Toll Roads Given Green Light in Texas

Toll roads are something new to Texas. The recent Legislature passed a bill authorizing toll roads anywhere in the state, an outgrowth of a proposal to build such highways in the congested Ft. Worth-Dallas areas. Though many of us hate to see added expenses in transportation, the rapidity of transportation progress has brought us to a point where something had to be done-and fast, to remedy the situation of worn-out highways crowded with a greatly increased number of vehicles. And no one has come up with any workable solution other than the toll road plan.

Fats Developed as Cheap Feed Component

Livestock feeding is another practice that has undergone phenominal changes even during our lifetime. What with the balanced rations and the feeding methods worked out by the colleges (notably Texas A &M) the farm youth or the commercial feeder of today would hardly have been recognized only a few years back.

A popular farm publication came out this month with an article entitled "Fat is Cheap-Let's Who was it that said, "Imagination was given

The observation followed: "It's the use of nonfood animal fats-such as grease and tallow-in livestock and poultry rations. This development may mean better, cheaper feeds-while possibly strenghtening the market for animal fats and live-

And with similar tongue in cheek tactics, the British also launched the grandiose slogan Trade, Not Aid" in the drive to break down American tariff protection to permit the flooding of the U.S. market.

The great mystery in many circles in Washington is the effectiveness of British salesmanship in selling these ideas to many presumably intelligent Americans, aside from the American businesses with plants abroad.

But despite their ringing acclaim for the principle of "Trade, Not Aid", British leaders continue to prove that they either work out free trade even among their own Dominions.

Mutual Security Bulletin No. 317 contains an interesting demonstration of classic British thinking on free trade.

It seems apparent that the cornerstone of their thinking on free trade is first that someone in authority in America make by such free trade.

In the bulletin referred to, U. S. taxes are being used to buy \$625,000 worth of copper matte in a British Dominion, Canada. The authorization fur ther provides that this material can only be shipped either to refining with the delivery of the refined product made to France.

Thus, Canada's copper industry profits, the United Kingdom refining industry will profit, and presumably French industry has a way of making a profit on

But significantly, the American taxpayer, who foots the bill.

An item of \$20,000,000 in aluminum is bought in Canada and sent to Great Britain, in a little inter-family deal, courtesy American taxpayers.



Bills Passed by Legislature Listed

Govrnor Allan Shivers this week finished a long session of signing bills passed by the Legislature.

The governor's time limit expired Tuesday, June 16, for either signing or vetoing bills.

One to which he affixed his signature authorizes the construction of toll roads in Texas.

This was a controversial measure in the legislature, which at times seemed to prefer limiting the setup to a Dallas-Fort Worth turn-

The administration, which favored making the authority statewide,, finally prevailed.

Highway people hope that the toll road venture, new for Texas, will help to relieve traffic conjest-

It is widey recognized that roads are overcrowded. The governor advocated a one-cent increase in the gasoline tax to help out with the needed highway building, but the legislature settled down to a nonew-tax policy and stuck with it.

Under the toll road bill, the Dallas-Fort Worth turnpike will be the first to be constructed.

On a single day, the governor signed 89 bills, including eight designed to carry out his water conservation and drouth relief program.

One of the water bills is effective immediately. It creates an antipollution advisory coucil which has the responsibility of studying pollution and working with other agencies to prevent it.

of the Supreme Court upholding the provisions of District of Columba laws adopted in 1872 and 1873 banning segregtaion in restaurants, bars, and other eating places is being hailed in many quarters, as a victory over the South equal to the surrender of Lee at Appomattox Courthouse at the end of the Civil War. These laws have been referred to as "District lost" laws, because they were passed by the Ditrict of Columbia during a short period subsequent to the Civil War when the District had law making powers. The decision has also furnished much encouragement to the proponents of "home rule" for and "home rule" advocate forces has increased daily since the Supreme Court released that decision. Needless to say, the Washington hotel and retaurant operator are deeply disturbed as to how to cope with this new problem. The law applies only to the District of Columbia and not to Virginia, which is just across the Potomac, nor to Maryland, which joins the District of Columbia on all sides. One of the best hotel dining rooms, which is in the shadow of the White House, has closed its doors. The story is going around Washington that immediately after the announcement of the Supreme, Court decision, a large group of negroes requested reservations to be served in that dining room.


