As soon as you collect a specimen, make an on-the-spot identification as to its class and other pertinent data. A book on shells, illustrated with colored plates, is an invaluable aid in classi-

Next, clean your shells promptly to avoid decomposition of animal parts. Start by boiling them to re-move fleshy parts. Boil smooth, highly polished ones only two minutes, others as long as 20 minutes. Remove remaining fleshy parts by delicate pulling and twisting. nally, do surface cleaning with stiff brush or a weak solution muriatic acid.




