 feet down; 9 5/8" casing is being placed in the hole.

In December testing by the Parmer County Dairy Herd Improvement Association, tabulations were made for high herds in milk production and butterfat production in the Holstein, Milking Shorthorn, and Jersey divisions.

High Holstein herd, belonging to Humphrey & Eills, produced an average of 809 lbs milk and 25 lb butterfat, making an average butterfat test of 3 per cent.

High Milking Shorthorn honors went to the Virgil Teague herd, producing average of 564 lbs milk, 20 lbs butterfat, test of 3.6.

Jersey herd honors went to Roy V. Miller, 666 lbs milk, 31 lbs butterfat, with a test of 4.7.

**INDIVIDUAL HIGH ANIMALS**  
Highest cow in milk production was Bonnie, a Holstein from the Humphrey's Dairy herd, producing 79 lbs butterfat from 1750 lbs milk to give a test of 4.

High butterfat test was copied by Clara, Jersey belonging to Roy V. Miller, testing 6.4.

Eight herds were tested during December with 181 cows milking and 57 cows dry. Total milk production was 148,220; total butterfat, 5310 lbs, with an average of 623 lbs. milk and 22 lbs butterfat per cow.

# A Bill Of Responsibilities

Prepared by the American Citizenship Committee State Bar of Texas

WE WHO ADVOCATE DEMOCRACY AS THE BEST FORM OF GOVERNMENT FOR AN ENLIGHTENED AND PROGRESSIVE PEOPLE, ENJOYING AS WE DO THE BLESSINGS OF LIBERTY UNDER THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES, DO SET FORTH THIS BILL OF RESPONSIBILITIES AS A GUIDE TO ALL CITIZENS FOR THE PRESERVATION OF INDIVIDUAL FREEDOM AND DEMOCRATIC GOVERNMENT.

I. It shall be the duty of every citizen to render undivided allegiance to the Constitution of the United States, to work for its betterment and perpetuation, to respect the sovereignty of the people's government, and to defend the nation against all its enemies whomsoever.

II. It shall be the duty of every citizen to be familiar with the Constitution of the United States and to be informed as to what rights and liberties are his, and to use these rights in such manner as is consistent with his own welfare and the welfare of his fellow citizens.

III. It shall be the duty of every citizen to defend with his life the rights and liberties granted to him and to his fellow citizens by the Constitution, to obey the laws of the land and aid in their enforcement, and to oppose vigorously any persons whose intention is to transgress the law or to oppress the rights of others.

IV. It shall be the duty of every citizen to make honest, wise and courageous use of the free and secret ballot at every election; to exercise freedom of thought, speech, and worship; to protect the freedom of the press; to safeguard the right of trial by jury and to render willing jury service when called upon; and to perform all other acts conducive to the perpetuation of the rights set forth in the Constitution.

V. It shall be the duty of every citizen to protect and sustain the unwritten liberties and rights vested in him by custom and usage and to perpetuate the ideals of the equality and dignity of the individual, upon which the Constitution is founded.

VI. It shall be the duty of every citizen to be active in the political party of his choice, and to be vigilant of the public officers, to render all possible aid to them, and to serve in public office by appointment or election when qualified and when called upon to do so. It shall be his duty to strive for the selection of public officers of ability and upright character; and when holding public office, to serve in such manner as will subordinate private or minority interest to those of the people at large.

VII. It shall be the duty of every citizen to achieve the highest practicable level of education, and to work for the advancement of education by supporting and improving the public schools and by fostering the desire for education among his fellow citizens.

VIII. It shall be the duty of every citizen to defend the right to buy and sell, to own land and other property, to engage in commerce, and to work and earn a living wage, as a fundamental guarantee of the freedom and welfare of the nation.

IX. It shall be the duty of every citizen to instruct his children in the principles of freedom and to spread the ideals of democratic government at home and abroad.

X. It shall be the duty of every citizen to preserve an attitude of self-reliance, and to use all legitimate means to achieve financial independence and security; to practice thrift and economy in his own affairs and to require the same of local, state and federal government.

## Mr. Truman Shares Blame, Is Opinion Of Editor of Terry County Herald

### Moral Decay Here Is Evident to Mt. Ida, Arkansas Ed.

Most of us cannot feel too sorry for HST in his dilemma, knowing as we do the way he has handled matters at Washington. If we admit that Mr. Truman is at heart honest, and many of us try to believe it is so, we cannot however fail to look back to the past and speculate that we are not surprised when we remember that we have his "cronies" in the executive departments. Some of these cronies certainly were of doubtful quality when measured by the usual concept of honesty in high places. Indeed, not a few of

them had come from some of the worst boss ridden cities of the US, such as Kansas City, St. Louis and Jersey City. And then we call to mind that when various investigation committees began their work, we heard the words "assinine" and "red herring" used in his press conferences by the President. But instead of cooling off, the matter became hotter and hotter. More and more were indicted, were fired or resigned, and some are in prison or face a sen-

tence. In fact the matter got so out of hand that Mr. Truman had to cut short his long vacation at Key West and come home. He then began to create his own investigating committees, which many well versed in law say he has no right to do. We already have the investigating committees; we already have the grand juries and Federal courts. We even have a Federal Bureau of In-

vestigation, which to now is still in the confidence of the people, and that its head, J. Edgar Hoover, will show no favor no matter who gets hit. About the only thing the people regret is the awfully sorry mess our country is in morally among the higherups in government. We realize that we are wide open to any criticism the Commies and Socialists may aim at us. All because our President trusted anyone who would not have passed muster by the run of the mine citizenry.

Each year the Roman Catholic cardinals, archbishops and bishops of the United States issue a message. This year's message, signed by a 13-man administrative board, is of unusual significance. It begins: "An alarming parallel exists between the situation facing us today and that which faced the Roman Empire 1500 years ago. The problems of the empire closely resemble those which shortly test us now—barbarism on the outside, refined materialism and moral decay within. The Roman Empire disintegrated from within, and moral corruption was the main cause. The same fate will befall us if we do not awake to the danger."

The Catholic spokesmen then touched on political corruption and immorality, saying, "In politics, the principle that 'anything goes' simply because people are thought not to expect any high degree of honor in politicians is grossly wrong. Those who are selected for the office by their fellow men are entrusted with grave responsibilities. They have been selected not for self-enrichment but for conscientious public service. . . One and the same standard covers stealing from the cash register and dishonest gain derived from public office."

Regardless of one's religious beliefs and affiliations, every American should be in thorough agreement with this view. Moral decay can destroy peoples and governments as surely as the most terrible wars and the most barbaric revolutions. The disclosures which have so far been made of corruption in our own governments, national, State and local, must have shocked and disgusted every citizen with any concept of honor and decency. Here is a case of where only the sternest kind of corrective action can suffice.

# The Law and You

DO YOU KNOW that even if you are self-employed, you must now pay Social Security Taxes?

For the year 1951 and for future years, those who are self-employed, and have heretofore not been required to pay Social Security taxes, will in most instances be required to pay Social Security taxes, up to a maximum of \$3,600.00 of your self-employed income. There is a special place at the bottom of the Internal Revenue Form Schedule C for the calculation of your Social Security tax.

Certain groups of persons are excluded from the provisions of this Social Security tax. They are as follows, those whose self-employed earnings are less than \$400.00, farmers, physicians, lawyers, dentists, osteopaths, veterinarians, chiropractors, naturopaths, optometrists, Christian Science practitioners, architects, certified public accountants, licensed or registered accountants, full time practicing accountants, funeral directors, professional engineers, ordained, commissioned or licensed ministers. All other who are self-employed come within the provisions of the social security tax, and must pay a social security tax when they file their income tax return at the end of the year.

The payment of this tax provides for self-employed persons to receive the same benefits as employees under the Old Age and Survivors Insurance Benefits for themselves and their families.

## "SMALL BUSINESS"

Even hardened cynical veteran Washingtonians, long accustomed to wondering over the patience of the American public, are amazed at the actions of the Office of Price Stabilization. The Office of Price Stabilization, as it is now called, is even envied by bureaucrats who realize they have never been able to get the stranglehold fastened on all America that OPS has done.

While the accomplishments of many bureaus is open to question in relation to the money expended, OPS has shown no results.

The purpose of OPS was to stop inflationary prices. As is obvious, this has not been done. Even government officials hopefully express the opinion that price increases during 1952 will not exceed 3%.

For example, OPS reports a meeting was held with fresh vegetable growers and shippers to discuss the current high prices disturbing every budget.

The report further states OPS officials told the grower-shippers no regulation is planned. In other words, the OPS said it would do nothing, but perhaps might do something in the future.

Present at this meeting were fourteen high government officials, including one Gilbert F. O'Brien, chief Fresh Fruit and Vegetable Division of OPS.

Thus in a field in which the OPS has done nothing, and plans on doing nothing, there is a chief, and a staff, to do nothing except pick up pay checks and attend meetings to decide nothing will be done.

So Washingtonians are now saying those who seize current scandals as an opportunity to deplore lack of honesty in government are wrong.

"When before in U.S. history," they ask, "has a bureau been honest enough to permit its press agents to publish that sections have been set up with chiefs in charge to do nothing?"

But when it comes to Europeans and Asiatics, the Office of Price Stabilization is quite active. Anyone engaged in the export business must follow regulations laid down by the OPS in a six page booklet, or be prosecuted.

Of course, OPS is not the only bureau obsessed with protection of the foreigner.

Recently, the American Watch Case Manufacturers asked the National Production Authority to ask European nations adopt metal conservation measures now imposed on U. S. business.

European watch case makers are flooding the American market with cheap watch cases, but U. S. makers, unable to get metals, curtail production.

A most active nation in flooding the American market with low priced watch cases is France.

And hardly a week passes that the Marshall Plan does not ship France new grants of metal.

But now relief is in sight.

It is taking time, but facts, figures and evidence are being gathered to trace the collusion between some government officials, and monopoly minded corporations with interests abroad to milk the American public dry. When these facts come out, the recent scandals over milk coats and deep freezers will look very small by comparison.

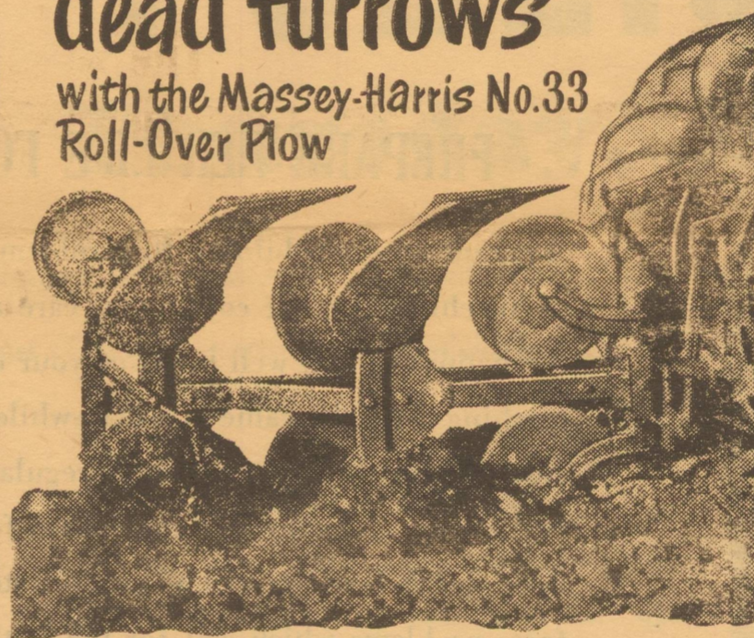

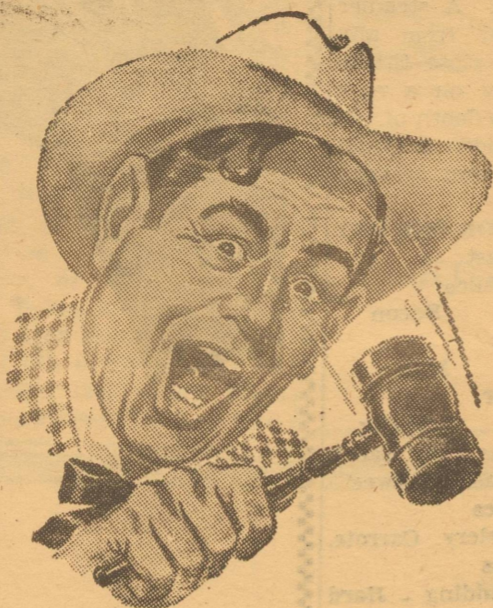

# Star Recipes

## White Fruit Cake and Plum Pudding Are Named Star Recipes of the Week

### WHITE FRUIT CAKE

- 1/2 pound butter
- 3 cups sugar
- 4 cups flour
- 1 cup milk
- 3 teaspoons baking powder
- Whites of 8 eggs - well beaten
- 1 medium coconut (grated)
- 1/2 lb. candied pineapple
- 1 lb. citron
- 1 pound candied cherries
- 1 pound pecans
- 1/2 pound almonds

Cream the butter, add sugar gradually and cream well. Sift flour, measure and combine with baking powder. Add milk alternately with flour. Chop fruit and nuts and sprinkle with flour. Add to the cake batter. Fold in egg whites. Greasing and lining the pans helps prevent the cake crust from becoming too brown, thick and dry during baking. Grease pan. Line with waxed paper or heavy brown paper. Grease paper.

Bake in a slow oven (250° F.). The baking time depends on the size and shape of the loaf. This table may serve as a guide for cooking:

Weight of Cake	Approximate Time
1 lb.	2 1/2 hours
2 lbs.	3 1/2 hours
3 lbs.	4 hours

### PLUM PUDDING

- 5 ounces finey-chopped suet
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 1/2 cups soft bread crumbs soaked in 1 cup scalded milk
- 1/2 cup dark corn syrup
- 3 tablespoons fruit juice
- 4 well-beaten eggs
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
- 3-4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon cloves
- 1-4 teaspoon mace
- 2 cups seeded raisins, cut small

### FINISHES WORK ON NEW DICTIONARY



BRONXVILLE, N. Y. — Four years of preparation by a staff of 28 persons, assisted by a committee of the nation's word experts, has ended with Clarence L. Barnhart, above, finishing work on his sixth dictionary. Barnhart, an unassuming scholar with a keen sense of humor is one of the world's leading lexicographers.

Working in his laboratory here Barnhart read each of the 80,000 definitions four or five times, a task he has engaged in for more than 20 years. Four years of preparation and an initial investment of nearly a half-million dollars is represented in The Thorndike-Barnhart, published by Doubleday and Company, one of the world's largest publishers. The new book is the first all-new quality dictionary to be sold at a low price.

Many new techniques were developed by Barnhart, who began his work with the famous educational psychologist, the late Dr. Edward L. Thorndike. Their combined efforts have made the modern dictionary a useful tool for the average reader, rather than a mere history of the words in the language.

Three basic principles guided the preparation of the Thorndike-Barnhart. First, all definitions were stated in words less difficult than the word defined. Second, all synonyms were keyed to the definition of the appropriate meaning of the word. Drawings were used freely wherever necessary to clarify definitions. Finally, the 80,000 words used in the book were chosen on the basis of a scientific count, showing which words appear most frequently in adult reading matter.

Another feature of the book is the correct labelling of Americanisms. It is the first popular dictionary to label specifically those words which have originated in this country.

- 1-4 pound citron, sliced
- 2 cups currants

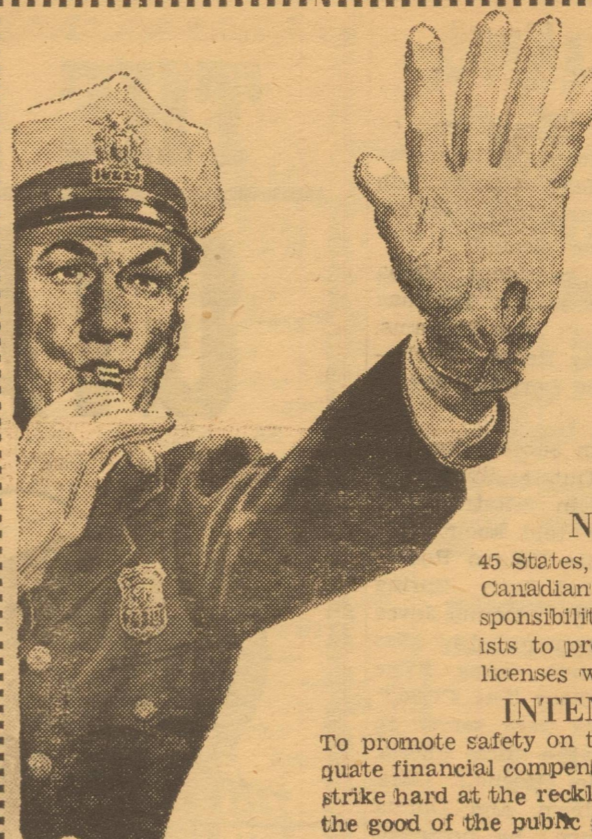
To Steam a Pudding: Fill an oiled mold 2-3 full of pudding mixture and cover tightly with an oiled lid, waxed paper, or aluminum foil. Steaming may be done in a pressure canner leaving the petcock open during the steaming time. A steamer may be improvised from any large kettle with a close fitting lid. Place pudding on a rack and in water to 2-3 depth of the container of the pudding. Count time as soon as steam escapes.

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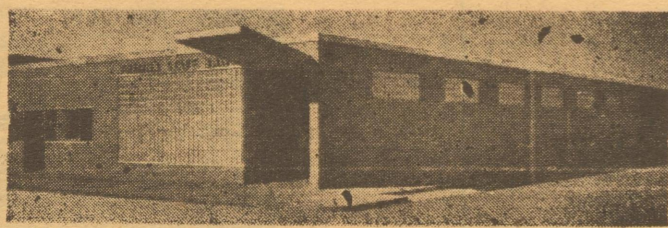

# SCS NEWS and VIEWS

BILL KENNEDY

The Parmer County Soil Conservation District had some interesting visitors from Lubbock this week. Their names were C. A. Hubbard, C. C. Worrell and Dale Robbins. An increasing number of farmers from the South Plains seem to be migrating toward Parmer County. Most of them are interested in cotton.

Farmers contacted this past week for various conservation jobs included K. W. Meill, Sam Cooke, Glen Splawn, Joe Blair, Clayton Taylor, A. J. Ellison, Miles Robbins and Albert Cannon. Several of those mentioned were interested in well locations, while others wanted diversions, waterways, and bench levelling areas staked out.

This is the season of the year for odd jobs on the farm such as repairing machinery, mending fences, constructing farm buildings. However nearly everyone you talk to is giving first priority to his land and is using emergency tillage if it is blowing.

Monday's sandstorm makes a total of six since November 1st. In estimating the extent of erosion, the following may be

considered: Slight shifting of soil in rows is not considered to be active wind erosion. Moderate Erosion has occurred when areas are observed with 2 to 6 inches of new accumulations. Lister furrows filling, fence rows, roads and other obstructions show accumulations. Severe erosion has occurred when more than 6 inches of new accumulations can be seen along fence rows and roads. Usually the land is left hummocky and areas have blown down from 2 inches to plow depth. The land after preparation for crops will be irregular and uneven.

If any of your cows are in the gestation period, it may be a good idea to keep them from grazing broom or turpentine weeds next spring. Erick Rushing passed along this information. One of his cows had a stillborn calf last spring, which the veterinarian said, was due to the cow eating these weeds.
