Scott building, where the soldiers and others were fed.
Saturday was an ideal day for August, with clouds enough to keep the sun from making it too hot, and everybody seemed to have a good good time and plenty to eat and plenty of pure sparkling water with ice to cool it. The barbecue was held on the Public School grounds, the big srbor being built on the west side of the school bulding, where the speaking was held. Judge B. L. Russell acted as master of ceremonies, and as he always does, performed his duties well.
The rain Friday, having sporied he program for that day, part of the exercises intended for that day was held on Saturday. At ten o. lock after several selections by the Baird Mirewan's foad, Mayor chwartz stepped forward and de hiveted his welcome address, which
