





WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

Some in Washington claim they see no great difference between this and former administrations.

While this viewpoint is debatable there is no doubt present Administration has been successal bringing businessmen into government. * * *

But business experience is of little use un-

less utilized. Such a problem faces Postmaster General Arthur Sum merfield, heading operation C.W. Harder doing \$2½ billion per year with a force of 552,194 employees.

The Post Office is a very fine service except for one thing.

It loses a lot of money every year. Losses now approach the billion per year mark. businessman can contemplate red figures with ease, even when red figures are forced by law.

* * * At present taxes subsidize much corporation advertising. * *

A first class letter costs three cents per ounce, or a rate of 48c per pound. The letter must be addressed to an individual. * * *

But big firms sending out advertising matter, coupons, and other material get a rate as low

as 10 cents per pound. * * * In addition, they need not be addressed. Just sent to "occupant" of the street, address and Post Office must deliver with reasonable promptness.

* * * Thus for $1\frac{1}{2}$ cents big firms can require U. S. postal service to be errand boys delivering advertising material right to the

them to every residence, the charge for this messenger service is only 10 cents per pound. But anyone sending by parcel

post a birthday present to Aunt Emma must pay 16 cents a pound if she is in the immediate locality, or 32 cents per pound if Aunt Emma lives at the opposite end of the nation.

Even mail order catalogs are tax-subsidized. While parcel post rates range from 18 to 32c for the first pound, and 1.45 to 18.05c for each additional pound, the big mail order catalog rate ranges from 10 to 18c for the first pound, 1.5c to 11c for each additional pound.

In other words, under the present laws, the general users of the postal service pay twice to subsidize the huge floods of direct mail advertising released by a few big corporations. The public pays both higher rates and taxes to make up deficit caused by huge flood of subsidized advertising.

* * * There is an attempt in Con-gress to remedy this to some degree. Congressman E. H. Rees, chairman of House Post Office Committee reports committee has recommended direct mail pieces now carried to householders for 1½ cents be raised to 2 cents. This would be partial solu-tion but still leaves direct mail advertising, especially in booklet and catalog form, enjoying a huge rate of subsidization.

* * * While doing more business is normally considered a way to prosper, Post Office can't even to handle large part of

present business. * * * But even proposed half cent in-crease on present huge volume would go long way to wipe out current losses. Naturally, there is strong opposition to this move
