Howard College trustees have a problem how do you raise \$21 million without dropping too much of a burden on taxpayers?

College officials say almost all the buildings on the Big-Spring campus are in some need of renovation, and many of the structures need a major facelift.

College President Dr. Cheryl Sparks said total cost of the renovation projects, as revealed at Monday's trustees meeting, will be \$21


That figure would pay for a plethora of needed renovations, Sparks said, including campus-wide upgrades of the electrical, water, sewer and heating, ventilation and air conditioning systems, construction of additional science labs and remodeling at several buildings.

The task facing the college, she noted, is how to shift as much of a burden away from taxpayers as possible.

"We're going to continue to look for available revenue resources,' Sparks said. "That includes energy management contracts, grants and donations.

Another possible source of non-taxpayer money could be revenue bonds, which would be paid off by student fees and other in-house sources. The college used revenue bonds in the late 1980s to finance additions to the college dormitories.

However, those sources may not fund the full extent of needed renovations, which would mean that officials would, in all likelihood, call for a bond election sometime in the

# **Bush urges Congress,** give Iraq policy a chance

But Democrats have no intention of doing so

WASHINGTON President Bush wants Congress to give his controversial strategy for Iraq a chance to work. Defiant Democrats say they'll give it a vote, and use their newly won control over the House and Senate to oppose the deployment of an additional 21,500 troops.

"And we will continue to hold him accountable for changing course in Iraq," House Speaker Nancy Pelosi and Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid said Tuesday night in a blunt response before issued applause had fully faded on Bush's State of the Union address.

His polls poor and public sentiment opposed to the war, Bush appealed to the Democratic-controlled Congress to work with him to face "difficult

islation helping more Americans afford health insurance, reduce the nation's dependence on foreign oil, overhaul immigration laws and renew his signature No Child Left Behind education program.

Bush arranged a trip Wilmington, Del., for the day after his speech, eager to plug his energy proposals at a DuPont Co. facility where scientists conduct research on the use of plants in the production of biofuels such as celluosic ethanol.

But Democrats determined they would keep the public spotlight on the war, with the Senate Foreign Relations Committee expected to approve a nonbinding measure that rejects Bush's planned troop increase as "not in the national interest of the United States."

As is customary, Republicans cheered longer and louder than Democrats when Bush walked down the middle aisle of the House chamber to deliver his annual address to Congress and the nation.

But it was the Democrats turn to whoop it up when the president remarked he was the first chief executive to "begin the State of the Union with the words Madam Speaker." Pelosi, seated next to Vice President Dick Cheney on the dais behind the president, smiled and reached down to shake his hand as members of her rank and file erupted in cheers.

And if there was only one president in the hall, his selfstyled successors were sprinkled throughout the audience. One of them, Sen. Hillary Rodham Clinton, D-N.Y., sat one row behind another, Sen. Barack Obama, D-Ill., neither one giving any indication the other was nearby.

In power for the first time in a dozen years, Democrats have talked optimistically of finding common ground with the president and Republican lawmakers on immigration, education and other areas.

But they voiced concern with his proposal to subject a portion of some taxpayers' employer-provided health insurance to taxes, and were unenthusiastic about his proposals on energy.

The war is an issue apart -aconflict that helped Democrats win control of Congress in last fall's elections, and that leaves Republicans torn between a president of their party and public opinion.

Democrats chose Sen. Jim this war recklessly. He disre-Webb of Virginia to deliver the formal televised party's response to the speech, and the former Republican Navy secretary and Vietnam veteran responded with a blistering attack on the president, the war and the consequences.

# Memorable moments from the State of the Union address

WASHINGTON (MCT) — Here are highlights from the State of the Union address and its reception, at a glance:

-Speech theme: "We are not the first to come here with government divided and uncertainty in the air. Like many before us, we can work through our differences and achieve big things for the American people."

-A historic moment: Bush paid tribute to House Speaker Nancy Pelosi by noting that he was the first president to open a State of the Union message with the words, "Madam Speaker."

-President Bush on the Iraq escalation: "In the end, I chose this course of action because it provides the best chance of success.'

 Democratic response on Iraq: "The majority of the nation no longer supports the way this war is being fought, nor does the majority of our military. We need a new direction." (Sen. James Webb, D-Va.)

-Bush on the economy: "We are now in the 41st month of uninterrupted job growth. . . . Unemployment is low, inflation is low and wages are rising. This economy is on the move." -Democratic response on the economy:

"Wages and salaries for our workers are at alltime lows as a percentage of national wealth. . College tuition rates are off the charts. Our manufacturing base is being dismantled and sent overseas." (Sen. James Webb, D-Va.)

-Domestic policy priorities: Cut U.S. gasoline consumption by 20 percent in 10 years; give tax break to individuals purchasing health insurance and tax as income generous employer-provided health insurance; extend No Child Left Behind education act; enact comprehensive immigration overhaul law.

-Best line from critics: "The best news is that the president has left the Flat Earth Society on global warming. Unfortunately, he is not taking action that would help curb global warming. (Dan Becker, Sierra Club)

-Biggest nonstarter in speech: "With enough good sense and good will, you and I can fix Medicare and Medicaid - and save Social Security.

-What's next: Bush travels to Wilmington, Del., to tout his plans to expand medical insurance coverage. The Senate Foreign Relations Committee is expected to approve a nonbinding resolution opposing a U.S. troop increase.

"When we moved to Big Spring about two-and-ahalf years ago, I can't tell you how many times I told people about our cute little town and the neatest community-based radio station they have," said Brown. "I told them how you can call in to buy, sell or trade something, or to seek jobs or look for someone to do jobs for

"Through our travels we've learned that other towns have these kinds of stations, but none have the announcers that ours

has. I'm asking for you to please not close the radio station or censor its programming. I hope you can work something out with Mr. Pappajohn.'

Councilman Greg Biddison made the motion that the council give Pappajohn a chance to catch up on his rent, drawing unanimous consent from the rest of the council.

"I make a motion we authorize the mayor and the mayor pro-tem to take action to proceed to terminate the lease of David Pappajohn at any time in the next six months if the following conditions are not met," said Biddison. "First, payment in full of the \$1,325 representing past-due rent in the form of cash or cash equivalent by the close of business Wednesday at 5 p.m. Second, remit monthly rental payments of \$325 no later than the 10th day of the month in which the payment is due. A returned check will constitute non-payment."

Pappajohn, who was present at the meeting but did not address the council, said he was thankful for the decision.

"I'm thankful to the council for determining the outcome that they

said Pappajohn. "For letting me go ahead and stay at the station and make the payments. Certainly, that was a fault at my end and I appreciate the council taking it up and looking at it. We'll get back on track and we're looking at doing some good things in the

Biddison said he felt the terms approved by the council were fair, and he's glad to see the city working to keep a local business on its feet.

# Use common sense with passport rules

eginning Tuesday, U.S. citizens reertering the United States by air are required to show passports as an entry requirement.

The same rule applies to citizens of Mexico, Canada and Bermuda who are entering this country by air.

There's been some misinformation and consequent worry concerning the passports. It's been rumored that everyone re-entering the United States will need passports. That's not true, at least right now.

The new passport rule applies only to those people traveling by air. At this time passports won't be required for citizens re-entering the United States by land or sea. Locally, of course, that means if you cross into Jurez for lunch or to shop or visit, you won't need a passport to re-enter this country.

However, the "land and sea re-entry" requirement for passports is scheduled to take effect between January 2008 and June 2009. This could have severe consequences along the borders and at the very least will certainly cause a lot of confusion.

Using passports to travel between countries is common practice throughout the world. But Americans aren't used to that when it comes to the northern and southern borders.

If such re-entry rules are put in place in 2008 or 2009, great care must be taken that it doesn't interrupt commerce along the border. Indeed, after outcries from lawmakers who represent northern and southern border areas, Homeland Security officials are taking a look at options.

Just using El Paso as an example, there are a lot of U.S. citizens who cross the border every day, but who really can't afford to plunk down nearly \$100 for a passport. And at border crossings, where ways of speeding up traffic are always being sought, the use of passports could clog up the works.

We recognize that the new passport rules are a function of increased border security. That's certainly necessary. But common sense, logic and, yes, humanity must be used when increasing security.

# Howstuffworks nice place to visit

few years ago, I discovered the HowStuffWorks.com Web site on the Internet and soon had printed a binder full of articles that explain how various technologies work. Reading them helped me learn more about search engines, viruses, firewalls, Internet radio, instant messaging,

More recently, I wanted to learn more about how podcasting works, so I returned to the site, selected computer stuff, and entered podcasting in the search box. There are several articles. including the basic

HDTV and other top-

"How Podcasting Works.' Besides covering the basics of how podcasting works, the author notes that some say podcasting is democratizing the mainly corporate-run world of radio because it enables anyone with a computer to become a radio disc jockey, talk show host, or recording artist.

Another article, "How iTunes Works" includes ample information on iTunes and how to use it, from downloading the software and importing music, to creating playlists and burning them on

If your interests go beyond technology (I hope so), there are also thousands of articles on other topics, including health, home, cars, entertainment and more.

When I click on the home channel, for instance, a list of articles (with pictures) tempts me to click and read more about: How Robotic Vacuums Work, How Dishwashers Work, How Housebreaking Your Pet Works, and How Krispy Kremes Work, for example.

I have to say I have a thing against Krispy Kremes and any foods that are deep-fat fried and filled with sugar. Plus, Krispy

Kremes seem to be the most oily and sugary of the lot. So I click there and read the article looking for justification for my prejudice, but find little-to-nothing about the ingredients or health consequences. However, I do learn that Krispy Kreme makes about 5 million donuts a day. Great.

Next, I click to How Housebreaking Your Pet Works. I once had trouble teaching an Italian Greyhound not to go inside and am curious what the article suggests. In fact, it does a pretty good job describing the problem. the pet's issues, and how to help him or her learn where to go, plus, the importance of getting there first.

There are many interesting topics covered in HowStuffWorks and, I've found the information to be clear and easy to understand. Well, maybe not everything. I still think understanding how HTML Web pages work, HDTV broadcasting and a few other technologies are pretty complicated. But at least after reading the explanations, I have a better understand-

The site also provides travel information as well as hotel and restaurant information and ratings from the Mobil Travel Guides, and reviews of consumer products from Consumer Guide. Links to these resources are located at the top of the HowStuffWorks banner on all pages.

Besides the sizeable collection of articles available on the site, HowStuffWorks also provides a print and online magazine, HowStuffWorks Express (http://express.howstuffworks.com) . It's designed to help fourth through eighth grade students learn, as well as have fun with sci-

ence and technology. The magazine includes a feature article section that provides numerous articles covering topics such as Under Your Skin: How the Human Body Works, and Spreading the Digital Disease

(about computer viruses). Click on AskMarshallBrain, for example, to see answers for kids' questions such as: Why are mosquitoes so annoying? And, Are people actually being frozen for the future?

The Autopsy Library includes explanations of things that interest kids, such as: TiVo, Xbox 360 controller, electronic keyboard, vending machine, Super Soakers, camera phone, and more.

When I look up others' reviews of the main HowStuffWorks Web site, the findings are mainly positive. Adults and kids who use the site have said things like: It helps you become the family genius; and, it's helpful for research and learning, and also lots of fun.

One person notes that a typical search provides different approaches to a topic, and most definitions contain photographs, graphics, or animated diagrams to demonstrate how the things work.

Further kid comments include: This Web site is just cool — it has a lot of information on any topic you can imagine, and it answers almost every question you may have; and, the authors have done a great job making explanations understandable so that a sixth grader can get the general idea and still maintain the depth and details that adults want.

The only negatives I've found include comments like: The site is a little cluttered; and, it's a little slow in loading pages, and provides information overload.

If you're at all curious, take a few minutes to browse HowStuffWorks.com. I bet you'll find at least one topic that intrigues you, and maybe you'll even click to go there and find out how it works.

The second sheep show was in what is called The Agridome near Rotarua.

Opening lead - three of diamonds The best way of approaching the play of most suit contracts is to start by counting losers. Applying this rule to the present case, you note that there is a loser in each suit. Since losing four tricks means down one, you naturally look for a way to save one

of those tricks The most obvious way of attempting to pick up a trick is to put up dummy's jack of diamonds on the opening lead, hoping West has led East produces the queen, which you win with the ace.


The next step is to try to develop an extra heart trick where only one presently exists. If you succeed, you might eventually be able to get rid of one of your minor-suit losers on dummy's ace of hearts. However, the extra heart trick can be gained only by leading a heart from dummy toward your queen, and this requires first getting there to make the play.

Accordingly, you lead the five of spades to the nine at trick two. East takes the ace and returns a diamond. You win with the king and lead the six of spades to the ten, noting with satisfaction that both opponents follow suit.

Now comes the low heart from dummy. East takes the king, cashes a diamond and switches to a club. You win with the ace, cash the queen of hearts, lead your carefully preserved deuce of trumps to the three and then discard your club loser on the ace of hearts to bring in the contract.

The entire procedure requires careful planning and a moderate amount of luck. Making four spades is far from certain at the start, since the outcome depends on how the adverse cards are divided, but by playing in the recommended fashion, you at least give yourself a chance for the contract.

Idiot's Guide to Ballroom Dancing" (793.33 ALL J) by Jeff Allen. It purports to be No. 1 in this category. In a review from Publisher's Weekly, the book's blend of mainline Christian theology, biblical exploration and personal stories about probing God's will through spiritual discernment gives grounding for Christians who struggle with that issue. Schmidt starts the exploration with "God-questions" to "usher us into another way of being, a new way of seeing the word." Most powerful is his chapter on "signs and wonders," which includes his explanation for why he has reservations serious about the practice of looking at every event in our lives as a "sign from God" pointing to a choice we are to make. Schmidt also cautions against thinking of God's will as a fixed and certain "to-do list." So how would he have us discern God's purpose? Listen to and with our lives, love God and enjoy the freedom that comes in using the gifts and graces to make choices. This is an important book on

Christian spiritual discernment. This is a sometimes painful subject, but most of us will be faced with this situation: "How to Care for Aging Parents" (306.874 MIR V) by Virginia Morris. It the essential reference book for anyone who is or will be caring for the elderly. It is clearly written, carefully researched and thoroughly indexed to provide quick access to all ques-

tions. In another review from Weekly, Publisher's comes a skilled essayist as well as an ecologist, Daniel B. Botkin. In "Strange **Encounters:** Adventures of a Renegade Naturalist" (333.72 BOT D), he combines science, wit and a gift for characterization to craft these consistently engaging essays. Many deal with contradictions and uncertainties that may never be resolved by research






Walker was the Steers leading scorer with 14 points, but all too often he was left standing under the basket, fighting for position and not touching the ball.


