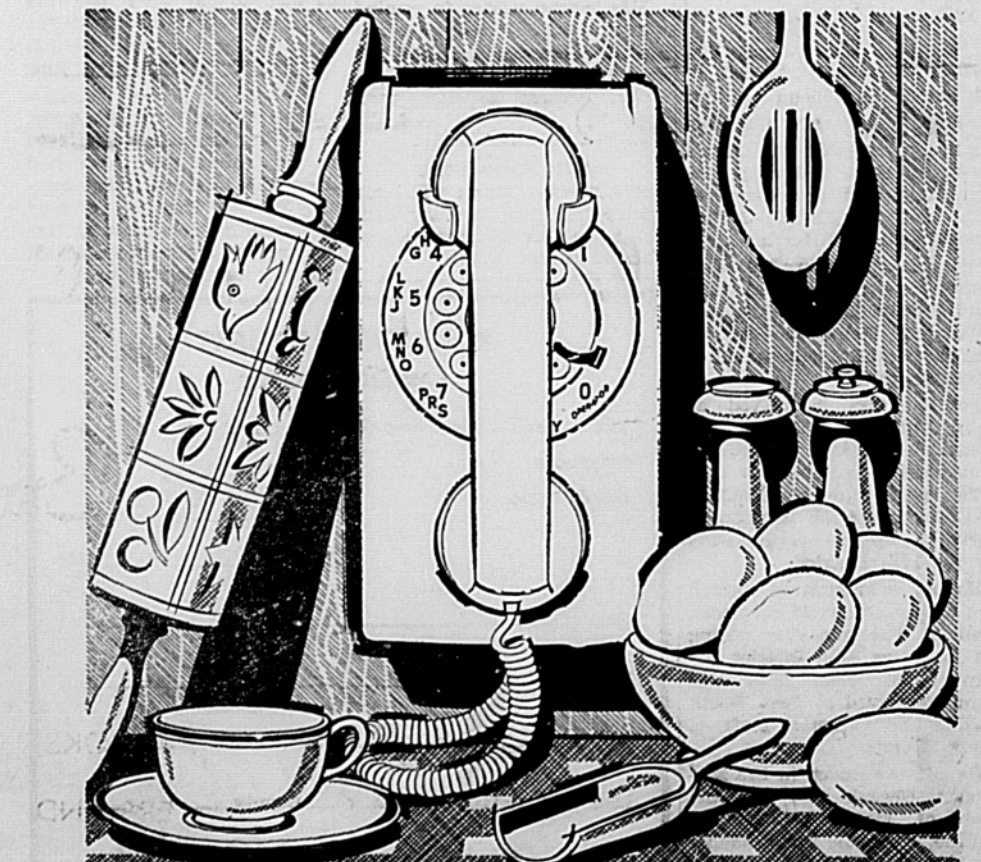

"WEEKLY MEDITATIONS"

Scripture Text: "Who his own self bare our sins in His own body on the tree, the we, being dead to sins, should live unto righteousness: by whose stripes you were healed." 1 Peter 2:24.

Jesus bare these stripes for each of us. To repay Him, we should have a desire to live for Him. We need to serve Him; to tell others of His great plan of salvation.

As we read about Sodom and Gomorrah, we see a people that had turned their back on God. God did have mercy on them. He sent Lot to them to try to persuade the people to turn from their wicked ways. Like so many people today, they didn't take heed. They just laughed Lot's preaching to scorn.

The Bible tells us that God sent fire upon Sodom and Gomorrah. These people that had laughed at Lot were no doubt

screaming in their torment for Lot to save them, but God had delivered Lot out from among them. The Lord knoweth how to deliver the godly out of temptations, and to reserve the unjust unto the day of judgment to be punished (2 Peter 2:9).

In second Peter two and six, we see where God made Sodom and Gomorrah an example for us. We are to take heed and escape the judgment and dying that is coming upon humanity.
