### One pleas out, another acquitted

John Farmer, 32, of 1408 Nolan, was acquitted on two counts of aggravated sexual assault of a child in 118th District Court Tuesday.

Farmer, who was indicted in February on charges of having sexual contact with a 5-yearold girl, was found notguilty.

"The verdict speaks itself," for said District Assistant Attorney Robin Orr. "The jury had a very difficult job to do, and they did the best they could with it."

The District Attorney's Office also closed the books on the firearm and possession of a controlled substance charges against 44-yearold Dennis Edward Ausbie this week.

Ausbie was expected to go to trial today on charges of felon in possession of a firearm and four counts of possession of a controlled substance.

The Big Spring man. pleaded to a single count of possession of cocaine -- less than 1 gram, a state jail felony, and was sentenced to 18 months in state jail.

# City council votes to adopt 3-cent tax hike

OKs daily green fee increase, hears optimistic report on outlook for local economy

Big Spring City Council is eying an expected 3-cent hike in the tax rate again this year, the continuation of an agreement a year ago to provide a raise structure for city employ-

Council members, in a 5-1 vote, agreed to

set the tax rate at 71.787 cents per \$100 valuation, a figure 3 cents higher than the 2004 effective rate of 68.787. It's slightly more than 3 cents above the current-year tax rate, which is 68.63 cents.

Voting against the increase was Greg Biddison, whose action surprised at least one board member. "I'm curious as to why you voted

against it," said Stephanie Horton. "Last year you were for this raise. Why did you change your mind?"

"I am mainly going against a 3-cent increase. I know we have to have an increase, but I don't know if it has to go up that much or not," replied Biddison.

No other comment was made at the time, though Horton later said that if a 3-cent increase were not necessary to implement the raise for employees, then she wanted to put the funds elsewhere.

"If it can be done for less than 3 cents... I'd like to see us put a little more funds into the senior center," she said, noting that she had recently toured the facility and was amazed at the work going on there.

"Actually, we need more than 3 cents. Right now we are going to see a decrease in our fund balance compared to last year,'

# **Britain grants** first license for cloning human cells

Researchers hope to help diabetic patients

LONDON (AP) — Britain granted its first license for human cloning Wednesday, more than three years after becoming the first nation to authorize the technique to produce stem cells for medical research.

A team of researchers at Newcastle



ter cells of the body. The South Korean parliament followed in December, and by February scientists there announced they had become the first in the world to successfully clone a human embryo and extract stem cells for research.

The stem cells are extracted when the embryo is still microscopic. British regulations allow the embryo to develop for no more than 14 days, after which the embryo starts to develop a nervous system.

Many scientists believe stem cells hold vast promise for treating an array of diseases from diabetes to Parkinson's and Alzheimer's. Stem cells can potentially grow into any type of human tissue and scientists hope to

# STEP lab to continue despite lack of federal funding

Federal funding for the Howard College Student Tutorial Education Program (STEP) will end in September as expected, but it's not the end of the program, college officials

"The STEP lab will continue to operate," said Executive Vice President Terry Hansen. "We've done some restructuring on personnel to obtain some efficiency. All the functionality of the program is still there."

STEP provides assistance to students in all

core subjects through computer assistance and one-on-one tutoring at one learning

The program began five years ago when the college received a \$1.86 million Title V grant from the Hispanic Serving Institutions Program through the U.S. Department of Education.

'The grant was phased out over the course of its life and that was its intent," Hansen said. "The incentive that the Title V grant put in place is for the college to continue those efforts and that's what we're going to

And the program has been a great success, Hansen added.

"It's been a great thing for our students because it provides a number of resources and early intervention for students who maybe are having trouble grasping a concept," he said. "They come in and they have a lot of tutorial material. It's a great supplement to classroom instruction."





be able to direct the blank cells to grow into specific cell types needed for transplant.

The United States prohibits any kind of embryo cloning and has lobbied strongly against it. The Bush administration also has restricted funding for stem cell research, which has become an issue in the U.S. presidential campaign.

U.S. policy forbids federal funding for research on embryonic stem cell lines created after Aug. 9, 2001. Democratic presidential nominee Sen. John Kerry has said that if elected he would overthose funding restrictions.

Some Christian and politically conservative groups oppose stem cell research — especially cloning — as immoral fertilized because embryos must be destroyed to harvest the stem cells.

Stem cells can be found in adults, but scientists believe they may not be as versatile as those found in embryos. They

envision using cloning to create an embryo cloned from a patient so that stem cells extracted would be a perfect transplant match.

"After careful consideration of all the scientific, ethical, legal and medical aspects of the project, the Human Fertilization and Embryology Authority License Committee agreed to grant an initial one year research license to the Newcastle Center for Life," the British reg-

ulator said in a statement. "This is an important area of research and a responsible use of technology. The HFEA is there to make sure any research involving human embryos is scrutinized and properly regu-

lated.' Regulations on cloning and stem cell research vary around the world. No other European country licenses the practice.

# Jim Runge is finally getting attention

im Runge's "Running of the Bull" Festival in Eldorado is a big breakthrough for him. Newspapers, maga zines and television stations all across Texas

and beyond are planning to cover this year's event slated for July 24 & 25 around Eldorado's court house square. The festival follows the Running of the Bulls in Pamplona, Spain by a few days. But, as Runge says, "in our festival, entrants are judged on who can run their mouth with the most bull...in several categories.

For years, Runge has staged some of the most unique events ever to occur in the Lone Star State. But hardly anybody noticed. Two years ago Jim took up residence in his hometown of Eldorado and started the EOBOC, the Eldorado Olympic Bid Organizing Committee, a loose knit organization to serve as the vehicle for a tongue-in-cheek bid

on the winter games of 2014 and the summer games of 2016. Jim says the underlying goal is the revitalization of the visibility and spirit of this once vibrant village in the middle of nowhere with numerous offbeat stunts, displays, spoofs, skits, pranks, eccentric attractions and other roadside shenanigans.

He stages the Elgoatarod, a takeoff on the Ididarod dog sled race in Alaska. At the Elgoatarod, goats pull carts around the courthouse square. The Tagoo Festival revolves around a mysterious bird that is found only to Eldorado. He created a hysterical district near downtown with all sorts of spoofs and plays on words. The district has a very rare albino bat colony.

In the past, Runge has staged yarn and weaving festivals in McKinney and a llama kissing contest in Fredericksburg. He held an April Fool's day event in Art, Texas.

But the Running of the Bull is becoming a Texas festival landmark. Now, only in its second year, requests for press credentials have come from the San Antonio Express News, Houston Chronicle, Southern Living, Texas Monthly, Saveur Magazine in New York City, Texas Co-Op Power and several TV stations including WFAA in Dallas. Last year's inaugural event drew

some formidable talent: Dennis Gaines, a national award winning cowboy poet, a clogging group from San Angelo that performed in "heifer outfits" and forty vendors.

The event features the Biggest Lie Contest (Cock & Bull), musical routines, animal acts, impersonations, costuming, skits and stunts, extemporaneous speaking, legal mumbo jumbo (Flim Flam), the longest talker without stopping, salesmanship (medicine shows, autos), tongue twisters, backwards talk, fastest talker, Burma Shave, cowboy poetry, rhyming poetry, double talk/mangled English, parodies, punning, shaggy dog stories (long story with twisted punch line) and true personal stories.

Judges include western novelist Elmer Kelton, Kathy Straach of the Dallas Morning News, Doug Rogers of Ghostlight Productions and others.



# The trouble with liberals and conservatives

The country is polarized, we're told. Bush-haters versus Clinton-haters. Mel Gibson versus Michael Moore. Red states versus blue states. Liberals and conservatives read different books, watch different networks, go to different churches.

But liberals and conservatives have more in common than you might think.

Both believe in government magic. And they want you to believe in it too. They want you to believe the president can be Superman, Santa Claus and Mother



and racism, keep kids off drugs and keep families together. Magical thinking is cute among children. But adults should know that the world is complicated and that legislative actions often fail, or backfire, or have unintended consequences or disappear into bureaucratic sinkholes. Both ignore history. Liberals

look at the 20th century's grand experiment of capitalism versus socialism — the United States versus the Soviet Union, Western Europe versus Eastern Europe, China versus Hong Kong — and somehow conclude that what the U.S. needs today is more socialism. National health insurance, a more centralized educational system, government regulation for our most dynamic industries — in every case ignoring the historical triumph of competition and freedom. Conservatives think government can restore the world of the 1950s, ignoring the most basic les-

son of history: Things change. Both respond to special interests. Look at the Bush administration: an energy bill designed by energy companies, a steel tariff on imports for the steel industry, a Medicare drug entitlement that will shift costs from big business to the taxpayers, the proposed Federal Marriage Amendment for religious-right supporters. Meanwhile, liberal administrations never forget the trial lawyers, the feminists, the civil rights lawyers and the other groups that help them gain power.

Both involve the nation in unnecessary wars. Conservatives think the U.S. should send troops anywhere our vital interests are threatened, and they have a very expansive definition of our "vital interests." Liberals take a different tack: They like to send troops anywhere our interests are not threatened - it seems less greedy and Republican. That's why liberals get excited about sending U.S. troops to Somalia, Liberia and Bosnia.

Both will forgive anything a member of their team does. Remember when conservatives thought President Clinton's dalliance with Monica Lewinsky was a national scandal, and liberals thought conservatives were a bunch of prudes? Then Arnold Schwarzenegger was accused of groping women, and suddenly the liberals wanted to hang him and the conservatives said Democrats should lighten up. Conservatives sued to make

Hillary Rodham Clinton report who was on her healthcare task force; liberals sued to make Dick Cheney tell us who was on his

energy task force. The red team/blue team mentality applies even to trivia: Liberals are shocked that Cheney said a bad word to a senator, but uberliberal Hillary Clinton said, "You go, girl!" when Teresa Heinz Kerry told a reporter to "shove it!" Conservatives, outraged about Heinz Kerry's rudeness, had defended Cheney's vulgarity on the Senate floor.

And the No. 1 way liberals and conservatives are alike: Both think they can run your life better than you can.

Liberals want to raise taxes because they can spend your money better than you can. They don't believe in school choice because you're not capable of choosing a school for your children. They think they can handle your healthcare, your retirement and your charitable contributions

better than you can. Conservatives want to censor cable television because you're too dumb to decide what your family should watch. They want to ban drugs, pornography, gambling and gay marriage because you just don't know what's good for you.

The reality is, Americans aren't as polarized as the pundits say. Most want government out of their pocketbooks and personal lives. They want civil liberties and lower taxes. And they feel free to reject both liberals and conservatives when their ideas don't make sense.

### Unclear if he is terror suspect

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) - A Pakistani man detained after he was spotted making videotapes of Charlotte skyscrapers faces immigration charges, but it was not immediately clear whether authorities consider him a terror sus-

Kamran Akhtar, 35, was being held in federal custody pending a Friday detention hearing in U.S. Court District Charlotte. Officials said Tuesday that Akhtar was arrested July 20, after a police officer spotted him filming the 60-story Bank

of America headquarters. and another downtown skyscraper.

Maglione said Akhtar's "evasive" behavior indicated otherwise.

### Drunken joyrider sentenced to six years

ANGLETON (AP) - An unlicensed pilot who stole a plane while intoxicated on his 21st birthday has been sentenced to six years in prison.

Louis Paul Kadlecek pleaded guilty to felony theft Monday in a Brazoria County district court in Angleton, south of Houston.

Kadlecek stole the plane Feb. 29 and attempted to fly it, smashing into power lines before crashing in a field. Kadlecek was unhurt but about 11,000 customers lost power.

### Vermont to sue FDA over prescription drugs

MONTPELIER, Vt. (AP) - Vermont says it will become the first state to sue the Food and Drug Administration for denying its request to import prescription drugs from Canada.

"Vermont presented a legal and responsible plan to import prescription drugs," Gov. James Douglas said in a statement Tuesday. He said the FDA's reasons for rejecting the state's request for permission "are unsubstantiated and we have no choice but to pursue any and all legal remedies available."

Douglas had long rejected suggestions that the state set up a drug importation program without FDA

But in a letter responding to the FDA's rejection, Michael Smith, administration secretary for Douglas, wrote that the administration found itself "forced to consider development of a reimportation program that conforms to our interpretation of the current "It is just a wonderful day for religious freedom and

laws, independent of your agency." Smith replied to a letter from William Hubbard, the FDA's associate commissioner for policy and planning, which denied a request the state made last December for an exemption from the ban on drug imports. Hubbard wrote that the FDA is "very concerned about the safety risks associated with the importation of prescription drugs from foreign countries."

### Judge says Bible must be removed

HOUSTON (AP) - A judge on Tuesday ordered Harris County to remove a Bible from a monument outside its civil courts building, ruling that the display violates the constitutional separation between church and state.

Federal Judge Sim Lake said the county should be exercising religious neutrality and "not be seen as endorsing Christianity." He gave officials 10 days to remove the Bible.

"The court concludes that the purpose of the Bible display is to encourage people to read the Bible," Lake wrote. "What other purpose could there be for prominently displaying an open Bible in an illuminated case tilted toward passers-by in a heavily frequented plaza in front of the main entrance to the court-

# **Tropical storm Bonnie on path toward Florida** Panhandle, while Charley could hit Florida Keys

back tropical storms moved closer to Florida early today, with Bonnie creeping across the Gulf of Mexico toward the Panhandle and a stronger Charley behind it prompting a hurricane watch for the lower Florida Keys.

Florida, from Alabama line to the Suwanee River, was under a tropical storm watch and could expect Bonnie's wind and rain on Thursday, according to the National Hurricane Center in Miami. Bonnie is not expected to become a hurricane, meteorologists said.

Charley was forecast to hit or pass close to the Keys later lower Thursday and then hit the southwestern Florida mainland as a Category 1 hurricane coast early Friday, packing sustained wind of about 85 mph, forecaster Daniel Brown said. A hurricane watch, meaning hurricane conditions are possible within 36 hours, was posted from the Dry Tortugas to Craig Key, near Long Key.

Charley was forecast to pass over central Florida, still packing hurricaneforce wind, and then exit near Daytona Beach on



How many of you remember "Rebecca" by Daphne Du Maurier? It was first published in 1938 and was an immediate best seller. Alfred Hitchcock gave it a wider audience with a movie by the same name. Did you ever wonder what happened after Manderly burned? Susan Hill has written a sequel to "Rebecca," titled "Mrs. DeWinter" and it is as spooky as the original. Do come and check it out to see how Rebecca, Mrs. Danvers and Jack Favell prevail once again.

A new author who I had not seen before is John Blackthorn. Written in 1999, "Sins of the Father" is predicated on the theory that the follies and miscalculations of one generation will return to haunt the following generation. Set on the eve of the 40th anniversary of the Cuban revolution, the book adds a chilling coda to current times. Professor McLemore's project turns personal as hints that the Cuban Missile crisis is still with us today. A good book that will be hard to put down.

Long out of print, Mario Puzo's earliest work, "The Fortunate Pilgrim," has reappeared. Lucia Santa has traveled from the mountain farms of Italy to life in Hell's Kitchen. Married with six children to raise, she does this all on her own. As she struggles to keep her family together, her children confront life in America. You can see bits and pieces of Puzo's other famous work, "The Godfather," in this book.

Another lawyer story is "State v. Justice" by Gallatin Warfield. Two dueling, vengeful lawyers use a controversial murder trial to exact revenge on each other. The story line is this: The 6-year son of a Russian diplomat is murdered. The accused killer is a psychotic drifter. The prosecutor has a small son, so the investigation is emotionally wrenching. This

is both a murder trial and a political thriller, so it will be interesting to see how they intersect to bring justice to a wounded family.

From the back of the book: Written with a keen eye and enormous heart, "Who's Who in Hell," by Robert Chalmers, is an uproarious, achingly beautiful story about what happens when our plans for life meets its plans for us. If you enjoy a book that is a tad bit different, check this one out.

Karleen Koen wrote a national bestseller titled "Through A Glass Darkly." She has written a sequel to that book: "Now Face to Face." Barbara Devane is a widow in colonial Virginia, trying to survive the death of her husband. She returns to London, determined to face down the past and forge a new life for herself. This is Barbara Devane's story of how she accomplishes this task.

Along the same lines, but in real life, is the story of Maude Allen Williams. Mrs. Williams was born in 1883 and lived until 1993. During her 110-year lifetime, she went from oil lamps to microwaves, from horse and buggy days to an automobile. At age 77, she stepped onto an airplane for the first time. Living and growing up in Ohio, this is her story and a fascinating one it is. The title of the book

# WEATHER WHYS...

### **Topic: Cloud Colors**

Q: Why do some clouds appear to look white in color, while others are gray, black or other colors?

A: The color of a cloud depends on the size of water droplets that make up the cloud, says Michael Hammer of Texas A&M University.

"As light enters a cloud, it reflects off these tiny water droplets. As the droplets get larger, less light is reflected back out. Clouds will appear white if they reflect a lot of light and darker if less light is reflected. Also, where you are when you're looking at it also affects what color the cloud will appear to you. If you're standing underneath a tall cloud, it will appear gray because little light can get through the cloud. If you stand far away, however, the same cloud will appear white because the light is not passing through the cloud before it reaches your eye. Some experts say if a cloud is 3,000 feet or so thick, very little appears to be a dark-looking cloud."

Q: Then why do some clouds look almost black?

A: Very dark looking or black clouds are probably those that contain a lot of rain in them and part of a thunderstorm, Hammer says. "But not all'gray clouds contain rain or snow. If you are under a cloud that appears to be very dark, wait until it passes by you and then look at it again. The side of the cloud will often appear very white, meaning the brightness of the cloud will change colors too, — from gray to very white. As sunlight is scattered over and through clouds, their colors will change as the light is reflected differently before it reaches our eyes. So where you are standing from the cloud usually determines what color it appears to be.'



# Rangers dominate Brown, Yankees

AP Sports Writer ARLINGTON - Kevin Brown felt terrible before he even took the mound, and Gary Sheffield winced with pain almost every time he swung the

The New York Yankees were hurting, and the Texas Rangers eagerly seized the opportunity to pounce on their ailing

Ryan Drese pitched seven shutout innings and former Yankee Alfonso Soriano doubled twice and scored three leading the times, Rangers over New York 71 Tuesday night.

"Certainly the stars were aligned for us tonight," Rangers manager Buck Showalter said.

David Dellucci, another former Yankee, and Mark Teixeira both hit two-run homers to help the Rangers end a seasonhigh four-game losing streak.

Brown (9-2) lost for the first time in six starts, turning in his worst performance since returning from the disabled list on July 30.

Brown, who's been bothered by a back injury and an intestinal parasite this season, allowed five runs

and eight hits in five innings against his former team, one start after pitching eight shutout innings against Oakland. Both his losses this year have been to the Rangers.

The Yankees' ace said he felt weak during warm-ups and never got any better the closer it got to gametime.

"I was drained. I never had any energy," Brown said. "It's not the first time I've felt cruddy and it probably won't be the last."

Yankees manager Joe Torre noticed early on that Brown was laboring heavily at the game's

"It didn't look like it was easy for him," Torre said. "It looked like he was fidgeting. He was fighting it all night long."

Sheffield was taken out of the game in the bottom of the eighth after complaining of pain in his left shoulder.

"I reached out for a pitch, and my hands got away from my body. Sometimes you can't avoid it," said Sheffield, who went 0-for-3 with two strikeouts. "Sometimes in the middle of the game you get a stab."

Drese (9-6) allowed five

against the Yankees, who lost their second straight after winning five in a row. Drese, who has the second-lowest home ERA in the AL at 2.15, is 5-0 in his last six starts.

"We definitely needed to win tonight," Drese said. "We played pretty well. I got out of some jams.'

Frank Francisco completed the six-hitter, allowing an RBI single to John Olerud with two outs in the ninth.

Alex Rodriguez went 2for-4 with two strikeouts and drew a chorus of boos each time he came to the plate in his latest trip hits and three walks back to Arlington.

# Despite sluggish start, U.S. men's basketball squad knocks off Turkey

AP Basketball Writer ISTANBUL, Turkey -With the crowd jeering and whistling, the U.S. Olympic basketball team pulled away in the fourth quarter for a 80-68 victory Tuesday night to cap an anxious day in this ancient city and an eventful pre-Olympic tour.

The American players awoke to learn that bombs had exploded at ing or postponing the two tourist hotels and a game, Tooley said. fuel depot a few miles from their hotel, but team and U.S. government officials reassured them it would be safe to go ahead with the game.

"I don't know that everybody is absolutely confident and secure with everything, but they said everything would be fine, so you have to keep going on," Tim Duncan said.

After failing to shake Turkey for three quarters, the U.S. team hit its stride in the fourth quarter — but not before the crowd gave them an ear-

The play that turned the fans against them came when LeBron James swiped at the ball and hit Turkey guard Ibrahim Kutluay in the eye. Kutluay, who scored 26 points, lay writhing on the floor before walking

Another Turkish player went down moments later, and the whistles and shrieks from the crowd reached earsplitting levels whenever the Americans had the ball thereafter.

"This is part of the game. I think it was the right answer from the fans, and they'll see it in Greece, too," Turkey center Mehmet Okur said. "It's much different in Europe. It's not like the NBA."

Duncan led the U.S. team with 25 points and 11 rebounds, Allen Iverson scored 13 and Richard Jefferson added 11.

Team officials first learned of the bombings at 5 a.m. local time, and were briefed two hours later by their security coordinators and a State Department official from the U.S. consulate. Players were briefed just before their regular morning meeting, and families of the players traveling with the team received a briefing as

"They gave us intelligence that gave us a certain comfort level. The State Department official reiterated this was not targeted at American or Western interests, and it was something that is not atypical of what happens in Turkey," USA basketball executive director Jim Tooley said.

No serious consideration was given to cancel-

"We all were a little uneasy about it because most of the guys had family here," U.S. coach Larry Brown "People here handled it great. They made us feel pretty secure. We knew when the schedule was made that there had been some incidents here, but everybody wanted to come."

As for the game, Duncan was virtually unstoppable in the first quarter, but so was Kutluay. The Turkish guard scored 14 points to Duncan's 13, going 5-for-6 from the field - often with a defender right in his face.

Duncan didn't take his first rest until 7:39 remained in the second quarter with the score tied at 25, and the Americans couldn't get anything going offensively. They trailed 31-29 when he returned with 3:32 left.


Jefferson scored six points to help the Americans go ahead by four, but Kutluay ended the first half with a 3pointer over Iverson, his only basket of the quarter, to leave Turkey trailing just 37-36.

The game remained tight until the Americans scored the final six points of the third quarter and the first four of the fourth for a 63-53 lead.

Kutluay went down moments later, and the crowd grew even angrier after Turkey center Fatih Solak injured his left triceps when he came down hard after trying to block a breakaway dunk by Carlos Boozer.

That dunk started an 8-0 run that put the U.S. team ahead by 15, 75-60.

"I think we're right where we need to be going into the Olympics," Duncan said. "I think we're 1,000 percent better than when we started. We understand each other a little better."

# U.S. women's soccer team starts Olympic run tonight

**AP Sports Writer** IRAKLION, Greece -At the end of a workout

under a searing sun at an old Greek stadium, captain Julie Foudy gathered the U.S. women's soccer team in a midfield huddle.

"Let's get this party started!" Foudy bellowed in a singsong voice.

The party that is the 2004 Olympic Games is indeed about to begin, with soccer kick-starting the festivities two days ahead of everything else.

The United States opens against Greece Wednesday on the island of Crete, one of eight games two days before the opening ceremony for a sport that has to start early to squeeze everything in.

"We've been ready for a goalkeeper month," Briana Scurry said. "We're very excited to see what we've got."

Most everyone knows what the United States has - a deep, talented team determined to reclaim its supremacy after disappointing finishes at the 2000 Olympics and the 2003 World Cup.

Greece, however, is another matter.

The soccer-mad country that so euphorically celebrated its surprising European men's Championship title last month barely recognizes the women's game.

The Greek women qualified only because they are the host country, and

American players with Greek ancestry to help their cause. Three of them - Eleni Benson from Connecticut, Walker Loseno from Seattle and Tanya Kalivis from New Jersey — sat together at the athletes' hotel this week and told some inter-

esting tales. "Greeks were surprised that women can actually play soccer," Kalivis said.

"Women's feet are not made for soccer," Loseno said a taxi driver told her during a passionate discussion about women's place in Greek society.

Benson said one taxi driver wanted to armwrestle her and feel her muscles.

And what about their Wednesday chances against the two-time World Cup champions?

"Even getting this far is an achievement," Benson said diplomatically.

Needless to say, the U.S. team is the overwhelming favorite in the opener, but that hasn't stopped coach April Heinrichs from compiling a laundry list of concerns.

humidity, "Heat, possible fatigue, injuries." Heinrichs said. "It's a lot of issues to be concerned about, but nothing is more important than advancing."

In the unusual Olympic format: the Americans play three first-round games in seven days, while teams in the other groups play just twice.

If the U.S. team takes a big early lead, look for

they've enlisted eight Heinrichs to rest some of her veterans in the second half.

The two teams have been sharing the same hotel this week, but the U.S. players have generally kept their distance from competitors about whom they know very lit-

"We kind of pretend they're not even there," forward Abby Wambach said.

Heinrichs planned to give a 45-minute scouting report Tuesday night, but she said the emphasis will be on executing her own game plan.

Her players say the biggest hurdle will be the opening minutes, especially if there's a loud

Greek crowd. "Both teams kind of want to feel each other out," forward Mia Hamm said. "We're both going to be full of so much adrenaline and emotion because we're in the Olympic Games, we're playing the home team. The stadium is going to be spirited, as it should be."

The Americans are guarding against overconfidence going into a game in which their opponents have nothing to lose.

Only a comfortable win will meet expectations, putting the pressure squarely on the U.S. players on a day when they have the Olympic spotlight all to themselves.

"We always look at pressure as a privilege," Foudy said. "And it's a good opportunity to showcase the sport.'





Dear Hopeless: Most women are actually quite understanding about such things, provided you warn them in advance. We can understand if you don't want to disclose your medical condition on the first date. However, if you have frequent seizures, and there is a likelihood that you will have one during an evening out, it would be best to prepare your date. People can handle more than you think.

From Abingdon, Va.: Has Mom considered the possibility that her daughter is hard of hearing? Some forms of hearing loss occur only among conversational tones.

Hence, the attempt to control a conversation. As long as they are talking, they can't be missing what others are saying. They may seem aggressive, but they avoid appearing inattentive or stupid. Mom should ask her daughter to get her hearing checked as soon as possible.

Dear Annie: As a specialist in learning disabilities, I feel that "Alice" may be struggling with an undiagnosed social cognition learning disability. People with this disability often have difficulty initiating conversations; maintaining the give-and-take of a converof voice; understanding how to begin and maintain relationships; dealing with conflict; and speaking appropriately to different audiences (friends vs. doctors, for example).

People with social skill disorders must be taught these skills explicitly. This involves identifying the most troublesome behaviors, role-playing appropriate behavior and giving lots of positive reinforcement.

Alice should have a thorough evaluation of her strengths and weaknesses, and engage in social skills training. — Vanetta Porth, Ph.D., Center for Learning Success, Acton, Mass.

### Egypt

### Is it a factor for peace in the Middle East?

EIn 1979, under the stewardship of President Jimmy Carter, Israel and Egypt signed the Camp David peace treaty, by which Israel committed itself to yield the Sinai to Egypt, together with all its material and strategic assets. The whole world hoped that this historic handshake would indeed finally bring peace and tranquility to the troubled Middle East.

### What are the facts?

An implacable enemy. Egypt is Israel's most implacable enemy. It was the key player and military leader in the 1948 assault on the nascent Jewish state. Almost miraculously, Israel was able to defeat the combined Arab might. Egypt remained in occupation of the Gaza strip.

But thirsting for revenge, Egypt - together with Jordan and Syria - attacked Israel again in 1967. In a brilliant campaign that will be studied in war colleges for centuries, Israel, in six days, utterly destroyed the Arab war machine. At the end of that war, Israel stayed in possession of the the vast Sinai.

Instead of licking its wounds, Egypt, after its rout in the Six Day War, almost immediately engaged in a war of attrition against Israel. That war lasted for years. Egypt never ceased in its attempt to destroy Israel. The hostility culminated once again on

Yom Kipper of 1973, when the Egyptian armed forces, in coordination with Syria, once again launched a major war against Israel. Israel once again prevailed. Only urgent intervention by the United States and others brought about a truce and prevented the total annihilation of the Egyptian force.

In the 1979 Camp David peace treaty Israel yielded the Sinai to Egypt together with all the assets it had developed there. Still, Israelis of all political persuasions were almost giddy with hope and anticipation that their most implacable enemy had opted for peace. Finally, the talented people of Israel could now bring the promise and the potential of the Jewish homeland to full fruition.

A terrible disappointment. The disappointment was almost immediate. Anwar Sadat was assassinated by one of his own terrorist countrymen. He had to die, for no other reason than for having denied the Arab mantra: No peace, no negotiation, and no recognition of Israel.

Israel had envisioned its peace with Egypt as that between the United States and Canada. But that was not to be. Right from the very beginning, travel was harshly discouraged and strictly controlled by Egypt. Trade was non-existent. Israel's ambassador to Cairo was under virtual house arrest. He was never included in any official function. The Egyptian press, tightly controlled by the government, initiated an orgy of anti-Semitic publicity, highlighted by hateful cartoons rivaling those of the "Stürmar," the notorious Nazi hate sheet. There hasn't been an Egyptian ambassador in Israel for over three

Egypt is no friend of the United States. It consistently

votes against our country's interest in the forums of the United Nations. In order to get Egypt to agree to the Camp David peace in 1979, the United States committed itself to aid Egypt to the tune of \$2.2 billion per year. Only about \$.9 billion of that is earmarked as "economic aid." The balance,

over \$1.3 billion, is for military aid.

Egypt has the largest armed forces in the entire Middle East, in manpower and in equipment. It has recently supplemented its navy with eleven new battle cruisers. It has placed four recent orders for F-16's, totaling 190 new planes. It has acquired 180 Hawk and 1,000 Hellfire missiles. It has already received delivery of 24 Apache helicopters and it expects to receive twelve more. The armored corps is comprised of the most modern U.S. tanks. Egypt is bordered by Libya, Sudan and Israel. It doesn't take much imagination to figure out against which of these countries all of this armament, all of this military ower is directed. It's toward Israel, of course.

What does the U.S. hope to accomplish by arming this mortal enemy of Israel, which is still bent on the destruction of the Jewish state? Since Israel is the one immutable ally of the United States in the entire region, a country we can always count on, it is hard to understand why our government would be participatory in Israel's possible destruction. It makes no sense at all.

There can be no question that Egypt is once again girding for war against Israel - either alone or with the enthusiastic collaboration of other Muslim nations. Legislation has been introduced in Congress to reduce and eventually eliminate altogether the \$1.3 billion annual military aid that Egypt receives from us. But even if that were to succeed, it may already be too late. If Egypt does indeed launch war against Israel, it could ultimately include weapons of mass destruction. It is up to the world to prevent this disaster, if it is still possible.
