





Comptroller Calvert estimated that if the state should collect taxes on cigarettes sold at army hurch posts in the state, the revenue would amount to about \$1 million per year. Other suggestions as to raising money for teachers included tax on natural gas to replace the levy recently declared invalid by the U.S. Supreme Court. But you can depend upon it .: any time a tax was suggested, the prospective victim rose up and sserted himself. For exemple, M. D. Bryant, president of the Texas Independent Producers and Royalty Owners Ass'n. promised that his group would fight any increase in the taxes on gas and oil. "One thing is certain," said Bryant. "Producers and royalty owners already pay more than their share of state taxes". TIPRO's reaction may be regarded as typical. Any business or industry which finds itself n the position of being eligible for taxation will indubitably ush to explain why it should not be taxed any more. Thus you can see that the job of the Legislature is going to be nothing like sitting under he peach tree waiting for the ruit to drop. 
