

Budget time: City council mulls merit raises

A merit-based pay scale for city employees led off discussion at a budget workshop held by the Big Spring City Council Wednesday

The council heard a report from Steve Condrey of Condrey and Associates, a consulting firm based in Athens, Ga., on how such a plan might be implemented.

"This is something the council requested us to do last year," said City Manager Gary Fugua. "They said that they would prefer to look at a merit-based system rather than across-the-board raises for our people. So a little bit later on we hired this consulting

"The good thing about it is it's very equitable, very fair. It helps keep down dissension in the ranks. It's a good setup."

firm to do a market analysis and kind of show us where we stand with regard to salaries for our people."

Condrey described a system where the performance of employees could be appraised

"People would have to meet standards for performance," he said. "If they meet those standards, they would be eligible for a merit increase if the city has money to fund it. If they were below standards, they would not receive an increase. And if their work was exceptional, there would be a chance for an additional increase beyond the normal one. So not only would the salary scale rise to keep pace with the market, but people, based on their performance, could build their salaries throughout their careers.'

cost estimate and possible locations for the project.

Airpark Manager Jim Little told the Moore Board that the study needs to be done quickly so plans for a rail spur could be included in the Texas Department of Transportation's blueprints for the new U.S. 87 reliever route which will run west of the airpark.

"It gives a great deal of potential for the development of the west side (of the airpark) and of the airpark in general," Little said. "Everybody just talks about the airport as having such great potential. This is an opportunity to help develop that potential by bringing another mode of transportation in."

Parkhill, Smith and Cooper's price quote for the study is \$19,800. Moore Board members voted 4-1 to fund half the cost of the study up to \$10,000. Tim Blackshear was the lone dissenting member. "My thought process



U.S. Nationals has the best in sport here

rightly-colored wings are already soaring in the skies around Big Spring as the nation's very best competitive hang gliders prepare for the U.S. Nationals Hang Gliding Championships at McMahon-Wrinkle Airpark.

The championships are scheduled for July 27 through Aug. 2 and will see approximately 60 pilots — both the best the United States has to offer and a sprinkling of strong international talent — vying for top honors.

Of course, one of the reasons the national championships are being staged in Big Spring is the reception members of the United States Hang Gliding Association received last year when the USHGA's U.S. Open was held here.

As was the case last year, competition in the week-long event will begin on Sunday and will continue through Saturday. Gliders will take off between noon and 2 p.m. each day, taking part in what USHGA spokesman David Glover calls "three-dimensional yacht races in the sky."

Clearly, this will be one of the top hang gliding events in the United States this year and spectators are welcomed to show up at the airpark and take in the competitions.

Concessions will be available, but as was the case last year, spectators are welcome to bring their folding chairs, sunshades and coolers with drinks.

Pilots taking part in the competition are involved in timed "out-and-return" events, as well as distance competitions.

Hang gliders compete in three divisions — flex wing gliders, rigid wing gliders that sport stabilizers and flaps much like a plane and the even more aerodynamic "Swift" class.

The gliders are here in Big Spring because this area boasts excellent natural qualities for hang gliding. This portion of West Texas has the geography and weather necessary for excellent soaring conditions.

And while competitors are here and preparing for this weekend's start of competition, local residents interested in taking a ride on an ultralight aircraft or soar on a tandem hang glider can do so. Ultralight flights are \$50 each and tandem hang glider flights are \$75. Appointments can be made by calling the airpark manager's office at 264-2362.

Even if you're not as adventurous as others, there's still plenty to see over the next week at the airpark. Take some time and spend a few hours or maybe even a whole day watching the best hang gliders in the world.

And while we're at it, we here at the Herald want to welcome all the U.S. Nationals participants. We hope you enjoy your stay here in Big Spring and hope you return for many years to come.

Dear Lord, heal our souls, repair our dreams and set us upon solid ground.

Banning Scout judges underhanded move

he issue starts with the bogus argument, advanced by former President of the Bar Association of San Francisco Angela Bradstreet, that judges shouldn't be Boy Scouts

because they may not appear to be impartial in cases involving homosexuals. It's a smarmy guilt-by-association argument: The Scouts bar gay Scout leaders, so Scout/judges are suspect — even if Bradstreet couldn't name a single instance in which a

behaved when we talked last year. That's when San Francisco Superior Court judges, to their undying shame, unanimously voted to bar Scout judges. Other local bars followed suit. The local rules, however, had no legal force, so the anti-Scouts asked the California Supreme Court to bar Scouts from the bench statewide. Last month, Chief Justice Ron

George released what has been touted as a compromise measure: Judges can be Scouts, but they have to disclose their membership or recuse themselves in cases "in some circumstances" — that is, cases involving sexual orientation.

Before I beat up on the decision, let me give George and the justices who voted unanimously for the compromise their due. They must recognize the Code of Judicial Ethics, which says, "A judge shall not hold membership in any organization that practices invidious discrimination on the basis of race, sex, religion, national origin

or sexual orientation." The code then exempts "membership in a nonprofit youth organization" — a loophole designed to shield the Boy Scouts.

There was, however, good reason to shield the Boy Scouts. The Boy Scouts are prohibited by law from discriminating in hiring, but the U.S. Constitution's protection of freedom of association allows the group to exclude homosexuals as members — whether the Scouts want to keep sexual tension out of troop activities, or whether the group wrongly believes homosexuality is immoral. (For the record, I disagree with the Scouts.)

The Constitution also protects religions — many of which discriminate based on gender. There is a religious angle in the Scout case, as many adults participate in scouting through their churches, mosques or temples.

That's why the so-called compromise is a dangerous cave-in. It allows a group of liberal lawyers to isolate judges who don't toe the gay-advocacy line.

Now, once a judge says he's a Scout, he knows his every move can be challenged. Someday, if a Scout/judge can't be trusted to appear impartial, then devout Muslim and Catholic judges won't be trusted, either.

Every day, judges preside over trials of defendants who already have been convicted for stealing or killing; somehow they manage to be impartial. It's hysterical to suggest that impartiality can't be counted on because a judge is a Boy Scout.

Sacramento attorney James Sweeney called the new rule "viewpoint discrimination." Sweeney represents Catholic

Charities in its efforts to be exempted from a state law that requires employer-paid drug plans to offer birth control to employees even though that violates church doctrine. (Again, I disagree with the church position — but then tolerance means recognizing the rights of others to be wrong.)

Here's another concern: If gay plaintiffs question the impartiality of a judge who is a Scout, shouldn't devout Catholics fear a judge who is a member of the National Organization for Women? Or worse, the Bar Association of San Francisco?

I asked Beth Jay, chief attorney for Chief Justice George, whether the rules would apply to a NOW judge and the Catholic Charities case. "It might be that a member of NOW would have to disclose that in a Catholic Charities case. " Jay answered.

OK, but the activists targeted the Boy Scouts. Not NOW.

They allegedly did so to make the public more confident in the courts' impartiality. (Insert laughter. Bitter laughter.) The Supreme Court ruling only serves to make those who aren't politically correct less confident in the courts' impartiality.

The anti-Scouters aren't even honest. They don't want impartiality. They want to chase apostates off the bench.

Too bad the top court won't stand up to them.

uch of Washington was stunned last month when President Bush's chief counterterrorism expert resigned with a blast of criticism and then joined Democratic Sen. John Kerry's campaign for president. The shock

among a knowledgeable few was even greater when an intimate adviser of Janet Reno as the Clinton administration's attorney general was named to a similar high-ranking terror-

ism post. Defector Rand

Beers's post as senior director for Combating Terrorism remains vacant. However, on May 27, Frances Fragos Townsend was named deputy national security adviser for Combating Terrorism. The announcement obscured the fact that she had been a Democratic political appointment who was partially blamed by erstwhile Justice colleagues for failure to investigate alleged Sept. 11 terrorist Zacarias Moussaoui. A

White House official told me Townsend considers herself a career government employee and a "lifelong Republican," with no responsibility for the Moussaoui fiasco.

Careful political screening by the Bush operation for routine appointments seems to have broken down in filling highly sensitive terrorism posts. The Democratic establishment, probing for soft spots in the president's armor, is claiming a misdirected war against terrorism. Bush has already suffered from one enemy

within, and now risks another. Resignation of a senior national security aide on policy grounds followed by defection to the political opposition is unprecedented.

The selection last August of Beers to replace resigned veteran terrorism expert Dick Clarke raised evebrows on Capitol Hill. Career foreign service officer Beers repeatedly tangled with House Republicans over how to fight narcoterrorists in Colombia.

Beers, a registered Democrat. vigorously promoted President Clinton's cautious line on Colombian policy as his assistant secretary of state for International Narcotics and Law Enforcement Affairs. He owed Clinton for saving his career in 1997, when White House aides wanted to sack him as a National Security Council staffer for failing to give the president FBI reports about illegal campaign contributions from China. Beers holding a highly sensitive post in a Republican administration was an accident bound to happen.

As Beers joined the Kerry campaign by attacking Bush, extreme care would have been expected in making further appointments. That is why the Townsend selection was so stunning to officials who knew her at the Justice Department.

Townsend began her government career in 1985 as a local prosecutor in Brooklyn, working under District Attorney Elizabeth Holtzman, a prominent liberal Democratic activist. Three years later. Townsend moved to the U.S. attorney's office in Manhattan notoriously liberal-laden amid a Republican administration. Townsend's boss and patron there was Jo Ann Harris, whose orientation was liberal Democratic.

When Attorney General Reno in 1993 summoned Harris to Washington as assistant attorney general running the Criminal Division, Harris immediately brought Townsend along as her aide. Townsend was promoted to oversee international law enforcement and then became counsel to the attorney general for terrorism and head of the Office of **Intelligence Policy and Review** (OIPR) — a political Reno appointment for a supposed career slot.

The line between career and political appointments at Justice has been blurred, but Townsend was viewed by old timers at Justice as part of the Reno inner circle. Her critics partially blame Townsend for changes in operation of the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act (FISA) that they claim inhibited sharing of information between intelligence and prosecution.

That shortcoming was corrected by Attorney General John Ashcroft, but not before the failure to investigate Moussaoui prior to Sept. 11. The White House official told me that Townsend had tried to correct FISA shortcomings, but that is not the version by former Justice colleagues. Ashcroft sent Townsend to the Coast Guard as assistant commandant for Intelligence, where she remained until her appointment as the president's adviser on counterterrorism.

Townsend did not return my telephone calls. The White House official representing her said National Security Adviser Condoleezza Rice obtained endorsements of her by Ashcroft, FBI Director Robert Mueller and CIA Director George Tenet.

"I am absolutely astonished," a former Justice Department told me when he was informed of her claims to being a lifelong Republican. With Democrats in full cry against Bush's conduct of the war against terrorism, the president can only hope Fran Townsend is not another Randy

Family members empty Dennehy's apartment in Waco

more than a month of holding out hope that missing Baylor basketball player Patrick Dennehy would be found alive, his family went to his apartment to remove his belongings Wednesday.

The police search for his body was delayed because of rain Wednesday morning, but authorities said they planned to keep searching sites given to them by Dennehy's former teammate and roommate, Carlton Dotson, now charged with murder.

Dennehy's mother and stepfather, Valorie and Brian Brabazon, along with their daughter Wyn and the player's girlfriend Jessica De La Rosa, went to the third-floor apartment Wednesday, the day after arriving in Waco.

The apartment complex with well-manicured lawns, swimming pool and sand volleyball court is across the street from the gold-domed Ferrell Center, where Dennehy hoped to play this winter. He sat out last season after transferring from New Mexico last year, as mandated by NCAA rules.

Brian Brabazon said the group planned to talk to police about the case and tour the Baptist-affiliated Baylor University campus. He declined further comment.

"We appreciate your concern, but today we'd like to do what we have to do as a family," he told news reporters gathered outside a Waco hotel.

Earlier Wednesday, told Brabazon Associated Press that Dennehy's mother was "very upset." Since Dennehy was last seen in mid-June, relatives have said they believed he could be alive.

Two campus ministers spent several hours with the family Wednesday, said a Baylor spokes-Lori woman, Fogleman.

Brabazon Wednesday that he was not sure if the family would meet with athletic department officials during their Waco trip. He and his wife have said that Dennehy had been threatened shortly before his disappearance and reported the threats to his coaches.

Lawyers may not prevent Texas' request for Dotson

CHESTERTOWN, Md (AP) + Carlton Dotson's lawyers have little chance of blocking his extradition to Texas. legal experts said.

In Maryland, grounds for battling extradition leave little leeway for the governor or a judge to deny request to return Dotson to Texas — where he could face the death penalty.

"Absent the legal equivalent of lightning, Dotson is going to Texas." Michael A. Millemann, a University of Maryland law professor, told The (Baltimore) Sun.

Dotson, 21, was arrested Monday night on a Texas murder charge after, authorities said, he admitted killing Patrick Dennehy, an ex-roommate and teammate who has been missing for more than a month. Dotson, who lives in Hurlock, is being held without bail in the Kent County Detention Center.

A hearing on Dotson's extradition is set for Aug. 19, said Teresa C. Shelton, a clerk in the criminal section for the District Court in Kent County. That hearing is designed to provide an update on the proceed-ings in which Dotson can waive extradition or challenge it. If he challenges extradition, the recommendation is made by an assistant attorney general to the governor.

Dennehy never reported any threats to the coaching staff.

Brabazon also said police have told family members that Dotson provided investigators with three locations to search Dennehy's body. Authorities searched gravel pits south of Waco and along the river banks Tuesday.

Police Sgt. Ryan Holt said Wednesday afternoon that he would not release any more information about searches or other details about the case the rest of the day.

Dotson, 21, was charged Monday night with murder after he told FBI agents in Maryland that he shot his teammate in the head after Dennehy tried to shoot him, according to the arrest warrant.

Rangers put Gonzalez on 15-day disabled list

ARLINGTON (AP) -Juan Gonzalez was placed on the 15-day disabled list Wednesday because of a strained right calf, a move that could hamper attempts by Texas to trade the two-time AL MVP before next week's deadline.

The move is retroactive to Sunday, a day after Gonzalez left the Rangers' game at Tampa Bay after getting hurt while running the bases.

Gonzalez was at the ballpark, but wasn't in the clubhouse before the Rangers' game against Anaheim and didn't participate in batting practice.

Texas purchased the contract of first baseman

Jason Jones from Triple-A Oklahoma. He was in the starting lineup as the designated hitter for his major league debut.

Manager Showalter said Gonzalez wouldn't be ready to play again for at least a week. But Showalter doesn't believe that will make it impossible to trade the slugger who is hitting .294 with 24 homers and 70 RBIs in 82 games.

The Rangers have made it clear that they don't plan to re-sign Gonzalez, who is eligible for free agency after this season. Texas and Montreal agreed to a tentative trade, but Gonzalez used his no-trade clause to block that deal.





In 1783, Latin American revolutionary Simon Bolivar was born in Caracas, Venezuela. In 1862, the eighth presi-

dent of the United States, Martin Van Buren, died in Kinderhook, N.Y

In 1866, Tennessee became the first state to be readmitted to the Union after the Civil War.

In 1923, the Treaty of Lausanne, which settled the boundaries of modern Turkey, was concluded in Switzerland. In 1929, President Hoover

proclaimed the Kellogg-Pact, Briand which renounced war as an instrument of foreign policy. In 1937, the state of

Alabama dropped charges against five black men accused of raping two white women in the Scottsboro

In 1952, President Truman announced a settlement in a 53-day steel strike.

In 1959, during a visit to the Soviet Union, Vice President Richard M. Nixon engaged in a "kitchen debate" with Soviet leader Nikita Khrushchev at a U.S. exhibition.

In 1974, the U.S. Supreme Court unanimously ruled that President Nixon had to turn over subpoenaed White House tape recordings to the Watergate special prosecutor.

In 1997, retired Supreme Court Justice William J. Brennan died in Arlington, Va., at age 91.


