





Dan roped that bull right in front of a hotel.

"People in New York don't know much about livestock, as a general rule. They didn't know what a dangerous situation that was. That bull wasn't a fighting bull, he was kind of a bucking bull, but he was a Brangus type. He might butt you, but he wasn't a bad hooking bull. He had little bitty short banana horns."

**D**an says the police were his biggest problem.

They ran up there and was going to shoot him. They were raising cain and going on. I had him on a fairly long nylon rope and he'd head for that revolving door into the hotel. There were some cars parked in front of the hotel and I'd ride over toward

those cars and pull him out of that revolving door and holler at the people to get back. Then he'd go toward the cars and I'd get in the revolving door almost and pull him back the other way.'

> Dan roped the bull on a street made of cobblestone. His horse's shoes created a fireworks display.

"When this big horse I was riding stopped after I roped the bull, it looked like you'd lit four cutting torches. Sparks were flying everywhere. We were going at a pretty good speed and had to stop real fast."

Dan put another rope on the bull, tied it securely to a jeep and followed it back to Madison Square Garden. The next day newspapers and radio stations across the country reported the events of the previous night. The story told how this Texas cowboy had acted bravely and saved countless lives. Dan's name was mentioned prominently in the

story, Since Dan had not heard any radio or read a newspaper that morning, he didn't know he was a hero until his friends started calling him.



**Reuniting with a long-lost sister** 

he sunlight reflecting off the bay is almost blinding as we approach the airport in Nelson, New Zealand. I am 11,000 miles from home and

about to see my sister Pamela for the second time in 50 years. The beauty of the island is breathtaking. Clear azure pools of water shimmer like diamonds surrounded by majestic purple peaks that form a bowl

around the bay. But I LINDA am almost too excited CHAVEZ to notice. As the wheels of our 30seater commuter

plane from Auckland touch down, I search the crowd gathered on the airport rooftop looking for her barely familiar face. The face I remember is of a chubby-cheeked, tow-headed girl of 5 who suddenly disappeared from my life in 1952. Pamela is my father's daughter from his first marriage to an Australian woman he met while fighting in the South Pacific during World War II. Her mother, Cecily, was an auburn-haired beauty who fell in love with the handsome 6-foot-2-inch airman from New Mexico and followed him back to the States. Exactly when my father met my mother and what role she played in the break-up of his first marriage is a subject not broached in the family. All I know is that Cecily was around during my early childhood. as was Pamela, whom I adored. There are pictures of us together

as little girls. We were like mirror images of each other. She was fairskinned and blond-haired with curls that dangled into her incredibly blue eyes, while I was darkhaired and brown-eyed, but with the same smile and features. We played together at my grandparents' home, a low adobe structure surrounded by hundreds of rose bushes and hollyhocks constantly abuzz with menacing bees.

Suddenly, Pamela was gone from my life, given up for adoption by her mother, who felt she could not raise a child alone in a strange country. Although I frequently asked what had become of my sister, I learned only that she had gone to live with a nice family in Clovis, N.M. I imagined her living on a farm with chickens and cows and lots of other brothers and sisters. When my father died in 1976, I again asked what had happened to Pamela, but my mother was evasive, and what information she provided proved unreliable. Every once in a while as an adult, I thought of seeking Pamela out; but I had so little information to go on, the task seemed impossible.

Then, one day in 2000, I was reading my e-mail when I came across a note from someone in New Zealand. "I am so sorry to be writing to you at work, but my mother, Cecily Little Chavez is ill," the letter opened. "It would mean a lot to her to hear from you," it said. "She moved back to Australia in 1970 and remarried in 1972. About four years ago, I moved to New Zealand from the United States with my husband –

we are retired and enjoying life in New Zealand.

I couldn't imagine who this person was or why she was writing me, thinking only how odd it was that whoever she was, her mother had the same name as my father's first wife. Then I read on. "I would very much like to be in contact with you. I can be reached at the address listed below. Fond regards from your sister Pamela.'

Through the miracle of the Internet I was reunited with a sister I had not seen or heard from in nearly a half century. In the intervening years, I had lost two brothers (sons from my mother's first marriage) and another sister, both grandparents and my father, but now I had my sister back. In the weeks and months that followed, we spent hours each day writing back and forth, filling each other in on the details of our lives. Later that year, Pamela and her husband, Gil, came to visit briefly. But this is our first visit to Pamela, and I am filled with anticipation.

As my husband and I step onto the tarmac, I see Pamela. She is taller and thinner than me, with hair shades lighter than my own, but the family resemblance is still there. And I wonder what my father would think to see his two daughters united once again in his beloved South Pacific isles.

Means to Me" (973 DOW H) can be checked out from the library. Here is a gripping account of the final American bombing mission of World War II and how it prevented a military coup that would have kept Japan in the war. "The Last Mission: The Secret Story of World War II's Final Battle" (940.5449 SMIT J), by Jim Smith and Malcolm McConnell, is an insightful piece of speculative investigation

that combines narrative storytelling with historical contingency and explores how two seemingly unrelated events could have profoundly changed the course of modern history.

Michael Beschloss in "The Conquerors: Roosevelt, Truman and the Destruction of Hitler's Germany' (940.5314 BES M) has provided an engaging narrative of key events leading up to the conferences at Yalta (Roosevelt, Churchill, Stalin) and Potsdam (Truman, Churchill, Stalin). His study draws on newly released documents from the former Soviet Union, the FBI and private archives. However, Beschloss has not unearthed very much that changes the historical record.

"Jarhead: A Marine's Chronicle of the Gulf War and Other Battles" (956.7044 SWO A) by \* Anthony Swofford tells you why boys go to war and how they return as men. It is an honest and compelling account of men and women at war in today's world.

A 1936 Olympian, Louis Zamperini, joined up to fight in World War II. As a bombardier, his life. changed forever when on May 27, 1943, his B-24 crashed into the Pacific Ocean. Adrift for 47 days on a raft, land is sighted, and they were captured by the Japanese. Zamperini spent two years as a POW. "Devil at My Heels" (940.5472 ZAM L) is his story. You will not be able to read it without tears in your eyes.

The tragic events that occurred on the aircraft carrier USS Forrestal in July 1967, while the ship's crew was preparing for an air strike against North Vietnam, ranks high with other

naval disasters at sea. Told through personal narratives of 12 eyewitness sailors, the book shows how through a series of accidents a misfire from a Phantom aircraft's Zuni rocket struck another aircraft on the flight deck, piloted by (later Senator) John McCain. The misfired rocket set off a series of explosions, some from 1,000-pound vintage World War II bombs already loaded on jets on the flight deck. The ensuing series of cataclysmic events caused a bloody carnage and loss of 134 men. "Sailors to the End: The Deadly Fire on the USS Forrestal," (959.7043 FRE G) written by Gregory A. Freeman. tells their story.

"War Torn: Stories of War" (959.7043 BAR T). edited by Tad Bartimus, is a fascinating book that chronicles the experiences of nine women reporters who covered the Vietnam War from 1966 until 1975. There was no censorship of war

coverage, and reporters even went on bombing missions, but there were concerns about allowing women journalists near the fighting because they were considered a distraction. This attitude led female reporters to fight for their right to cover the war, and they won, earning the privilege to face the same horrific, life-threatening situations as male reporters. Several of them, like the soldiers they covered, found some comfort in drugs, alcohol and sex. They also recall friendships with soldiers and the Vietnamese and their growing cynicism as the

controversial war continued. All nine share vivid recollections of danger, loss and anguish and relay how covering Vietnam changed their lives professionally and personally.



## Lee arrested in Atlanta Tuesday; ends 10-month manhunt across U.S.


ATLANTA (AP) - The man suspected in the killings of five Louisiana women spent at least a week before his arrest in an Atlanta motor lodge where he charmed residents, grilled ribs and chicken at a party, and set up a Bible study.

The arrest Tuesday of Derrick Todd Lee, 34, ended the manhunt in a case that terrified women across Louisiana and triggered a 10-month DNA dragnet in which police took cheek scrapings and swabbings from more than 1,000 men.

Lee was taken into custody by three Atlanta police officers about 8:30 p.m. Tuesday, Police Chief Richard Pennington said.

He said Lee could be returned to Louisiana as early as Wednesday



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McDowell and Swearingen won't have to worry too much about their performances in Hobbs. Both have already qualified for the college finals in




qualifier in Hobbs. Should he place in the top 10 in the bareback competition, he would qualify in that event as well. He was rated eighth in the Southwest this past season.
