

If these prisoners were returned to the country of their origin under the second proposal above referred to, it would be administratively impossible to keep up with them because of rigid censorship behind the Iron Curtain and the further fact that most of the information we could obtain on them would be highly questionable. I do not believe that Russia would agree to this scond proposal. If she ayreed to the first proposal, I would entertain great fears that she would attempt to infiltrate UN countries with Red spies by this medium.

One of Russia's prime objectives is to bring about a major breach in the NATO organization. She obviously thinks that her bestchance lies in causing friction between France and the other NATO countries. It presently appears that should a truce be concluded in Korea, qnick and final truce. However the Red Chinese will promptly move men and supplies to the Indo-China front for stepped up action against the French. This will require France to call for immediate all-out aid from the UN or permit Indo-China to fall into the hands of the Reds. 

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

question of forced or voluntary repatriation of prisoners of war. From the lack of progress that has been made in the solution of this essue, it would seem that an irresistible foree has met an immovable object. Russia and her satellttes have have taken the position that all prisoners of war on both sides shall be returned to the sources from which they were captured, irrespective of the desires of the prisoner. The position of the Un-

ited Nations is that these prison ers should be thoroughly screen ed and that those sincerely and honestly desiring to remain under the jurisdiction of their captors should be dealt with by the captors and not the opposition forces. It will be remembered hat subsequent toWorld War II many tragic stories came out of Europe and Russia concerning the great efforts and in many cases suicodal attempts of prisoners of war resisting their return to Russia. This would leave little doubt as to the type of harsh punishment employed by Russia in dealing with returned POW's, and it can be safely assumed that the same procedure would be employed by North Ko rea and Red China, who follow so closely the Russian scheme. What actually happened to theee returned POW's is still somewhat of a mystery because of the rigid censorship behind the Iron Curtain.

Several plans have been advanced to solve this tough problem. One of these before the United Nations calls for the formation of a neutral screening commission to separate the sheep from the goats. Another plan receiving some consideration calls for a return of all POW's upon commitments from the country receiving them that they will he mistreated.
