With reservations, council OKs 9-1-1 amendment

Although they unanimously approved an amendment to the Howard County 9-1-1 Communications District's 2002-2003 budget, the Big Spring City Council also voted to draft and send a "letter of concern" to the district's board of directors and to

hire an independent management consultant to audit the board's management procedures.

The decisions were made at Tuesday evening's council meeting.

The amendment will hike the district's budget for the fiscal year by about \$26,000 — from \$250,539.76 to \$266,349.02. At the same time the



McEWEN the 9-1-1 District of about \$30,600.

amendment lowers revenue projections by about \$7,000 — from \$242,847.60 to \$235,963.00.

The figures add up to a budget deficit for

Big Spring Mayor Russ McEwen said although he voted for the amendment, he has reservations about the district's financial status.

"As I was months ago, I'm concerned," he said. "I was concerned then, I'm concerned now. Their budget as amended is upside-down \$31,000 and that does not include any principal payments (on

the district's loan for their new building) whatsoever. They're going to be dipping into their reserve and it can't continue that way."

District board member Tim Yeats was at the meeting to answer the council's questions. Yeats said \$15,000 of the hike was due to an unexpected

\$200,000 set as new Relay for Life target; Woods is recognized

It's officially \$174,138. Next year, let's aim for \$200,000.

That's the goal co-chairs Phyllis and Jeff Turney announced Tuesday for the American Cancer Society's 2004 Relay for Life fundraiser.

"Our first anniversary we raised \$20,000," Phyllis Turney spoke to the crowd of team captains

and Relay committee members gathered for the annual wrap up party at the First United Methodist Church. "For our 10th anniversary let's make it \$200,000."

"As giving as this community is — it's not about the huge bucks, it's about the \$10s, \$20s and \$100s and even the \$1 bills," Turney said. "I think we can do it. How about you?"

Jeff Turney admitted the goal is ambitious but

31 years after combat, former Cobra pilots enjoy opportunity to reminisce

Two U.S. Army veterans celebrated a 31-year reunion this week when they visited the newest addition to the Vietnam Memorial.

Neal Thompson, assistant state's attorney in Wheaton, Ill., and D.D. Shirley, a Houston Police Department sergeant with the homicide department, had a chance to view their old gunship, a Cobra attack helicopter.

"I have been looking for this the last 15 years," said Thompson. "Every place we landed there were Cobras, and there were some still flying that had been rebuilt into F-models, I would look for it. There were 67s, 68s and 66s but what is your chance of finding one of 1,200

something that were made?" A suggestion from a friend helped pave the way for the reunion.

"Right before Christmas I was talking about this and someone told me to put the type and tail number on the Internet and do a search," Thompson said. "I put the type and tail number in and bingo. It popped up."

Recently added to the memorial display, the helicopter was used in reconnaissance missions during

underwriters raised approximately \$11,000 more than last year's Relay for Life, said Diane Wood, outgoing co-chair who was hosting her last wrap up party.

"I say this every year but I am always amazed," said Wood. "I ask myself how do we do this year after year and it goes back to something I've said before, hardly any family hasn't been impacted by cancer in some way."

Officially, the 2003 Relay for Life event raised \$174,138 in net profit to be used for research, providing support for cancer victims through programs and education.

Teams raised the bulk of the money, \$128,234, Wood said.

During the event Tuesday, committee members handed out awards and certificates of recognition to team captains, underwriters and sponsors.

Scenic Mountain Medical Center Family Medical Center's team, Roundin' Up A Cure for Cancer, raised the largest amount of money as large team with \$19,214.85; Big Spring State Hospital's Mind, Body and Soul came first in the mid-size team with \$12,725; and Tawana's Troopers team raised the most for a small-size team with \$7,721.58.

Three teams received the bronze Starz of Texas medal, a state-wide

award, for raising at least \$200 per team member. They are the Roughriders from Knott, SMMC/Family Medical Center's Roundin' Up A Cure for Cancer and VA Medical Center's Vagabonds.

Receiving the silver Starz of Texas medal for raising at least \$350 per team member were Big Spring Independent School District's Yellow Dog Dare Devils, BSHS Mind, Body and Soul and Fuzzy's Crew.

Raising at least \$500 per team, Tawana's Troopers and Meagan's Angels received the gold Starz of Texas medal.

After six years as serving as the chair of the Relay for Life committee, Wood, who will be taking a chair on the state Relay

for Life task force, was honored for her years of service at the celebration.

As special recognition, Jeff Turney, on behalf of the committee, presented Wood and her husband, Ronnie, a paid weekend trip to Fredricksburg for their many hours of service.

Applications will be accepted through Sunday and can be dropped off at the admission's desk at the front entrance of the hospital, 300 Veteran's Boulevard.

The selection committee will begin reviewing applications Monday for the 12 available slots for this year's program, Hanslik said. After reviewing the applications, candidates will go through a brief interview process.

Participants in the program must be at least 14 years of age and commit at least 16 hours a week to the hospital.

The program, offered for the first time this year, provides a hands-on, in-depth view of the nursing field. Cadets/Cadettes are paired with a nurse dur-

ing the day as the nurse goes through his or her normal tasks.

Participants will have an opportunity to work in all areas of the hospital from emergency care to surgical during the six-week program which begins June 11 and runs to July 25.

shown, pilots like Shirley and Thompson would fly in and destroy what was on the ground.

"He and I knocked out two Russian tanks in that thing," Shirley said.

The two men only flew in the helicopter for five months but this airship seemed to stick in their minds.

"Sitting in that cockpit yesterday, (Sunday) was something that I have been frankly dreaming of doing for the last six months when I found out that the aircraft was down here," Thompson

said. "I first had some apprehension of feeling uncomfortable but when I sat back in the seat I felt just like I did back then," Shirley said. "I wanted to lift off the stand and go hunting."

Shirley was impressed with the condition of the helicopter.

"It looks better now than when we flew it," Shirley said. "It's a lot cleaner than when we

flew it. I noticed when we were up in the cockpit yesterday (Sunday) there were no beer cans in the cockpit."

"It was quite a thing to come around that corner and see this aircraft up on that stick," Thompson said. "That's what we call it. A Cobra on a stick."

The bull that terrified New York

Dan Taylor of Doole, Texas, is one of the most famous rodeo cowboys in the country. He is known in cowboy circles as Dooley Dan Taylor. He started riding at age two and roping at age five. He became the youngest roper in professional rodeo. He has won numerous awards and served as President of the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association. He has worked as a Chute Boss at the Cheyenne Frontier Days Rodeo since 1949.

In the early fifties, he was competing in the rodeo at Madison Square Garden in New York City when a bull got out.

"It was the last night of the rodeo and after the calf roping event, contestants were taking their horses out a side door so they could load up and leave," says Dan. "During the bull riding event, a bull jumped out of the chute and ducked out that side

door."

Dan took off after the bull.

"For about the first quarter of a mile or so I was just following him. People were screaming and pointing. Finally I got a chance to rope him. I roped him on the first toss of the rope right there on the Great White Way, Forty-Second and Broadway where there's a million people every night."

Dan roped that bull right in front of a hotel.

"People in New York don't know much about livestock, as a general rule. They didn't know what a dangerous situation that was. That bull wasn't a fighting bull, he was kind of a bucking bull, but he was a Brangus type. He might butt you, but he wasn't a bad hooking bull. He had little bitty short banana horns."

Dan says the police were his biggest problem.

"They ran up there and was going to shoot him. They were raising Cain and going on. I had him on a fairly long nylon rope and he'd head for that revolving door into the hotel. There were some cars parked in front of the hotel and I'd ride over toward

those cars and pull him out of that revolving door and holler at the people to get back. Then he'd go toward the cars and I'd get in the revolving door almost and pull him back the other way."

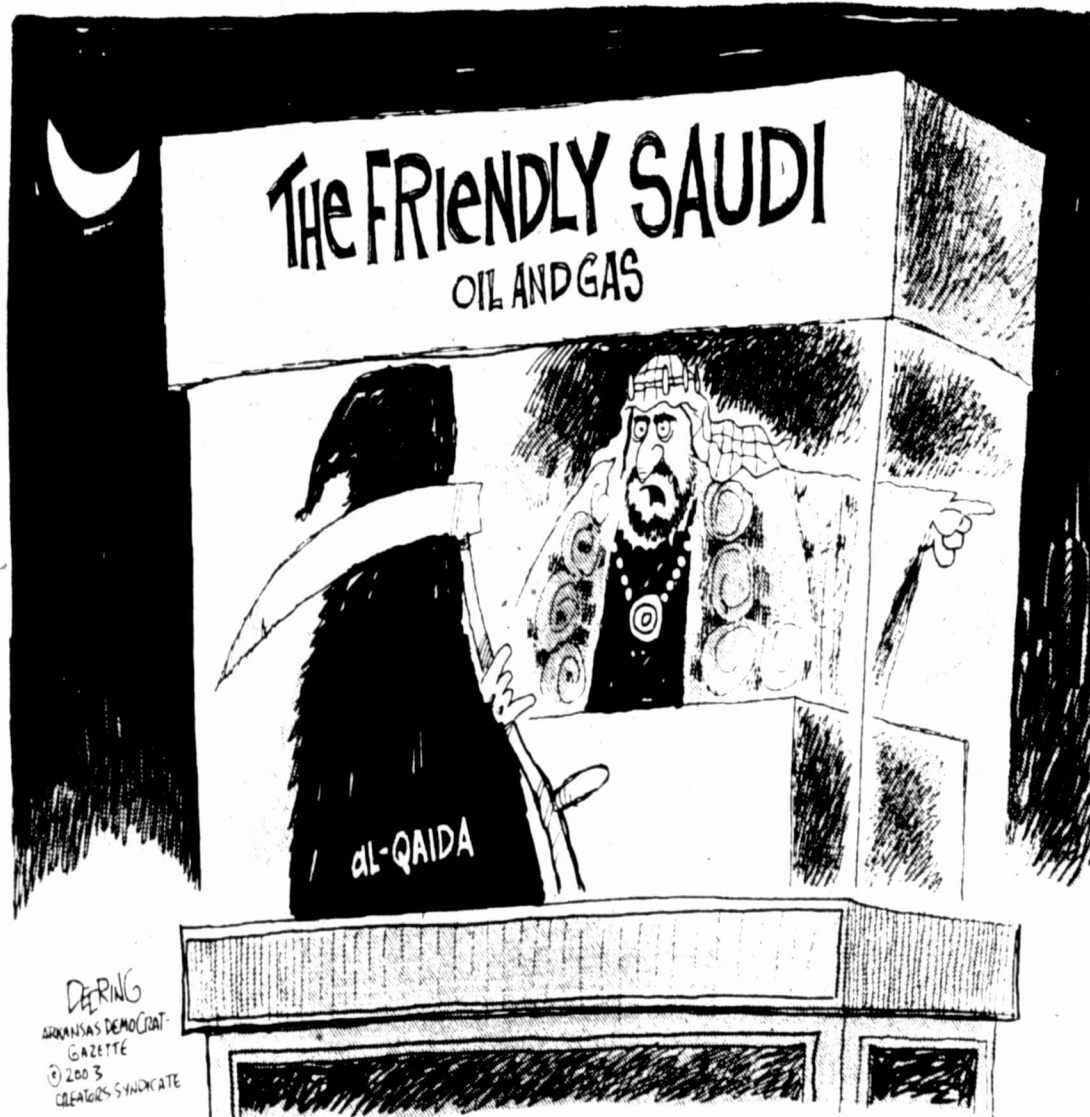
Dan roped the bull on a street made of cobblestone. His horse's shoes created a fireworks display. "When this big horse I was riding stopped after I roped the bull, it looked like you'd lit four cutting torches. Sparks were flying everywhere. We were going at a pretty good speed and had to stop real fast."

Dan put another rope on the bull, tied it securely to a jeep and followed it back to Madison Square Garden. The next day newspapers and radio stations across the country reported the events of the previous night. The story told how this Texas cowboy had acted bravely and saved countless lives. Dan's name was mentioned prominently in the story.

Since Dan had not heard any radio or read a newspaper that morning, he didn't know he was a hero until his friends started calling him.

Reuniting with a long-lost sister

The sunlight reflecting off the bay is almost blinding as we approach the airport in Nelson, New Zealand. I am 11,000 miles from home and about to see my sister Pamela for the second time in 50 years. The beauty of the island is breathtaking. Clear azure pools of water shimmer like diamonds surrounded by majestic purple peaks that form a bowl around the bay. But I am almost too excited to notice. As the wheels of our 30-seater commuter plane from Auckland touch down, I search the crowd gathered on the airport rooftop looking for her barely familiar face. The face I remember is of a chubby-cheeked, tow-headed girl of 5 who suddenly disappeared from my life in 1952.

Pamela is my father's daughter from his first marriage to an Australian woman he met while fighting in the South Pacific during World War II. Her mother, Cecily, was an auburn-haired beauty who fell in love with the handsome 6-foot-2-inch airman from New Mexico and followed him back to the States. Exactly when my father met my mother and what role she played in the break-up of his first marriage is a subject not broached in the family. All I know is that Cecily was around during my early childhood, as was Pamela, whom I adored. There are pictures of us together

as little girls. We were like mirror images of each other. She was fair-skinned and blond-haired with curls that dangled into her incredibly blue eyes, while I was dark-haired and brown-eyed, but with the same smile and features. We played together at my grandparents' home, a low adobe structure surrounded by hundreds of rose bushes and hollyhocks constantly abuzz with menacing bees.

Suddenly, Pamela was gone from my life, given up for adoption by her mother, who felt she could not raise a child alone in a strange country. Although I frequently asked what had become of my sister, I learned only that she had gone to live with a nice family in Clovis, N.M. I imagined her living on a farm with chickens and cows and lots of other brothers and sisters. When my father died in 1976, I again asked what had happened to Pamela, but my mother was evasive, and what information she provided proved unreliable. Every once in a while as an adult, I thought of seeking Pamela out; but I had so little information to go on, the task seemed impossible.

Then, one day in 2000, I was reading my e-mail when I came across a note from someone in New Zealand. "I am so sorry to be writing to you at work, but my mother, Cecily Little Chavez is ill," the letter opened. "It would mean a lot to her to hear from you," it said. "She moved back to Australia in 1970 and remarried in 1972. About four years ago, I moved to New Zealand from the United States with my husband —

we are retired and enjoying life in New Zealand."

I couldn't imagine who this person was or why she was writing me, thinking only how odd it was that whoever she was, her mother had the same name as my father's first wife. Then I read on. "I would very much like to be in contact with you. I can be reached at the address listed below. Fond regards from your sister Pamela."

Through the miracle of the Internet I was reunited with a sister I had not seen or heard from in nearly a half century. In the intervening years, I had lost two brothers (sons from my mother's first marriage) and another sister, both grandparents and my father, but now I had my sister back. In the weeks and months that followed, we spent hours each day writing back and forth, filling each other in on the details of our lives. Later that year, Pamela and her husband, Gil, came to visit briefly. But this is our first visit to Pamela, and I am filled with anticipation.

As my husband and I step onto the tarmac, I see Pamela. She is taller and thinner than me, with hair shades lighter than my own, but the family resemblance is still there. And I wonder what my father would think to see his two daughters united once again in his beloved South Pacific isles.

What's new at the library... with Hollis McCright

Memorial Day is the day that all Americans pause to remember what our fighting soldiers, men and women, fought for. In the spirit of remembrance, the library has prepared a special display of military books. They range from World War II to Vietnam and on to current day missions. I hope you find time to come to Howard County Library and check out these great books.

What is it to be an American? Is it simply to be born in the United States? Can one become an American by passing a test? Hugh Downs is a well-known television commentator and he asked this question "What my country means to me" of 150 Americans from all walks of life. One woman writes, "This means pride in my country... intellectual freedom... ability to obtain an education... to speak up when a wrong is done without the fear of being shot..." "My America: What This Country

Means to Me" (973 DOW H) can be checked out from the library.

Here is a gripping account of the final American bombing mission of World War II and how it prevented a military coup that would have kept Japan in the war. "The Last Mission: The Secret Story of World War II's Final Battle" (940.5449 SMIT J), by Jim Smith and Malcolm McConnell, is an insightful piece of speculative investigation that combines narrative storytelling with historical contingency and explores how two seemingly unrelated events could have profoundly changed the course of modern history.

Michael Beschloss in "The Conquerors: Roosevelt, Truman and the Destruction of Hitler's Germany" (940.5314 BES M) has provided an engaging narrative of key events leading up to the conferences at Yalta (Roosevelt, Churchill, Stalin) and Potsdam (Truman, Churchill, Stalin). His study draws on newly released documents from the former Soviet Union, the FBI and private archives. However, Beschloss has not unearthed very much that changes the historical record.

"Jarhead: A Marine's Chronicle of the Gulf War and Other Battles" (956.7044 SWO A) by Anthony Swofford tells you why boys go to war and how they return as men. It is an honest and compelling account of men and women at war in today's world.

A 1936 Olympian, Louis Zamperini, joined up to fight in World War II. As a bombardier, his life changed forever when on May 27, 1943, his B-24 crashed into the Pacific Ocean. Adrift for 47 days on a raft, land is sighted, and they were captured by the Japanese. Zamperini spent two years as a POW. "Devil at My Heels" (940.5472 ZAM L) is his story. You will not be able to read it without tears in your eyes.

The tragic events that occurred on the aircraft carrier USS Forrester in July 1967, while the ship's crew was preparing for an air strike against North Vietnam, ranks high with other

naval disasters at sea. Told through personal narratives of 12 eyewitness sailors, the book shows how through a series of accidents a misfire from a Phantom aircraft's Zuni rocket struck another aircraft on the flight deck, piloted by (later Senator) John McCain. The misfired rocket set off a series of explosions, some from 1,000-pound vintage World War II bombs already loaded on jets on the flight deck. The ensuing series of cataclysmic events caused a bloody carnage and loss of 134 men. "Sailors to the End: The Deadly Fire on the USS Forrester." (959.7043 FRE G) written by Gregory A. Freeman, tells their story.

"War Torn: Stories of War" (959.7043 BAR T), edited by Tad Bartimus, is a fascinating book that chronicles the experiences of nine women reporters who covered the Vietnam War from 1966 until 1975. There was no censorship of war

coverage, and reporters even went on bombing missions, but there were concerns about allowing women journalists near the fighting because they were considered a distraction. This attitude led female reporters to fight for their right to cover the war, and they won, earning the privilege to face the same horrific, life-threatening situations as male reporters. Several of them, like the soldiers they covered, found some comfort in drugs, alcohol and sex. They also recall friendships with soldiers and the Vietnamese and their growing cynicism as the

controversial war continued. All nine share vivid recollections of danger, loss and anguish and relay how covering Vietnam changed their lives professionally and personally.

ly large bill from Western Wireless for Phase 1 of integration of their cellular phone network into the 9-1-1 system. Phase 1 allows 9-1-1 operators to obtain the name and address of the owner and the phone number of any cell phone used to dial 9-1-1.

"The thing I heard tonight that I felt so good about was that some of the things that we were asking Mr. Yeats, he said, 'Yes, I've got concerns about that and I'm asking that kind of questions.' He's trying to get those answers. So, yes, I feel very good about Mr. Yeats. I visited also with James White who is the other municipality appointment to that board and he's doing an outstanding job also. There's some tough questions that have to be asked right now."

The council decided to hire certified public accounting firm Jansen and Gregorczyk to perform a management audit on the 9-1-1 district.

"We decided some months ago to look into the potential of having a management audit and we presented that to the 9-1-1 Board and they said, 'Yes, we'd like to look at that,'" McEwen said. "We're using the same management auditor that (the Colorado River Municipal Water District) uses and says does a great job for them."

The mayor said the audit will cost about \$10,000.

"We've basically underwritten it, but we will turn around and ask the other entities to help underwrite that," he said.

In discussion, the council made plans to approach the other entities involved in the 9-1-1 District.

Howard County and the cities of Coahoma and Forsan

to help pay for the audit. Council members plan to ask the county for \$2,000 and each city for \$500.

A letter from James P. Jansen of Jansen and Gregorczyk says that he will have to have the 9-1-1 Board's cooperation to perform the audit.

"I think we will get cooperation," McEwen said. "If we did not get cooperation on something like this which is an independent audit, that would say volumes right there. So I'm not concerned. I believe we will get cooperation. We'll have input as to some of the questions asked and some of the practices. Then at the end of the day, you've got somebody independent that says, 'This is what's actually going on.' It'll take some of the personalities out of it, I hope."

In other business, the council:

• Authorized a stop sign on Rackley yielding to Hudgins Memorial.

Lee arrested in Atlanta Tuesday; ends 10-month manhunt across U.S.

ATLANTA (AP) — The man suspected in the killings of five Louisiana women spent at least a week before his arrest in an Atlanta motor lodge where he charmed residents, grilled ribs and chicken at a party, and set up a Bible study.

The arrest Tuesday of Derrick Todd Lee, 34, ended the manhunt in a case that terrified women across Louisiana and triggered a 10-month DNA dragnet in which police took cheek scrapings and swabbings from more than 1,000 men.

Lee was taken into custody by three Atlanta police officers about 8:30 p.m. Tuesday, Police Chief Richard Pennington said.

He said Lee could be returned to Louisiana as early as Wednesday.

Residents at the Lakewood Motor Lodge said Lee had spent at least the last week there. Neighbors described him as a smooth talker who dated several women and promised them cognac if they would come to his room.

Acting on a tip received by the FBI, the Atlanta officers found Lee wandering around a tire shop in northwest Atlanta. They approached him and asked for identification, which Lee produced without incident. He was unarmed, Pennington said.

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — Nicole Kidman's televised cigarette puffing at the Cannes Film Festival has anti-smokers here fuming. Critics said the sight of the Oscar-winning Australian thespian lighting up in front of the world's media this week while promoting her new film, "Dogville," was free advertising for the tobacco industry. "Mass media coverage of celebrity smokers, like Nicole Kidman, is priceless for the tobacco industry in their drive to addict new smokers, most of whom are children," said Anne Jones, of the Action on Smoking and Health group in

Australia. At a media briefing, Kidman scammed a cigarette off her co-star, Stellan Skarsgard, only to be admonished by director Lars von Trier in front of the world's press. "Oh, Nicole, don't do that — you promised," von Trier said. Kidman coolly kept puffing. The images made major Australian news bulletins and were reported in Wednesday's newspapers. Wendy Day, Kidman's Australian publicist, said she hadn't spoken to the actress since the news conference. Kidman's hallowed position as one of Australia's greatest success stories made her a role model to young women, Jones argued. "We accept that Nicole Kidman has a right to smoke, but with celebrity comes a responsibility to avoid promoting lethal

and addictive products to young people," she said in a statement. Sen. Lyn Allison said the 35-year-old actress, who won an Academy Award this year for "The Hours," should use her profile to discourage younger people from taking up the habit. "Many of Nicole Kidman's fans are young women and they have particularly alarming rates of addiction to tobacco," she said in a statement.
