Actually, the United States should be entering into an era of even higher prosperity than at any time in the past. That is the opinion of many economists. * * *
This school of thought points

to the fact that home ownership in the United States is at an all time high. And it is well known that far more money in repairs, remodelling, in fact for everything from lawn seed to pianos is than on rental homes. Economists also point to high auto ownership whose servicing produces a huge business volume.

Neither do they feel that the U. S. is consuming anywhere near the goods and services that it can. Even during a year of so-called Korea prosperity, almost one-third of the nation's families have incomes of less than \$2,000 per year, over 60% of the families have incomes of less than \$4,000 per year. There is still a great market to be developed by increasing the average annual family income.

What, then, the question is asked, creates the fear that without war, or preparation for war,

Official Washington is con- | the U. S. economy will collapse?

The answer is that too much of the business is controlled by facturer owned retail outlets, by business practices which deprive independent business, the major furnisher of employment in the nation, from expanding.

Many in government still believe that a major plant expansion of \$2 billion per year, as was evidenced during the Korean war, furnishes prosperity. Yet, the expansion of a few huge industrial plants is but a drop in that could be made by the building of new independent stores existing establishments.

However, with the control of business falling into fewer and fewer hands due to cutthroat competitive tactics, employment producing independent enterprises either fall by the wayside, or die aborning.

At the same time, pessimists, and those seeking rigid controls over the economy, cry that measures must be taken to ston tion before the economy collaps-

Yet government itself has fashioned the backbone of inflation through taxation. Last year the nation spent \$81 billion on food and clothing; but Federal, state, and local taxes cost the public \$84.6 billion. There can be no assured prosperity when taxes take more of the people's income than food and clothing.

* * *

Many panaceas are advanced.

Yet many in Washington feel no solution is possible until enforcement of anti-trust laws eliminates price fixing competition and taxes are cut. There has never been any substitute for a com-pletely free and open economy in

Texas needed another good soaking rain.

Thousands of the devout, and perhaps some of the not-so-devout, prayed for it Sunday in response to a plea from Governor Allan Shivers.

The governor urged ministers of all faiths and their congregations to "turn to the One who is the source of allhelp."

At the same time, Shivers telegraphed President Eisenhower to thank him and other officials of the administration for their speedy aid to drouth-stricken

From the White House had come word that the President would allocate \$8 million for emergency drouth relief in 152 Texas and Oklahoma counties.

The plan was to furnish feed at low prices, permit the railroads to grant lower rates on feed and cattle, and extend credit to ranchmen and farmers.

Simultaneously the Department of Agriculture announced that it would buy 200 million pounds of beef from cattlemen in the dry Southwest.

Secretary of Agriculture Benson hoped that this purchasing would remedy the "ruinously low prices" for cattle.

Growers using geese to keep strawberry beds free from weeds may soon be eating their geese if they switch to weeding with CRAG Herbicide-1.

When the Texas Federation of Labor convened at El Paso, delegates booed when a speaker charged that Governors Shivers of Texas, Thornton of Colorado, and Mechem of New Mexico were "state's righters last year when it was a matter of dough in the pocket, but this year, when it's a matter of drouth relief, they're quite willing to be Americans and accept relief from the central government."

Shivers led the Democratic revolt that gave the state to Eisenhower last year. Labor leadership generally was for Stevenson.

Could Mitchell and the other party leaders pull Texas back into line?

It was obvious that they were going to work hard to reach that goal.

And it was equally clear that the Republicans were going to fight them every inch of the way. They hoped to make outright party members of the Democrats who voted for Eisenhower, and they planned to put up candidates for every elective office.

It was easy to make one prediction: the Texas political battles of next year are going to be big and bitter.

NEW HIGH SALARIED GOV-ERNMENT POSITIONS: During the past several months there has one new secretaryship at a salary of \$22,500 yearly, two new undersecretaries at \$17,000 a year, 12 new assistant secretaries at \$15,000 \$14,800 a year, one new managing director at \$17,500, and one new deputy director at \$16,000 per year. The House on June 30th approved a new assistant secretary for the Post Office Department at a sal-

ary of \$15,000. Bills are presently pending to create four new assistant secretaries of Defense. The salaries for these jobs would be approximately \$15,000 to \$17,500 per year.

An interesting colloquy took place on the Floor of the House during the debate on the new assistant to the Post Office Department. Congressman Dowdy, of East Texas, had the floor and was asked by Congressman Bender of Ohio, the following question: "Is the gentleman aware of the fact that in the Defense Department alone, as a result of the creation of these new secretaries. over 60,000 people have been fired, which is pretty much the case in all the other departments of Gov-

Congressman Dowdy,s reply was as follows: "According to the reports I have, in March the number of people employed by the United States Government decreased by 20,000. Yet the salaries that month increased 60 million dollars, although 20,000 people were fired."

FEPC: It was announced by one Member of Congress just before this letter was written that the White House intends to set up an FEPC for the purpose of screening employees in organizations holding defense and other government contracts to see that no discrimination is practiced. This Congressman stated that such a commission would put a stop to what he charges as discriminatory practices on the part of The Navy.
