Friona Included In Sewage Irrigation Study of University

A two-year research project to answer the question "What does treated-sewage irrigation do to Soil?" has been launched by University of Texas scientists who note that fifty-nine Texas communities including Friona are known to be using the special irrigation plan.

Professor Ernest W. Steel of the University civil engineering department is conducting the research under a \$6,000 U. S. Public Health Service grant.

Irrigation Ditch Overflows Hampering Rural Mail Delivery

Postal authorities have noted that overflow of irrigation ditches in several locations has hampered rural mail delivery this week.

Irrigation farmers are asked to cooperate in controlling the overflow, and those who have not experienced any trouble here might well check their ridges to insure against future flooding of the country roads.

In any case where excessive overflow covers the roads, the rural carriers will of necessity divert their routes, thus hampering service to possibly several homes in the affected neighborhood.

Have you ever been to Boys Ranch at Old Tassators of the plains area were guests at the last Saturday afternoon upon the invitation of Mr. Farley - who is dedicating most of his time efforts to the rehabilitation and welfare of the ranch. Naturally Mr. Farley wanted the editors to for themselves the good work at the ranch, probably writing favorable comments from time to time - and we are doing just that, for we are convinced a great work is being accomplished

The first impression of any visitor to the location is of the home-like appearance of the ranch - with corrals, the blacksmith, bunkhouses, swimming hole, headquarters, school, and school - all contributing to the whole life of outdoor boys.

Do not misunderstand - the vista is not one of a rest camp, but rather that of a ranch headquarters, with the some 140 boys going about their assigned tasks - and getting on with their work.

Every grade from the first through high school presented in the school, with teachers present. The youngest child is 6 years old, a little from the Northeast who had grown up in the city and crime. Think how different that lad's life will be with the guidance of Boys Ranch. The number of the boys are quite talented of all ages, and it is these that we see in programs of the area, often forming our opinion of the

ranch by the appearance of these entertainers. That is OK, but frankly, we enjoyed mingling with all the fellows and just talking with them more than we enjoyed the prepared program, good as it was. At the table set for six at which Mrs. Neelley, Mrs. Phillip and myself sat there were three of the boys eating and talking freely with us - a Chinese, a little cotton-headed fellow, and a larger youth - all very, very polite and better mannered than many of the "grown-ups!"

Incidentally the teams that have developed their roping tricks and the musicians among the boys are soon to appear in Hollywood, appearing on national radio, television, and movie releases together with Roy Rogers and over a dozen of other top stars. No doubt they will receive a warm reception over the entire country, and Boys Ranch should well profit by the publicity focused upon its work. Among these boys will be David Ash, who many of you have heard introduced as the "Little Jimmie Dickens" and he is just that! Then there is Bill Hiller who with his solemn face sings such heart-touching songs as "Little Angel with the Dirty Face." Eddie Stevens will have his part - he's a fellow who's never had a piano lesson, yet can veritably make one talk. Experiences of Another Town Reprinted Here Example and Warning to This and Any Progressive Community

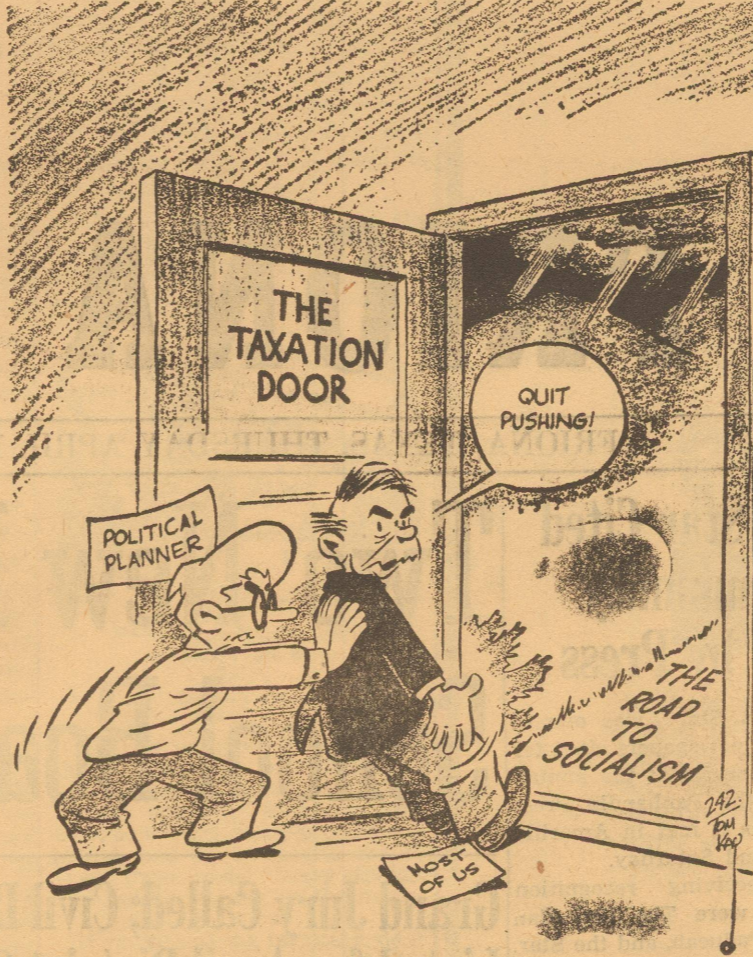

Someone has said that the lessons best learned are those learned the hard way. Weslaco last week learned the hard way how NOT to do things. A legitimate business firm came to town and offered to buy a prominent downtown corner on which it proposed to build a \$50,000 filling station. It offered some option money and agreed to buy the property if permission could be obtained from the Commission to build such a drive-in establishment on Texas Blvd., a restriction brought about some time ago when two filling stations in the heart of business district contributed to traffic congestion. When the matter came before the Commission, it approved the idea and ordered necessary changes in the restrictive ordinance. Out of nowhere came unjust and ridiculous charges that this had been done in a "secret meeting". (The Weslaco news will testify that the Commission hasn't held a "secret" meeting in several years. If our staff

members have not attended every meeting, they have had full details forthwith and immediately afterward. We'd have told you long ago if "secret" meetings were being held!)

Changes in the ordinance were given tentative approval by the Commission at a called meeting, then were scheduled for second and final reading at a regular Commission meeting. At this meeting was presented a petition signed by some 175 persons requesting the Commission to change its mind on the basis of certain charges, allegations and opinions voiced in the petition.

Within 48 hours, the community was in one of its worst uproars in years. We are still amazed that so many citizens could have become so excited over a matter which involved little more than personal opinions and beliefs and how anybody could have been so misled about the action of their own City Commission, when it arrived at its conclusion with such open-handed honesty in a wide-open, public hearing.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

There is a strong movement in Washington to pass a Fair Trade law, to replace the one invalidated by the Supreme Court.

Chief opposition comes from the huge financial-merchandising organizations now trying to spread public confusion. Here is the background of the Fair Trade law movement.

First, bear in mind that cheap imported Japanese goods are never fair-traded. Actually, few products are ever fair-traded.

But if an American company makes a consistently superior electric mixer, for example, and invests thousands of dollars advertising, in time that product becomes the standard of value.

Naturally, imitations, even Japanese and other cheap foreign imitations, are put on the market to sell at whatever price the market will bear. Lately, it has been State Dept. policy to encourage flooding the American market with cheap imports.

But the company making the superior item enters into price.

Nothing in these agreements makes it impossible for other brands to be sold at any price.

However, the big retail outlets opposing this law, such as giant Macy's, finds the public usually rejects cheap imitations for the standard brand.

So Macy's and the others want to sell the recognized quality brand at below cost, if necessary, to promote traffic to their

store. They can lose heavily on the item making up losses on long profit items. But the small dealer is forced into bankruptcy.

Macy's and the others of this type could accomplish their purpose just as well by advertising a limited number of \$20 gold pieces for \$9.95.

But there is one big barrier to that idea.

The government would not allow anyone to so destroy the value of gold.

But some in government feel that it is proper for a giant merchandiser to destroy all value of a superior quality product.

The Socialistic schemers in Washington would like to see quality values destroyed in the American market so cheap foreign cartel goods could flood the market such as the shoddy goods sold in Moscow stores.

The most ridiculous opposition to a new Fair Trade law was voiced to Congress by Matt Trigg, spokesman for the American Farm Bureau Federation. He termed such a law "inconsistent with free economy", "an umbrella for the inefficient".

However, Trigg's organization has been most active in getting billions in tax dollars spent on price supports for grain, eggs, hogs, peanuts and other foods.

No tax money is involved in Fair Trade laws. Neither are prices pegged on a commodity; just on certain quality brands.

The fight for Fair Trade laws is a fight to keep the entire American market from being taken over by shoddy merchandise, and to protect independent merchants from vicious price wars.

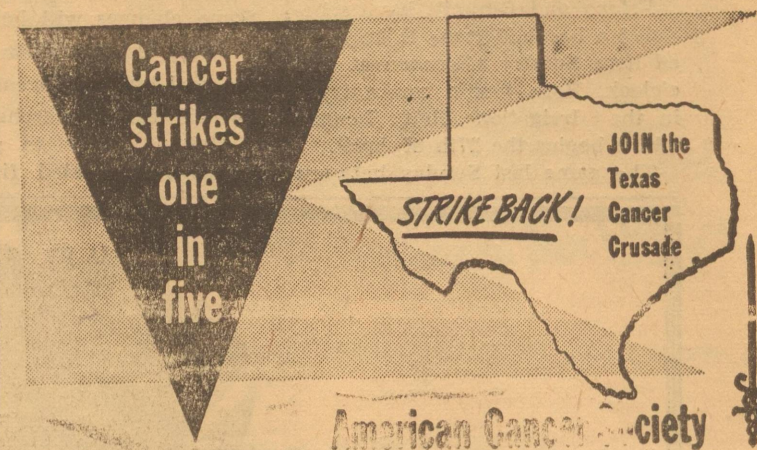
of the 14 announced contests. District winning teams are to be selected in district contests.

GRASS ROOTS

Have been doing a little technical reading lately, and have managed a few pages in between Dick Tracy and Lil Abner, that interested me no end. My big trouble is keeping one thumb in the descriptive terms section, and the other thumb scratching my head. For example: "The physiological structure of Buchloe dactyloides, equips the plant to withstand extreme variance in temperature, thereby eliminating any osmotic occurrence within the meristematic tissues responsible for immediate emergence of the seedling during inopportune seasons." That's one way of saying that Buffalo grass won't come up until the season is right. Believe I'll just stick with Dick Tracy.

Richard Ireland reports that his last Fall's seeding of Buffalo Alfalfa is way ahead of other varieties planted at the same time. This seeding was an experiment with Richard, and to the best of my knowledge, is the only seeding of this alfalfa variety in this area. Buffalo Alfalfa is a wilt-resistant variety, and was developed for this area. Drive out to Richard's and see this seeding. Incidentally, his wife, Patsy, generally has the cookie jar full.

Irrigated pasture seedlings are underway. I blended the first batch of seed yesterday for Sam

Hunter. I have quite a list of seedlings to prepare for this spring, and as it generally happens, all will probably want to seed at once!!!

What in blazes do I mean by preparing pasture seedings? Well, first a pasture should be planned, then prepared, then planted. After that, it is up to the farmer or rancher to the eventual success of the planting. Preparation involves the proper blending of the proper legumes and grasses. Incidentally, if you plan to do this yourself in your garage or granary, ask the fellow who tried it, before you start scooping seed. What a tale can be told about adapted varieties, and rate of seeding of each, etc.

A very well thought of lady told me that we could expect rain at the end of every dry spell!!! Brings to mind a friend of mine during the army days, who had spent some six weeks on bivouac, without the convenience of shower, tub, or basin. He claims that when finally getting access to a shower, he stood in it with both faucets going for thirty minutes and didn't even get the concrete floor wet!

It's time to get fertilizer on your irrigated pastures, if you are going to have any record gains.

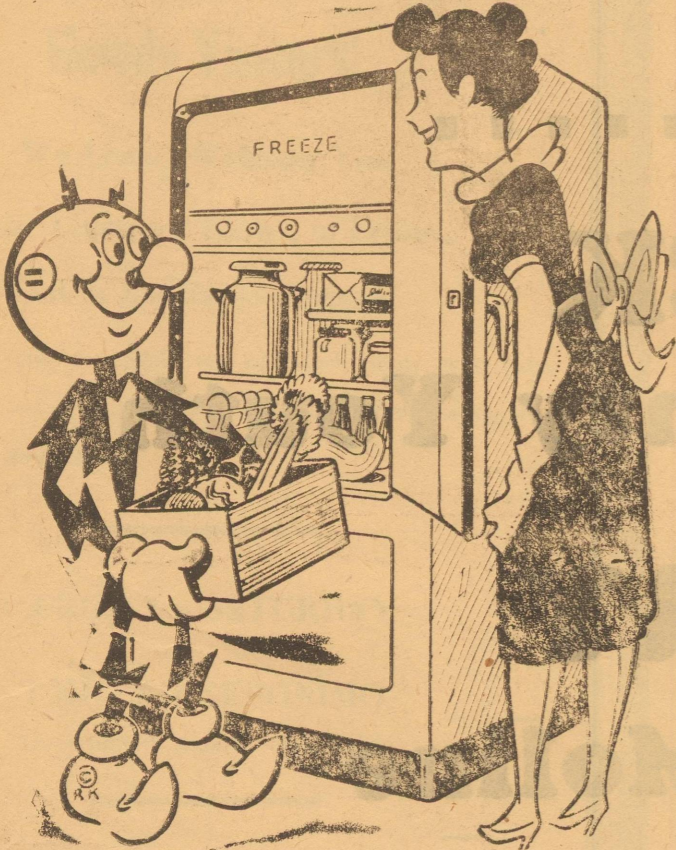

The Law and You

DO YOU KNOW what the law of Discovered Peril is?

The law of Discovered Peril is a rule of law which sometimes applies in cases involving claims for damage for the negligent acts of others. Ordinarily, a man may not recover damages when his own negligence contributes to the happening of the event which re-

sults in his injuries and damages. However, under the law of Discovered Peril, the party may recover damages, where he has been negligent, if the other party discovered the perilous position in which the injured party found himself, and then failed to use all

reasonable means to prevent an accident, and resulting damages. Thus the fact that a man has committed a negligent act or wrongful act, and places himself in a difficult position, does not authorize some one seeing his position, to commit a greater negligent act, or wilful act, and continue his course, without doing all that he reasonably can do to prevent the accident and injury to the first party. It is a very humane rule, requiring one who sees another in a dangerous position, and who has the opportunity and ability to prevent injury to the person in the dangerous position, to use such reasonable means as he has at his command, to prevent injury to the other individual, who has placed himself in a dangerous position.

Rogers Declares

No Need for Blank Check to Military

COST - PLUS CONTRACTS

The need for defense expenditures and the tremendous cost of weapons for our continued strength with which to oppose armed aggression cannot be discounted. Every American is ready, able and willing to step forward on a moment's notice and provide whatever is necessary to defend our way of life. However, this does not mean that the military is entitled to a blank check that is to be paid out of the taxpayer's pockets. The tremendous cost of the preparedness program is all the more reason for the exercise of business principles in carrying out this program. Unless some of the tactics employed in obtaining the materials and weapons necessary for our defense are changed, our entire economy could be in danger. I have particular reference to the cost-plus contracts that are still blighting this country. They are of two general types: (1) The cost-plus fixed fee; (2) The cost plus fixed percentage fees based on a percentage of cost. No one needs to be advised that such contracts encourage spending. In addition, they actually invite all kinds of trick artifices and schemes of a financial nature. In recent proceedings before the House of Representatives it was brought out by Congressman Gore of Tennessee that during the hearings concerning some of the appropriations General Thomas Farrell appeared as a witness. He held the position of Assistant General Manager of the Atomic Energy Commission. His salary was \$17,500 a year. He was hired away from this employment by ARO, a corporation under the laws of Tennessee for the purpose of making a contract with the Air Corps and obtaining a fee for operating the aerodynamic wind tunnel facility at Tullahoma, which is now under construction. General Farrell was hired by ARO at a salary of \$30,000 per year. This of course was quite an advance for General Farrell and no doubt from a personal standpoint he was justified in leaving the government and going to work for ARO. However, when we look into the matter we find that under the plus-cost-fee contract under which ARO was operating, the taxpayers of the United States were actually paying the \$30,000 salary of General Farrell, because the Government was having to pay the cost of the project and this cost included the salary paid by the ARO Corporation to General Farrell. The Committee felt that General Farrell was an able and distinguished man and doing a fine job for the Atomic Energy Commission at his \$17,500 a year salary. This transaction is a perfect example of the fallacy of cost-plus contracts, and

it is like a man and his wife at an auction sale bidding against each other. It doesn't make any difference which one gets the article, the family bank account will pay the bill. Much more has been uncovered and I wish space would permit me to include it in this letter.

We all understand that there are certain matters that could probably be justified on a cost-plus basis; for example, the contract for construction of weapons that could not be let on competitive bids because of the secrecy of the weapon involved. Another example is the construction of such things as an atomic powered submarine, and other like items, the actual cost of which cannot be anticipated because it is entirely experimental in nature. However, the great bulk of cost-plus contracts can be done away with and much money can be saved the American taxpayer. This is vitally necessary at the present time because it is one method by which military expenditures can be cut without endangering the preparedness program. You can expect to see quite a bit about this when the Armed Services appropriations bills come before the House. This Congress is going to demand the application of business principles and they are going to get it.

APPROPRIATIONS BILLS

The Appropriations Committee has worked out and is bringing the several appropriations bills to the House Floor with great speed. As I told you in a previous newsletter, this committee has made drastic cuts in the budget proposals and the bills are being cut again on the House Floor. There have been several attempts to increase appropriations in these bills, but they have failed miserably. We have just finished with the appropriations bill for civil functions administered by the Department of the Army. This includes the work of the Corps of Engineers on rivers and harbors, construction, operation, and maintenance, flood control, and other related matters. It was very interesting to note the speed with which amendments seeking to increase appropriations in this bill were knocked down as quick as they were presented.

Rev. Russell Pogue, Claud Miller, Wesley Hardesty, and Curtis Murphy went to Amarillo Monday morning to donate blood to the Blood Bank. George Messenger, who is in the Parmer County Hospital, will receive several transfusions from this source.

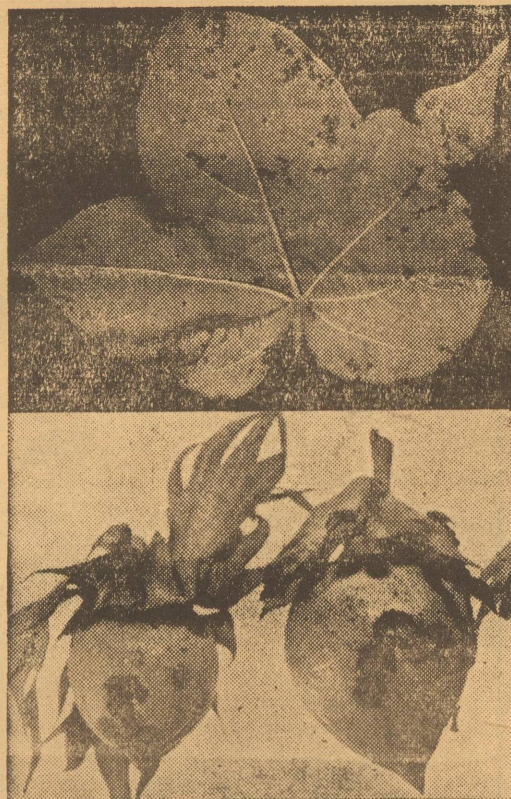

Bacterial blight is a disease which cotton growers have become more and more aware of in recent years. The disease is also known as angular leaf spot, boll blight, blackarm, sore shin and damping off, depending on time of year and part of the cotton plant affected.

On the leaf, bacterial blight appears as watersoaked, angular spots which become brown upon drying. On the bolls, the watersoaked round lesions become sunken and black upon drying. The blackarm phase of the disease appears as black elongated lesions on the stems and fruiting branches. Sore shin and damping off are seedling diseases and infect the stand of young cotton just after it comes up.

The angular leaf spot infection maintains the disease in the field during the entire growing season and may then spread to the boll blight phase of the disease which probably causes the greatest loss. In boll blight, the bacteria may stain fibers, thus reducing the grade of the lint. Boll blight lesions may serve as avenues of entrance for boll rot fungi which normally would not infect healthy cotton.

Treating cotton planting seed with Ceresan M is helpful in preventing bacterial blight during the seedling stage.

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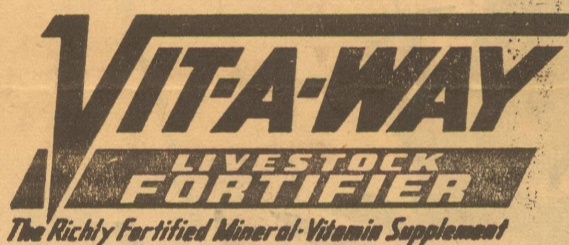

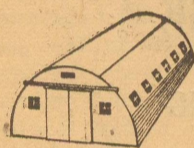
Selections Made From Otho Whitefield Flock
