## Chiefs Take District; To Play Thanksgiving

The Friona Chieftains romped over the highly-touted Anton Bulldogs in the last regular season play last Friday, copping the District 3-B Championship, in the 61-33 game, on the local sod.

The championship earns the redmen another game - play for bi-district honors against the winning South Plains team, probably Idalou, at a time and location yet undetermined excepting that it will be during Thanksgiving week.

Friona took an early lead in last week's jamboree - lead that was increased throughout the game - by the regular team, substitutes and the second string.

The scoreboard read 20-0 at the close of the first quarter, tallies being netted by Robbins, Roberson and Jordan.

Anton's first score came only after the host eleven had racked up 34 points.

It was in 1944 that Friona enjoyed the experience of a District championship - and even in that year the honor finally came after a flip of a coin between Tulia, Hereford and Friona who found themselves in a three-way tie after a series of last minute defeats by each.

Tulia was "flipped" out of the contest for district standard-bearer, and Friona and Hereford battled on Thanksgiving Day to a final score of 14-13, in Hereford's favor.

Friona was grouped in Class A competition in 1944. Other schools in this district were Dimmitt, Dalhart, Dumas, Hereford, Tulia, and Canyon.

The Chieftains were coached in 1944 by Kenneth Houlette, and assistant was Maurice Norman.

Playing for the local colors were Wayne B. Stark, W. B. Norwood, Jimmy Baxter, Bob Lee Roden, W. C. Reed, Marvin Jordan, David Johnson, Dean Hall, Junior Renner, Robert Laceywell, Bill Buchanan, LeRoy Jenson, W. G. Mabry and Emmett Day, Jr.

## Potato Growing Given Impetus As Processing Shed Talked Here

Thirty-one farmers of the Friona area met Tuesday evening to learn more of potatoes as a possible major addition to the diversified farming program here.

Much of the Tuesday night meeting was spent in open discussion and questions regarding the growing and marketing techniques, together with expected costs and profits, inasmuch as his would be relatively a new crop here for most of the farmers. Outside of scattered acre-

ages in the eastern part of Parmer County, potatoes have not been grown on a commercial scale, although many qualified observers believe the soil more suitable than the more publicized Deaf Smith County land. The soil in this immediate vicinity is some looser and should produce a typler potato.

From 4,500 to 7,000 acres now are being grown annually as staple crop in the Hereford area.

Neff said that he personally would seed from 70 to 100 acres at his farm northeast of Friona this year.

In listing the advantages of potato growing, the expected good profits were of course listed.

A second meeting for farmers and business men interested in a potato crop and potato shed here has been called for Tuesday night, Nov. 25th. The meeting will convene at 8 o'clock in the American Legion Hall. It is hoped that at this meeting a rather accurate acreage in production can be determined so plans on get underway immediately for shed construction, seed procurement, etc.

Though certainly no guarantee could be made of price, market, etc. it was pointed out that growers who had stuck to the crop year in and year out had realized good profits, often getting a gross of \$600-800 per acre with a net of \$275-400 exclusive of watering costs.

Neff said, in listing facts to be considered by the prospective grower, that an 8-inch well should take care of 60-80 acres.

Land that has been put in potatoes and properly fertilized said to be most productive producing more wheat than summer-filled land.

Potatoes have a 90-100 day growing season here; they are seeded the very last week in March or the first week in April enabling them to hit the market the last week in June and the first of July when the market is most favorable here, the harvest being completed in California but not yet begun in the Colorado-Idaho areas.

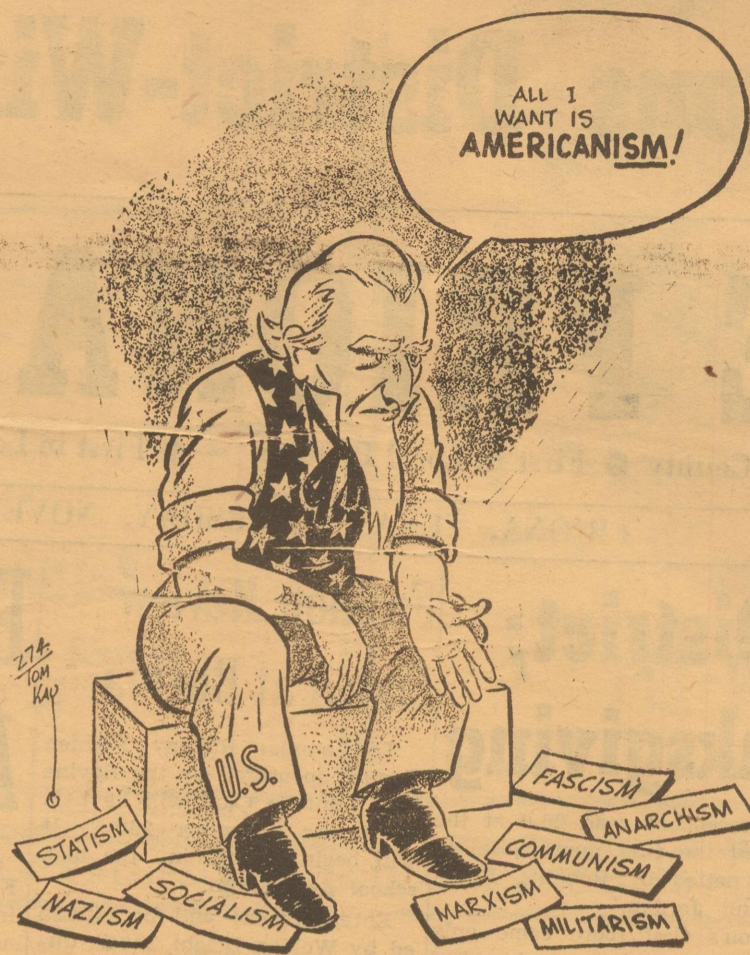

Here are two of the many problems confronting the new Administration.

One problem has been presented almost as a kick in the face to Americans who have been in Canada the past few months. American money is now worth less than when exchanged for Canadian money.

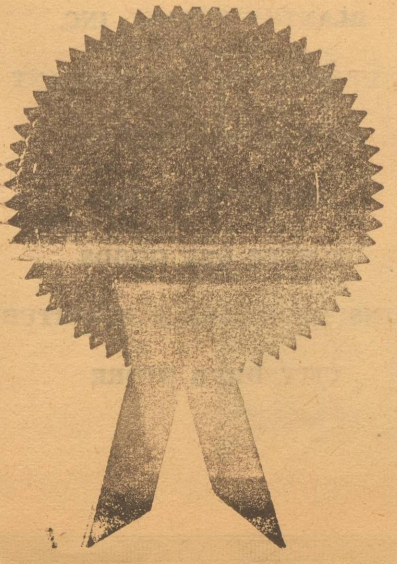

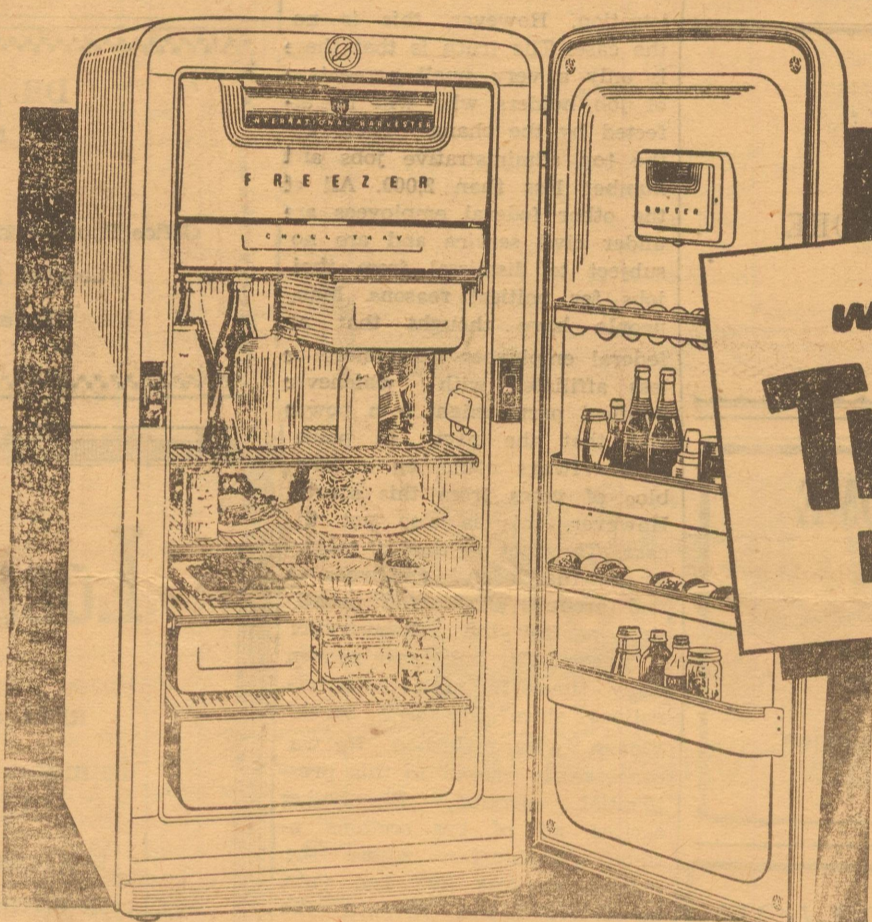

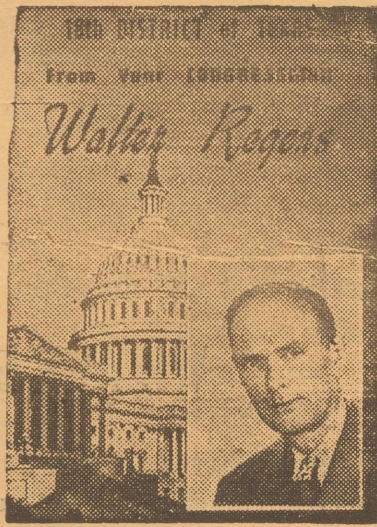

**Gov't Employees' Vote Favored  
Change, Points Out Congressman**



WASHINGTON AFTER THE ELECTION

The Capitol City, as is usual after all presidential elections, reflects a mixed feeling of elation and gloom. This would appear rather odd to many, as it is commonly believed in many places that when one administration is turned out and a new one is coming in, the entire picture in the Capitol should be all gloom. The reason for such belief is the common view that most federal employees depend upon the administration for their jobs and are therefore jeopardized by a change of administration. However, this is not the case. The truth is that there is only a very small percentage of job holders who will be affected by the change. These are the top administrative jobs and number less than 2,000. All of the other federal employees are under civil service and are no subject to dismissal from their jobs for political reasons. Many people have thought that all federal employees were more or less affiliated with whichever political party might be in power and that the party in power could always count on a large bloc of votes from this source. However, this is also not the case. The fact is that a majority of the federal employees in and around Washington usually vote against the administration in power. This has been proven many times in presidential elections since the civil service system was established. It was conclusively proved in this presidential election, Eisenhower carried all of the sections around Washington where the federal workers live and vote. In Maryland and Virginia, the vote received by Eisenhower in the sections of Virginia most heavily populated by federal employees gave him a large majority than the other section of the same state. The same is true in Maryland. The residents who live inside the District of Columbia are not allowed to vote. However they engage in politics as much as, or more so than in other cities of like size. It was very evident inside of the District of Columbia that had the people here been allowed to vote Eisenhower would have carried two large sections of the District where most of the federal workers are housed. It is also well to point out that there does not appear to be any feeling of ill will among the people in the District of Columbia, whether they are federal employees or individual business people. In fact, every one seems to be in the attitude that the political battle is over and that it is the duty and desire of every citizen to cooperate to the fullest extent, regardless of political affiliations, to an early solution of the many tremendous problems that are faced. This attitude is something that America can be proud of. There is no other place in the world where the people can enjoy traits of good sportsmanship and honest devotion to country. It is the reason that America has become great and will always remain great. It is the reason that our country has become a symbol of freedom for oppressed peoples all over the world. It is one of the many reasons why people all over the world want to leave their native lands and come to America to start a new life. In no other country of the world can freedom loving people find the hope of a new and free life that is

offered by America. I have just returned from making a radio statement that will be beamed to countries behind the Iron Curtain. The statement concerned Adolph Sabath, of Illinois, whose recent death was mourned by the whole nation and free peoples everywhere. Congressman Sabath came to the United States as a Czech immigrant at the age of 15 years. When he landed in Baltimore he had \$1.36 in his pocket, but he was well armed with courage, ambition, intelligence and faith. In his first job he received \$3.00 per week, and from that humble beginning rose to national prominence. He was elected to Congress in March of 1907, and had served continuously since that time, a longer record of service than any other person in the history of the United States. The great success story of this Czech immigrant in America, let us all hope that his life will be the guiding light to those of his native land and other countries now enclosed behind the Iron Curtain, and to whom opportunity has been obliterated by communist oppression. The life

story of Adolph Sabath could well furnish the strength to these peoples that will enable them to cast off the yoke of totalitarian enslavement and build in their countries the kind of government that would afford to their children the freedom and the opportunity that we in America cherish.




