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

Cold, wet days are forecast

Temperatures are expected to plunge this weekend as an arctic cold front makes its way through this area.

National Weather Service officials have issued a winter weather message for the Permian Basin and eastern New Mexico, warning of below-freezing temperatures and the possibility of freezing rain over parts of the area.

An arctic air mass is on schedule to move into this area late tonight or early Saturday, sending temperatures down to the mid 20s. Numerous shows and freezing rain are likely in the evening hours.

The cold snap will not budge for at least the duration of the weekend. High temperatures Saturday and Sunday are not expected to exceed the 30s, and a chance for freezing rain is in the forecast for both days.

The frigid weather is expected to linger through much of the coming week, with high temperatures gradually reaching the upper 40s by Thursday, NWS officials predict.

Law challenged by teacher accused of filming students

Texas law designed to Toms is under scrutiny from a high school teacher accused of videotaping a girls wrestling match for sexual plea-

Attorneys for David Ware, a speech and drama teacher in suburban Dallas, are the latest to challenge the 2001 law aimed at protecting people from ultra-small cameras that can peek into dressing rooms or up women's skirts. Critics say the statute is overly broad and often misapplied.

Ware, who also coaches girls softball, is expected to turn himself in to Grand Prairie police this weekend on charges of improper visual recording. Police said Ware, 28, captured about two hours of video at an all-day wrestling tournament Saturday, often zooming in on the girls' crotches.

His attorney, Scott Palmer, said Ware was simply interested in wrestling. But he said the larger issue is a wideranging law that, if fully enforced, would jail Dallas Cowboys fans for taking pictures of the team's sultry cheerleaders from the stands.

"How do you draw the said Palmer, adding he has not seen the video. "If you go to a Cowboys game and take a close-up shot of their cleavage, are you committing the same offense because you think that sex appeal? Apparently you are under this statute."

Under the law, filming a

sent for sexual arousal is combat high-tech Peeping a state jail felony. The statute makes no definition of age, nor distinguishes between filming in public or private.

But Grand Prairie Sgt. John Brimmer said the students in the video are younger than Cowboys cheerleaders - and that Ware was much closer than the stands at Texas Stadium. He said the video, which he said also included boys wrestling, made officers suspicious that he was doing more than filming a wrestling match.

"This was more than accidental footage of the genital areas," Brimmer said. "It appeared to be a purposeful act of zooming

Retail sales rise in **December at fastest** rate in 5 months

WASHINGTON (AP) -Retail sales rose in December at the strongest pace in five months, indicating that the all-important holiday shopping season turned out better than original reports indicated.

The Commerce Department said Friday that retail sales increased 0.9 percent last month, the strongest showing since a 1.4 percent increase in July.

The increase was better than the 0.7 percent advance that economists had forecast and provided evidence that consumer spending was ending the year on a firmer footing than initially thought.

The government report presented a firmer tone to spending than initial

DALLAS (AP) - A person without their con- reports from the nation's year budget. big chain retail stores. They complained that holiday sales had fallen below expectations as mild winter weather depressed sales of winter clothing.

For all of 2006, retail sales rose by 6 percent, a solid showing but down from a 6.9 percent increase in 2005.

That slowdown reflected the fact that consumer spending, after a sizzling start to the year, slowed the spring and remained at lower levels for the rest of the year as Americans were battered soaring gasoline prices, rising interest rates and a cooling housing market.

Consumer spending is closely watched because it accounts for two-thirds of total economic activity.

New spending limit poses challenge for Legislature

AUSTIN (AP) — Despite a record budget surplus, Texas lawmakers adopted a state spending limit on Thursday that will limit their access to money to pay for property tax relief, teacher pay raises or 80,000 new students expected to enroll in public schools over the next two years.

The Legislative Budget Board, led by Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst and House Speaker Tom Craddick, is required to adopt a spending limit every two years that parallels the predicted growth of the state economy. They agreed Tuesday on a limit based on 13.1 percent over the last two-

About \$14 billion in property tax relief, passed last year under court order, will cause total state spending to surge, surpassing the spending limit by about \$4 billion.

That means that unless lawmakers find a way to exceed the constitutional cap, they'll have to cut \$4 billion from last year's spending levels and scrap any new spending on school enrollment growth, Medicaid caseload growth and money that was promised last year for teacher pay raises and other new school initiatives

"We're always looking at ways to cut government, but that's a large number," Dewhurst said. He said he's also committed to saving about \$6 billion to pay for the property tax relief again in two years.

Lawmakers could choose to exceed the cap with a majority vote, or propose a constitutional amendment with a twothirds vote. A constitutional amendment would still need a public vote.

The vote will be tough for fiscal conservatives as lawmakers are forced to choose between abiding by the spending constraints or voting to bust

The budget is the only bill the Legislature is legally required to pass in the 140-day session.



Waiting for Bush to save the day

he most naive sentence in the English language is: It couldn't get any worse. That's an argument many who have protested the war give for getting out of Iraq - that nothing could be worse than 3,000 U.S. troops killed as the Iraq insurgency has grown stronger.

There is something worse: Some 3,000 U.S. troops dead, followed by the collapse of the Iraqi government, thousands of Sunni Arabs dead, Iraqis who worked with the coalition forces assassinated and their

families butchered, and thousands more refugees swarming across the Middle East. Something worse would be 3,000-

plus troops dead after a defeat that has emboldened jihadists, who want to kill Americans, and have become convinced that if they do, the United States won't fight back not for long, anyway.

The worst of it is: Defeat in Iraq is assured, if that's what Americans choose. Yes, the Bush administration has made horrible mistakes - start with too few troops — that have cost American lives. It also can be said, however, that the antiwar movement has stoked the insurgency by showing that civilian and military casualties could lead to troop withdrawal and that has increased the coalition's death toll and made it harder for the coalition to succeed.

When Canon Andrew White, now the Anglican vicar of Baghdad, wrote his book "Iraq: Searching for Hope" (Continuum) in 2005, he looked at the six criteria for a just war as defined by

Christian doctrine and concluded that the war was justified. One criterion, "reasonable hope of success," he wrote, was "by far the easiest of six criteria to satisfy. There was never any serious doubt that the coalition would be victorious." It is heartbreaking to read those words today.

I asked White about that statement over the phone Wednesday. He responded, "We have to face up to the fact that we won the war," but the coalition didn't follow-up 'correctly."

White was anxious. We spoke before President Bush gave his speech Wednesday and he told me, "I'm waiting for your president to say something, to try to save the day."

To those who want U.S. and British troops to pull out of Iraq, White had this to say: "We can't just pull out. If we pulled out, there would be even more bloodshed and total civil war."

White is no gung-ho supporter of the U.S.-led coalition. He faults the coalition's failure to secure Iraq's borders early on, believes de-Baathification turned Sunnis into insurgents and berates the coalition's failure to work with Sunni and Shiite religious leaders. He has seen Iraq spiral downward and friends die because of those

White thinks Bush should do what many Bush critics have suggested: that is, Bush should put "huge pressure on the Iraqis" to change - which means threatening to pull out U.S. troops if Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki fails to shape up his government.

There's a contradiction in that argument, especially because White also said that al-Maliki doesn't care if American troops leave. The phone connection was tenuous and the timber of White's voice was affected by multiple

sclerosis. Most of all, he is troubled by "the hell" brought upon the majority of Iraqis — "and we cannot just walk away from it."

White is skeptical that "the surge" of U.S. troops necessarily will help. Me, too. More troops can only make a difference if the military brass allows U.S. troops to hold areas they have cleared, a change Bush signaled last night. Also, Bush's proposed spending increases on Iraq reconstruction could give Iraqis a stake in this regime's success.

In September 2004, White began to ask every Iraqi he met, "Given how dangerous and anarchic Iraq is now, don't you wish the war had never happened?" While he had posed the question then to invite a "yes," no Iraqi gave that answer.

"Now they tell me it's worse than under Saddam," White told me. That doesn't mean it can't get worse. You can call the whole war a giant mistake and still appreciate why the United States needs to stick around.

If you think the world hated America for going into Iraq, imagine how the world will look at an America that flees an imploding nation. The world won't see an America — as war opponents like to see themselves — that is virtuous and realistic. They will see wholesale bloodshed, an ally that cannot be trusted and an army that doesn't know how to win.

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Stand up against the surge now

he purpose of this old-fashioned newspaper crusade to stop the war is not to make George W. Bush look like the dumbest president ever. People have done dumber things. What were they thinking when they bought into the Bay of Pigs fiasco? How dumb was the Egypt-Suez war? How mas-

sively stupid was the entire war in Vietnam? Even at that, the challenge with this misbegotten adventure is that WE simply cannot let it continue.

It is not a matter of whether we will lose or we are losing. We have lost. Gen. John P. Abizaid, until

recently the senior commander in the Middle East, insists that the answer to our problems there is not military. "You have to internationalize the problem. You have to attack it diplomatically, geo-strategically," he said.

His assessment is supported by Gen. George W. Casey Jr., the senior American commander in Iraq, and the Joint Chiefs of Staff, who only recommend releasing forces with a clear definition of the goals for the additional troops.

Bush's call for a "surge" or "escalation" also goes against the Iraq Study Group. Talk is that the White House has planned to do anything but what the group suggested after months of investigation and proposals based on much broader strategic implications. About the only politician out

there besides Bush actively calling for a surge is Sen. John McCain. In a recent opinion piece, he wrote: "The presence of additional coalition forces would allow the Iraqi government to do what it cannot accomplish today on its own — impose its rule throughout the country. ... By surging troops and bringing security to Baghdad and other areas, we will give the Iraqis the best possible chance to succeed." But with all due respect to the senator from Arizona, that ship has long since sailed.

A surge is not acceptable to the people in this country — we have voted overwhelmingly against this war in polls (about 80 percent of the public is against escalation, and a recent Military Times poll shows only 38 percent of active military want more troops sent) and at the polls. We know this is wrong. The people understand, the people have the right to make this decision, and the people have the obligation to make sure our will is implemented.

Congress must work for the people in the resolution of this fiasco. Ted Kennedy's proposal to control the money and tighten oversight is a welcome first step. And if Republicans want to continue to rubber-stamp this administration's idiotic "plans" and go against the will of the people, they should be thrown out as soon as possible, to join their recent colleagues.

Anyone who wants to talk knowledgably about our Iraq misadventure should pick up Rajiv Chandrasekaran's "Imperial Life in the Emerald City: Inside Iraq's Green Zone." It's like reading a horror novel. You just want to put your face down and moan: How could we have let this happen? How could we have been so stu-

As The Washington Post's review notes, Chandrasekaran's book "methodically documents the baffling ineptitude that dominated U.S. attempts to influence Iraq's fiendish politics, rebuild the electrical grid, privatize the economy, run the oil industry, recruit expert staff or instill a modicum of normalcy to the lives of Iraqis."

We are the people who run this country. We are the deciders. And every single day, every single one of us needs to step outside and take some action to help stop this war. Raise hell. Think of something to make the ridiculous look ridiculous. Make our troops know we're for them and trying to get them out of there. Hit the streets to protest Bush's proposed surge. If you can, go to the peace march in Washington on Jan. 27. We need people in the streets, banging pots and pans and demanding, "Stop it, now!"



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

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

Sean Payton is coach of the year. Drew Brees is the All-Pro quarterback.

Those honors are nice.

But they are nothing next to the possibilities that await the New Orleans Saints if they can beat Philadelphia at the Superdome on Saturday night. It would get them to the first championship game in the team's mostly dismal 40-season history, and move them one step from the Super Bowl a season after going 3-13 season during a Katrinaenforced exile.

"We've beaten all the odds," says wide receiver Joe Horn, who is still bothered by a groin

"No one outside this locker room was even thinking we'd have a chance to be where we are right now. It speaks volumes to the football players in this locker room, the camaraderie that we have here, the chemistry that coach Payton has definitely given us the opportunity to have."

The Saints (10-6) beat the Eagles (11-6) by 27-24 in New Orleans on Oct. 15 and are the second-seeded team in the NFC behind Chicago. The Bears play host to Seattle at 1 p.m. EST on Sunday in the other NFC game.

In the AFC semifinals, Indianapolis is at Baltimore at 4:30 p.m. Saturday, and New England is at San Diego at 4:30 on Sunday.

All those franchises have far more playoff experience than the Saints, who have only one postseason win in their history, a



Bonds apologizes to Sweeney for amphetamines controversy:

SAN FRANCISCO -Barry Bonds came out publicly to make it clear his teammate and good friend Mark Sweeney had no involvement in the latest allegations against the San Francisco slugger.

He insists he didn't get any amphetamines from Sweeney. He also didn't

New York Yankees: We want the Rocket

"He's kind of like your perfect employee," genermanager Brian Cashman said Thursday after welcoming Andy Pettitte back to Yankee Stadium.

Clemens pitched for the Yankees alongside Pettitte from 1999-2003, helping them win two World Series titles and four AL pennants. The pair spent the last three seasons with their hometown Houston Astros.

"If Roger is interested in coming to New York, I'd love to talk to him,' Cashman said. "He came in here and not only delivered a huge performance on the field but had a major impact within the clubhouse."

New York hasn't reached the World Series since Clemens left. The Yankees traded Randy Johnson back to the Arizona Diamondbacks this week, and Cashman admitted the move put the rotation at risk.

Clemens, a seven-time Cy Young Award winner, NEW YORK - Now that is choosing among returning to the Astros, retiring or rejoining the Yankees or Boston Red Sox, his first major league team.

Clemens' agent, Randy Hendricks, says that if the Rocket pitches, he probably wouldn't start his season until May or


Pettitte has played golf with Clemens in recent weeks. He wouldn't say exactly what his buddy told him, but he dropped a few hints.

"After speaking with him, it sounds like that he probably wants to try to pitch. It's amazing to me that he still wants to pitch, but he does," Pettitte said, laughing. "He's like he's 20. So he's just got an unbelievable amount of energy."

Hendricks also thinks the 44-year-old right-hander will put off retirement once again.

Three Notrump, South having bid one notrump (12 to 14 points) and North three notrump. You lead the four of spades, and South takes your partner's king with the ace. South then returns the nine of spades. Plan your defense.

North ♥AJ875 A 10

♦Q72 West

◆AJ85 2. You are declarer with the West hand at Three Notrump. North leads the six of clubs, and you win South's eight with the jack. How would you

play the hand? West East ♦Q1083 A J 9 ♥KJ109 ♦ A 10 9 2 ♦ K Q J ♠KJ7 **4**532

1. You shouldn't assume that South has lost his mind when he leads a spade; he's probably trying to put something over on you. For his play to make sense, he must have started with the A-Q-10-9. Furthermore, having disregarded dummy's hearts, declarer probably has the K-

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1. You are West defending against Q. If these assumptions are correct, it would be fatal to duck the nine of spades, because South would then have nine tricks consisting of three

spades, five hearts and a diamond. You should therefore take the spade nine with the jack and shift to a club, but not just any old club. To give yourself the best chance, you should lead the jack of clubs, playing declarer for something like:

♦ A Q 10 9 ♥ K Q 2 ♦ 0 8 2 **4**1063

Such a holding would be consistent with his notrump bid and his spade play at trick two. Note that if you lead any club other than the jack at trick three, South makes the contract with proper play.

2. To ensure the contract beyond the shadow of a doubt, lead a diamond to the jack, play the nine of hearts and let it ride. Even if the finesse loses, you are certain of at least nine tricks - one spade, three hearts, four diamonds and a club.

You cannot afford to take a spade finesse at trick two because South might win with the king and return a club, and you'd finish behind the eight ball if North started with the A-O-10-x-x of clubs

Note that the two-way heart finesse is taken against South, so it can lose only to North, who cannot harm you

Dear Worried: We wouldn't put much stock in what Joni says in her letters, but we urge you to stop snooping when there is nothing to justify it. If she finds out, your relationship may not recover. Joni no doubt harbors a lot of resentment that she was shunted off to her aunt, and if she is acting out, she really should be in counseling, whether she wants it or not. If she won't see her school counselor, talk to the principal

and ask that school counseling be mandated as a condition of her "almost expelled" status. Also, consider making an appointment with an outside professional for both of you.
