Maynard is best know as one of "Hollywood" Joe Namath's favorite receivers on the Jets' 1969 Super Bowl championship


Maynard also played under the likes of legendary coach Vince

Stunt flying performances real thrill for Jan Collmer

Flying isn't Jan Collmer's career, it's his life.

The former Navy aviator landed at the Commemorative Air Force (CAF) hangar at Midland International Airport Friday morning, taking part in a press conference promoting next weekend's Alon USA and Fina-sponsored Airsho 2003.

Collmer, along with his Fina Extra 300L, is one of several dozen pilots scheduled to perform during the upcoming show.

Collmer said the Airsho represents an opportunity to not only fly, but to entertain a special group of people he admires.

"I love this air show. I stay in practice, and I'm ready to fly any time you say go. Takes me about three or four minutes to be in the air," Collmer laughed. "My wife says I would do a show for a oneeyed cow and an old dog, and that's about right.

"The neat thing about this show is that it's the show where World War II veterans show up in big numbers, and their numbers are declining these days at a pretty terrible rate. You can come out here

McEwen offers a cooperative plan to bolster veterans' care

EL PASO — A publicprivate coalition between the Big Spring VA Medical Center and area physicians to provide specialty care to veterans could be a model for VA hospitals nationwide, according to Big Spring Mayor Russ McEwen.

McEwen proposed the concept during his testim o n y Thursday in front of a five-member Capital Assessment

panel at Fort Bliss. According to McEwen. recruiting and retaining qualified doctors is not just a rural area issue for VA hospitals. Large hospitals are also dealing with the problem.

Scenic Mountain Medical Center has been successful in recruiting 11 doctors in the past 10 years to Big Spring in specialties ranging from family practice to vascular surgery, McEwen said.

McEwen noted several private physicians in the area were willing to become associated with the Big Spring VA Hospital to provide services.

The mayor outlined a public-private coalition between the Big Spring VA hospital and area physicians to provide specialty care without having to send veterans on long trips out of town.

"For a real life example, today a cardiologist is interested in locating to Big Spring and a working relationship with the VA hospital would enhance this ability to attract this doctor," McEwen said. "Additionally, cardiology could be offered by VA Big Spring with no addi-

AUSTIN — What started as a frenzy between **Democrats** and Republicans could be determined by roughnecks and cotton farmers.

West Texans in Midland and Lubbock are at the center of a Republican legislative stalemate over congressional redistrict-

ing. Republican House Speaker Tom Craddick of Midland said he's not negotiating over the design of West Texas' congressional districts. Republican Sen. Robert Duncan of Lubbock, chair the Senate Jurisprudence Committee that is tackling redistricting, says he won't vote on a map his constituents

don't like. "He's got to decide whether he wants to have redistricting. Are we going to have redistricting (or) are we going to have Midland?" Duncan said of Craddick. "Is this about Texas or is this about Midland?"

Craddick spokesman Bob Richter replied that once the Senate approves a redistricting map, a conference committee will work out differences and "try to pass a map that a majority of people can live with."

The full Senate is expected to take up redistricting early this week.

Craddick, who favors a map adopted Wednesday by the House, wants his home of Midland to anchor a district that could support a congressional representative separate from Lubbock.

Duncan says his constituents strongly oppose a Midland district, but he's searching for a solu-

Craddick, Duncan, House Majority Leader Tom DeLay of Texas and Republican state Sen. Todd Staples of Palestine, who authored the map under consideration in the Senate, met earlier this month to look for a compromise.

Craddick said he's upset because Duncan reneged on a deal the two struck in May, amid a tight runoff election between Neugebauer and a congressional candidate from Midland.

At the time, redistricting was gaining steam in the Legislature and both Craddick and Duncan were concerned that, whichever candidate won the expensive West Texas runoff, a new redistricting map could possibly eliminate the seat.

The agreement, Craddick said, would have given both Midland and Lubbock "pancake districts," stretching from east to west, so that either candidate would have the opportunity to maintain his seat after a redistricting map had been adopt-

Duncan said although he discussed the map with Craddick, no agreement was reached.

"I told him personally that I didn't have an objection to it, but we both agreed that we would forward it to (Neugebauer and the candidate from Midland for input). My feedback was that it was not as favorable to the constituents I represent as I initially thought," Duncan said.

After that, 51 Texas House Democrats fled to Ardmore, Okla., and redistricting died during the regular legislative session. The Legislature has since attempted redistricting during three special sessions, including one in which Senate Democrats fled to New Mexico to block a quorum.

With the Democrats back and the clock running in a third special session called by Gov. Rick Perry, Republican quarreling could be the obstacle to passing redistricting.

"They fight among They're themselves. debating among themselves. They do not even have the votes for a redistricting plan," said Sen. Judith Zaffirini, a Laredo Democrat. "Governor Perry should not have called a special session without the votes in place for a redistricting plan."

very once in a while, the Texas Legislature surprises us with a little bit of what can only be called insanity. And no, the current third special session and battle over congressional redistricting isn't the focus here.

Instead, one has to wonder what our lawmakers were thinking when they enacted a new law governing how the license plates on our cars are displayed. The new law, which took effect on Sept. 1, could

almost be considered the state sneaking a fast one past

According to the law, if a license plate bracket or device obstructs the visibility of the license plate, touching any of the letters or numbers or altering the design of the plate, it will be considered probable cause for a traffic stop.

The new law, which began as Senate Bill 439, covers

It states motorists may not add emblems, reflective materials, lights, or anything that changes the color of the license plate. And, the name of the issuing state must be visible.

Howard County Justice of the Peace Kathryn Weisman says motorists could face an \$85 fine for their "decorative" license plates.

To our way of thinking, that's probably not enough of a fine for those who intentionally try to cover up their license plates in an attempt to evade or cover up another transgression from law enforcement person-

But a license plate frame that simply touches the letters on a plate seems to be somewhat of a stretch.

Literally enforced, the new law makes a great many, if not almost all of the license plate frames auto dealerships put on vehicles they've sold cause for a traffic

Like most motorists who are now taking a long look at their license plates, we feel compelled to scratch our heads and wonder...

It's not about the punch cards

he infamous Ninth Circuit of the U.S. Court of Appeals in San Francisco ruled Monday that the very

"punch_card" ballots were good enough to elect Gray Davis governor in November aren't good enough to be used in an election that might recall him.

three_judge The panel's rationale: An Oct. 7 recall would the 14th violate Amendment of the U.S. Constitution because six counties representing 44 per-

cent of the voters would use punch_card ballots, which are deemed less reliable than other ballots. The ruling noted that "the affected counties contain a significantly higher percentage of minorities than the other counties" and cited a study that found that minority voters had more problems voting using punch cards than white, non_Hispanic voters. The panel ruled that the recall

election should be postponed until March 2, 2004, when all counties should have replaced their punch_card systems. The judges also noted that former California Secretary of State Bill Jones, a Republican, "officially" deemed punch cards to be "unacceptable."

Wrong, bristled Jones on Monday. Jones noted that after Florida 2000, he pushed for California to modernize its balloting systems by 2006. The ACLU and other organizations sued the state to dump punch_card ballots more

quickly. A federal judge in Los Angeles picked March 2004 as the deadline _ and the parties agreed.
"If I had thought these systems

were so egregious, I would not have" suggested keeping punch cards until 2006, said Jones. He asked: If the ACLU believed that punch_card ballots disenfranchised voters, "why didn't they appeal that decision" for the 2002 elections?

The answer: As far as I'm concerned, the issue wasn't replacing the punch cards. It was that the ACLU wanted to muck up the recall election, and the Ninth Circuit wanted to help.

As UCLA law professor Daniel Lowenstein noted, "There are many elections scheduled for November 2003, including a recall election in the city of Lynwood" (which lies in one of the six counties, Los Angeles) "and I'm not aware of anyone who's objected to the use of punch_card ballots in those sys-

A former aide to Jerry Brown when he was secretary of state, Lowenstein described the Monday ruling as "one of the worst instances of judicial interference with elections that I've ever seen, and I've been active in this field for about 30 years."

Elections attorney Chip Nielsen warned that the replacement ballot systems could be worse than punch cards _ because voters and registrars aren't familiar with them. Lowenstein agreed that the new ballot systems could be as problematic as punch cards.

This is another Ninth Circuit horror story. Consider how in 1996, federal judge Thelton Henderson __ a former ACLU board member _ unilaterally overruled Proposition SYNDICATE, INC.

209, which ended racial preferences in state hiring, contracting and admissions. Proposition 209, which was approved by voters, was based on 1964 federal civil rights law. A Ninth Circuit panel overturned the ruling on appeal. It should act likewise __ and quickly __ with this can of worms and spare California from the U.S. Supreme Court stepping in. As Nielsen noted, this decision spells "pure chaos."

While the ruling noted the need for "orderly" elections, it in itself is a recipe for disorder.

Should counties throw out the absentee ballots of those who have already voted _ or should they let every vote count? No one knows.

On the very first paragraph of the 66_page ruling, the Ninth Circuit judges misquoted Bill Jones, who never said the punch_card system was "unacceptable." (He said it was outdated.) They took a decades_old voting mechanism that helped elect the presidents who appointed them and decided that it was so unreliable as to justify their decision to postpone a scheduled election in which some citizens already had voted.

If punch ballots are so "unacceptable," they should recuse themselves, having won their place on the bench through such a discredited system. But if it's good enough for them, it's good enough for the recall.

Name recognition no problem


he Democratic presidential in place. candidates can't catch a break. They have been campaigning approximately forever, they have met in debates and forums more than 20 times, and most people still can't name a single one of them.

Out in California, on the other hand, where citizens eventually will vote on whether to recall their governor, name recognition is no problem.

Everybody knows that Arnold Schwarzenegger is running for governor, and because of his bodybuilding and acting career, he enjoys a huge advantage over the other 134 candidates on the ballot.

I recently flew to Fresno, Calif., to hear Schwarzenegger speak to schoolchildren, and as I walked through the airport, I noticed a Terminator 2 pinball machine yes, they still play pinball in Fresno that featured a large color picture Schwarzenegger.





they say, is publicity. The chaotic California race was thrown even deeper into pandemonium on Monday, when the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals ruled that the vote should not take place on Oct. 7, as scheduled, because major population centers in California still use punch-card ballots, the kind they used in Florida that led to all those hanging chads.

The ruling was by a three-member panel, and the panel stayed its own order for seven days to allow an appeal to the full 11-member Ninth Circuit Court or directly to the U.S. Supreme Court, the same court that decided the Florida con-

The election could be delayed until the regular March 3, 2004, California presidential primary, when new voting machines will be

This would almost certainly help California's governor, Gray Davis, a Democrat, since the Democratic presidential race might be a lot hotter then and presumably will draw Democrats to the polls, while President Bush is currently rununopposed, and Republicans might not come out.

It also removes one Schwarzenegger's advantages: The recall was supposed to be a quick race that was not going to get bogged down in issues or a lot of debates. Schwarzenegger has accepted only one debate invitation — one in which the candidates will get the questions in advance.

But if the recall election is delayed until March, Schwarzenegger really refuse to meet his opponents face-to-face time and time again? Can he really avoid making and defending detailed policy statements on the major issues?

His campaign already has run into unexpected problems. Polls show him trailing the far less colorful, but equally determined, Bustamante. Then, McClintock, who is liked by conservatives, refused to drop out in favor of Schwarzenegger. The latter is especially important. Schwarzenegger wanted McClintock out before 2 million absentee ballots were placed in the mail, but that happened last week and McClintock is not only still in, but insisting he will never bow to the Terminator.

The Schwarzenegger camp is being brave about it, but they fear the arithmetic: If there is one prominent Democrat, Bustamante, running against two prominent Republicans, Schwarzenegger and McClintock, the Republican vote could be split and the Democrat could win.

"We can win with the current field, but there is no question the math gets simpler if the field continues to consolidate around Arnold," Rob Stutzman, Schwarzenegger's spokesman, says. 'We're confident that at the end of the day, Sen. McClintock will do the right thing and not imperil a Republican victory."

But a bigger peril to a Republican victory may be the woman's vote in a state where women make up 52

a recent Schwarzenegger leads Bustamante narrowly among men, but trails him by a whopping 13 points among women. Why? One reason may be the violence in some Schwarzenegger movies, but anothmay be Schwarzenegger's recent ments, such as an interview in Entertainment Weekly dated July 11, in which he talks about his movie "Terminator 3: Rise of the Machines" and says, "How many times do you get away with this to take a woman, grab her upside down and bury her face in a toilet bowl?"

One time too many from a politi-

cal standpoint. The California election is confusing because it is really two elections. Question One asks voters whether they want to recall Davis as governor. A simple majority will determine his fate. Question Two asks voters to select among 135 names for his replacement. All that is needed to win here is a plurality. In other words, Davis could get 49.99 percent of the vote on Question One and lose his job to a person who gets 30 percent of the vote on Question Two.

Unfair? Especially since Davis was re-elected only last November and no charges of any kind have been brought, let alone proved, against him? His campaign sure thinks so.

"Recalls were designed for malfeasance or criminality, not for bad economies and budgets shortfalls," says Davis spokesman Peter Ragone.

On Monday, Davis was asked about the appeals court decision that could delay the election. "This recall has been like a roller coaster," he said. "It has more surprises than you can possibly imagine."

And I get a funny feeling that, California being California, more could be on the way.

With the fall of the Philippines, more than 70,000 became Japanese prisoners of war (POW). They were comprised of 50,000 Filipino and 20,000 American soldiers, sailors, and airmen, not to mention the civilian internees.

At the end of World War II, nearly 37 percent of all POWs lost their lives as a result of harsh, and often sadistic, treatment from their Japanese captors.

Officially the United States Government presented each surviving POW the monetary sum of \$1 a day for each day

Men such as Lynn Preslar, a POW from battle the Corregidor, had to fight to get assistance for a multitude of health maladies resulting from their months, and sometimes years, of captivity.

Preslar came home with such health problems as malnutrition, bronchitis, pneumonia, vitamin deficiency, chronic dysentery, pellagra, helminthiasis, neuritis. neurosis, pyorrhea (teeth loss), tropical ulcers, hearing loss, malaria fevers, dengue fevers which are sudden onset of fever producing severe headache, myalgias arthralgias, leukopenia, thrombocytopenia and hemorrhagic manifestations. These types of fever, spread by day-biting mosquitoes, produce shock and hemorrhage,

leading to death. Other health probsuffered lems by Preslar were extreme dehydration, body lice, fleas. body Beriberi, a vitamin deficiency disease, caused by inadequate bodily stores of thiamine, (Vitamin B1). It can damage the heart and nervous system. There was no medicine, no medical instruments, no anesthesia for surgery, no water for bathing 90 percent of the time and no clothes furnished 99

percent of the time. There was no soap. no toilet articles such as razors or mirrors. "You could take things you found and sharpen them on a section of leather from your shoes and manage to shave," Preslar said. was rough, but it


could be done."

Also there was no mail for three years, so for 40 months there was no news of what turns the war was taking. And there was an average of two beatings a month, which, for Preslar equaled to 80 beatings in 40 months.

Preslar continues to suffer from a shell fragment embedded in his right leg muscle.

Preslar is a live-in patient at the Veterans Administration Hospital in Big Spring. He still suffers from bronchitis and wears a bag as a result of major surgery. "Sometimes it would malfunction at home, and I would have to come back up here," he said. "So, rather than take a chance on possibly dying at home when it malfunctioned, I'll just stay here, where when something goes wrong with it the matter can be handled quickly and effectively." He said he is grateful to have the veteran center so close to home, and feels the facility is of great benefit to those in the area who have served their country as service personnel.

Preslar has compiled a journal chronicling his time of captivity. He has given permis-1941 until the surren-

der of Corregidor May 7, 1942, only 62 percent of military personnel survived. "During the following 40 months I was a prisoner of war the Japanese Military Forces, Preslar writes.

"As soon as we faced our first Japs after our surrender, we were each searched and asked if we were a machine gunner. If you answered yes, your hands were tied behind your back and bayoneted to death. Soon word spread somehow to deny you were andocumentation to state machine gunner."

For three and onehalf years Preslar and other prisoners suffered "starvation, slave labor, beatings and other forms of torture followed."

They were fed only small parcels of rice. When clothes wore out, they were not replaced.

Preslar stated that he was one of the prisoners put to work to build an airfield on Palawan Island from September 1942 to September 1944.

The field literally was carved from dense jungle. If a prisoner did not work fast enough he was beaten or tortured. Beatings and torture went on 24 hours a day

Cement ships had to be unloaded. Preslar was sent to the hold of

these ships to work unloading sacks of dry cement. Through the basket-woven style containers the dry cement leaked, creating an ash, which permeated the air. The dust became so thick it was almost impossible to breathe, he documents. The unloading detail was small so it took a week to 10 days to finish. This is where Preslar developed severe bronchitis, which evolved to acute asthma in 1980. He was awarded a 100 percent service connected disability determination from the Veterans Administration in 1984.

While working on the airfield Italy surrendered in 1943. Those prisoners of Italian surnames were severely beaten because the Japanese were angry Italy had surrendered.

Squads of 10 men were organized. Should any member of the squad escape remaining members were killed by firing squad if the escapees were not found in five days. If the escapees were found within five days they were behead. ed while the other members of the squad observed.


Some prisoners were blind. Because prisoners had to bow or salute their guards, these blind prisoners often did not see the guards and were beaten. Other prisoners made signs for the blind prisoners to wear indicating in Japanese they could not see. It helped sometimes, but the beatings continued, Preslar states.

On Dec. 14, 1944 only 150 remained of the original 300 building the airfield. These 150 became trapped in a small "air raid," writes Preslar. In retribution they were burned alive by the Japanese using aviation fuel, because McArthur was nearing the Palawan island. Some were bayoneted as they tried to escape while still on fire while others were machinegunned.

Eleven escaped into jungle the until American forces arrived two and onehalf months later.

Fight over music copyrights, pirating reaching new heights

n a day and age when information travels the world at the speed of a modem, the fight over music copyrights and pirating is reaching new levels as many file traders find themselves facing criminal charges.

In what is being deemed a major victory for the music and motion picture industries, a district judge Washington

recently

ordered

Verizon Communications Inc. to name a Verizon internet subscriber who downloaded more than 600 copyrighted songs in one day from the Internet.

The case was being viewed as an important test of the contentious Digital Millennium Copyright Act (DMCA), which exempts Internet Service Providers (ISPs) from liability in copyright infringement cases if the ISP turns over the name of the subscriber.

Verizon appealed the subpoena, saying DMCA rules apply only when an Internet provider "hosts' the infringing works on its own computers. In this case, it argued, the downloaded files did not reside on any system it controls. It was on the user's own hardware and thus, outside the reach of a subpoena.

Judge John D. Bates. rejected Verizon's interpretation as a "strained reading" of the act. He wrote that "Congress never intended such technological hair-split ting. The law was intended to create a process for quickly identifying copyright infringement and curtail-

"Under Verizon's reading of the act, a significant amount of potential copyright infringement would be shielded from the subpoena authority of the DMCA," Bates wrote. "That would, in effect, give Internet copy right infringers shelter from the long arm of the DMCA subpoena power and allow infringement to flourish.

The recording industry hailed the decision as a significant victory in its ongoing crackdown on illicit peer-to-peer net works, which allow users to download files directly and anonymously from another user's computer hard drive.

Verizon said it would appeal the ruling, which, if left unchallenged, would force Internet providers to surrender their subscribers' names, addresses and phone numbers without any subpoena — without any kind of judicial review to determine whether the infringement claim is valid.

"We believe that the court's decision is bad news for consumers and has very troubling implications for service providers and for the Internet more generally," said Sarah Deutsch, Verizon's vice president and associate general

The Electronic Frontier Foundation, a San Francisco technology rights advocacy group that filed a brief in support of Verizon, said the court's ruling raises troubling constitutional

issues. It affords fewer protections to consumers accused of copyright infringement than it does for someone charged with spreading malicious lies about someone online.

"The constitutional protection of Internet users is being compromised on the say-so of record labels, without any court review whatsoever," said Fred von Lohmann, a copyright attorney for the EFF. "There's no need for them to go into court and have to make a showing that their case is legitimate. And that's entirely at odds with the way we treat other forms of unlawful speech."

So where does that leave millions of Americans that download music through filesharing tools everyday? That question may be much harder to answer than anyone expects.

Information leaks within the judicial system claim only a small percentage of alleged "music pirates" are being targeted by federal investigators. According to these unverified reports, the government is basing their decision to pursue charges only if those "caught" sharing files are sharing more than 1,000 copyrighted files.

Reports also allege the government is only tracking users that remain connected to the file-sharing courier for long spans of time, most likely dedicated lines such as cable or DSL. Unfortunately, federal officials are tightlipped on the subject, citing the investigation as ongoing and that they are unable to comment.

While the federal system is enjoying success on several different levels in its fight against. piracy, they may be lined up to take a fat lip in one such case, as an anonymous California computer user went to court last week to challenge the recording industry's file-trading subpoenas, charging that they are unconstitutional and violate her right to privacy.

The legal motion, filed in a Washington, D.C., federal court by a "Jane Doe" Internet service subscriber, is the first from an individual whose personal information has been subpoenaed by the RIAA in recent months.

The motion was filed by a pair of Sacramento, Calif., attorneys who said the RIAA had gone too far in its effort to protect its online copyrights. "This is more invasive than someone having secret access to the library books you check out or the videos you rent." Glenn Peterson, one of the attorneys, said in a statement. "The recent efforts of the music industry to root out piracy have addressed a uniquely contemporary problem with Draconian methods

good old-fashioned intimidation combined with access to personal information that would make George Orwell blush."

The Jane Doe motion comes as the first individual legal response to the RIAA's effort to sue large numbers of file swappers. It follows similar legal challenges from several ISPs and colleges, including Pacific Bell Internet Services, an **SBC Communications** subsidiary.

A Massachusetts feder-

al court has already ruled that some of the group's subpoenas, submitted to the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and

Boston College, had not followed the correct legal process and were therefore invalid. That court left open the possibility that the RIAA could simply refile those subpoenas properly, however.

According to documents filed with the court, Jane Doe used the Kazaa file-swapping software as a music player largely to listen to songs she had ripped from her own CDs and to music that came pre-loaded on her family computer. She also "participated" in the Kazaa file-swapping community but tried to prevent other people from accessing files on her computer, the documents state.

The RIAA has used court orders to try to identify more than 1,000 computer users it alleges have been offering copyrighted songs on filetrading networks. It plans to use the information gained to file copyright lawsuits against the individuals.

On July 9, the RIAA sent her ISP, Verizon Communications, a subpoena seeking her name, address, phone number and e-mail address. Verizon contacted the anonymous subscriber on July 15, telling her that the group was targeting her. After consulting with attorneys, she asked Verizon to delay providing her information because she would fight the request. The action-filed

Thursday is still a preliminary step before settling down to fight on constitutional or other grounds. Because the RIAA document was seeking information from Verizon, not directly from her, she must first petition the court for the right to challenge the subpoena herself.

In their briefs, her attorneys argued that the RIAA's unconventional subpoena process has violated her rights to due process, privacy and anonymous association, along with her contract with Verizon.

For its part, the RIAA said that Jane Doe's motion to intervene matters little, because a federal court has already upheld the validity of the subpoena process. "The courts have already ruled that you're not anonymous when you're publicly distributing music online," said Matt Oppenheim, senior vice president at the RIAA. "Her lawyers are trying to obtain a free pass to download or upload music online illegally Their arguments have already been addressed by federal court and been rejected."

The EFF is also working with some individuals who say their screen names have been the subject of RIAA subpoenas, but it has not yet filed any challenges with the court. "The most important issue is that if you are innocent, if the RIAA has screwed up, it is critical that individuals have the ability to challenge the subpoenas before their identifies are compromised," said Lohmann.

Iraq erupted into full-scale war. In 1989, songwriter Irving


