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## New Friona Postoffice Asked by P. O. Dept.

### Farm Store Opening this Saturday

Grand opening of the Cummings store is announced for this Saturday, with \$100 in awards to be given. Prizes are in denominations of \$40, \$30, \$20 and \$10. Awards will be made at 5 p. m., and it is not necessary for registrants to attend at that hour. Registration will be conducted throughout the day.

## SALK VACCINE WILL BE GIVEN

First and second graders of Parmer County schools will be eligible for the free inoculation with the Salk Vaccine, new "wonder" discovery for combating polio.

Vaccine for local use already has been ordered, Dr. Paul Spring states, and the public will be notified as soon as more definite plans can be known.

Children of the 1st and 2nd grades must have signed permission of the parents before receiving the vaccine. To date, only about 50 per cent of Friona parents of these grades have signed the special cards. Others are urged to go by the school and sign them at earliest date possible.

The Parmer County Hospital also has ordered a supply of the vaccine. This will not be included in the free program, but it is thought that demand by age groups other than the 1st and 2nd grades made the order advisable. Manager Jimmie Baxter states that notice of arrival, together with price, etc., will be made known as soon as the hospital receives the information.

A balmy Easter blessed Parmer County residents on Easter Sunday, but Mother Nature proved quite unpredictable on other days this week.

The elements ran the gamut of conditions Tuesday, with some snow, sleet, dust and high winds, followed by an afternoon of showers. Little moisture was recorded in Friona, but as much as 1/2 inch fell to the north and northwest. The severe snow of the Texline - Dalhart vicinity failed to reach this far south.

Clear and warmer weather is forecast.

Government specifications for new postoffice facilities in Friona will be released within the next two weeks, according to announcement Tuesday of Acting Postmaster Leo McLellan.

McLellan's disclosure came after visit here of a Fort Worth representative of the building division of the postal department.

Building proposals and specifications will call for either complete remodeling and enlargement of the present building, or construction of new building by private investors with rental contract being signed by the postal department. Specifically, the postal department takes the position that it can no longer use the present facilities.

Under the plan proposed for Friona, the new structure would be rented with a 10-year contract. New and additional boxes would be installed, and all existing equipment replaced.

The present postoffice is badly outdated, especially insofar as number of boxes is concerned. With 500 boxes installed at present, and at least 80 on an active waiting list, McLellan made the statement Tuesday that he had no doubt at least 100 more boxes could be rented immediately if made available to the public.

Several months after building or remodeling contract awarding would be necessary before all new equipment could be delivered, the postal officials indicate. But Friona is assured of new postoffice facilities, without doubt, at a not-too-distant date.

## Highway Accidents Are on Increase

J. W. Blackwell, Highway Patrol captain, issued a report for April concerning the rural accidents investigated by the Texas Highway Patrolmen in the Amarillo district during March. This report does not include accidents in cities over 2,500 population or accidents investigated by other police agencies.

Nine fatalities and 67 injuries resulted from 95 accidents during March with estimated property damage of \$47,049. There were 614 traffic arrests, 34 for driving while intoxicated, and 1,737 warnings given for hazardous violations.

The figures show a considerable increase as compared to March, 1954, when only two persons died in the area and 53 were injured. Property damage was heavier last March, however, when \$61,529 in damages was reported.

Sponsored by County Agent Joe Jones and the Extension Service, working with Doyle and E. H. Cummings of Friona, the meeting will feature a talk and answering of questions by Robert Parker of the Texas Sesame Seed Growers Association at Paris.

Considerable interest has been directed to Sesame here this year, with recognition of the crop as very well suited to the cotton producing areas of the Southwest, with its combination tap root and fibrous root system making it drought tolerant to a great degree.

Sesame matures in 90 to 110 days, fitting well into most local farming programs, the county agent has pointed out; and with no acreage controls, yet relatively good profits, its popularity may well increase here.

### Land Program's Future

AUSTIN.—Easter bunny brought the golden egg! That, in an eggshell, describes developments in the Capital City over the week-end.

House members returned to Austin from the Easter holiday to discover that members of the revenue and taxation committee who remained on the job, had brought out a compromise tax bill. It promised \$45,000,000 in new money.

Chairman Stanton Stone and House Speaker Jim Lindsey regard it as their number one project for the week.

Although the committee side-tracked Gov. Allan Shivers' single-shot bills and adopted Chairman Stone's omnibus bill, Governor Shivers said it was a workable basis for providing what is needed.

Actually the bill gives Governor Shivers more than half of his announced desires. He praised the committee and asked that the balance of his "program" be restored somewhere along the way.

Approved by the committee was the one-cent per pack tax increase on cigarettes, asked by the governor. Also included was a one-cent per gallon gasoline tax, which was half what the governor suggested. An increase in beer operators license fees was injected into the bill as a concession to strong House sentiment to include beer in the new-money scheme. A fourth tax item was diesel fuel at 1.5 cents per gallon.

Under the proposed levies, \$25,000,000 would be added to highway improvements annually, and \$20,000 would go into the general fund.

House Speaker Jim Lindsey took a strong stand for the compromise plan. Governor Shivers complimented him for the progress made over the long week-end.

Waiting for nearly \$60,000,000 in new money before it can reach the governor is the \$150,000 biennial appropriation now in conference committee.

Governor Shivers regretfully left the scene of action. He went with Mrs. Shivers to Chicago where she will receive treatment for an ear ailment. She had a mastoid operation last year.

Before leaving Texas the governor stated that he felt the current 120-day session, due to end May 10, might run two weeks beyond the four-month mark. Legislators, now drawing \$25 per day, draw no pay after 120 days, unless a new session is called. Shivers has expressed his dislike for special sessions.

**Charges Pile Up**  
Charges continued to mount against Bascom Giles, former commissioner of the general land office.

Latest were four felony theft charges placed against Giles by District Attorney Lee Proctor of Travis County. It brought the total charges today to \$1,065,638.

Also charged on four felony theft counts was J. Paul Little, Crystal City attorney.

Giles and Little were each accused separately of theft from the state in four veterans land transactions last year in Zavala County. The total amount involved was \$377,344.

Byrd Cattle Company refunded \$25,068 to the state on one land deal.

Meanwhile, a Travis County grand jury continued its investigation of veterans land deals.

Giles' trial in the first of the felony indictments against him, to be heard in San Antonio District Court, was postponed until May 23. His attorney told the court that Giles was too busy with new charges and new civil suits to go to trial.

### Giles Is Defended

Stanley L. Fry, a Reeves County landowner, testified before the Senate investigating committee that Giles was a "hard trader for the state."

"Giles," said Fry, "argued and sweated over land prices and traded just as hard as if it was his own personal money."

Sen. Jimmy Phillips, chairman of the committee, asked Fry: "Did you pay Giles anything, or any employee of the board?"

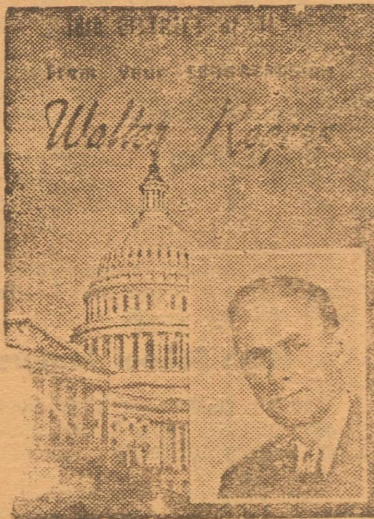

answer. Despite a "no" vote by Attorney General John Ben Shepperd, the veterans land program may be extended to veterans of World War I and Korea.

Other members of the land board—Governor Shivers and Land Commissioner J. Earl Rudder—voted to urge the legislature to offer the people a constitutional amendment on the question. Shepperd said that while he favored the philosophy of veterans land benefits, he would withhold his approval of any new programs until the legislature enacts "clear and strict regulations" as to its administration.

Meanwhile, veterans organizations were to decide whether to ask the program's continuation. A hearing is set for April 18 on Sen. George Moffett's bill designed to add another \$100,000,000 to the veterans land program, via a constitutional amendment.

## Washington Views -



THE DUST STORMS

The dust storms in the Southwest are again getting front page billing in the Eastern Press. Some are carrying pictures showing a scene that appears to be taken at midnight. The caption under the picture is, "Mid-day in Pampa, Texas, Looking Down Main Street." This is somewhat misleading, because there isn't a Main Street in Pampa. I sometimes wonder how so many mistakes are made. One picture was taken in Amarillo and captioned, "Looking from the Herring to the Capitol in Amarillo." Now, this is the sort of thing that causes confusion. People say to me: "I didn't know the Capitol of Texas was at Amarillo." Well, I then have to explain that the picture should have read, "Looking from the Herring Hotel to the Capitol Hotel." Then they say, "Well, is it true that a fellow named Thompson owns the Herring Hotel?" I say, "Now I have heard that, but I'm not sure about it." Then they say: "If his name is Thompson, why does he call it the Herring?" I tell them to write General Thompson, he has the full answer to that.

The next question is: "Why isn't the Capitol at Amarillo?" I have to explain to them that Texas is so big that by the time our Chamber of Commerce had heard that they were considering choosing a capitol site and our delegation had gotten to the convention, they already had the building built and occupied. The roads were pretty bad back then, but I don't mention that, just let the size take care of it. They usually try to corner me by asking why we don't move it. I tell them that size has us stymied on that one, too, because we can't get an appropriation approved for that much.

Then comes the payoff question. One of the group always says: "By the way, do you all ever have any dust storms out there?" It just goes to show how much confusion can be caused by one little misleading picture.

### SHORT SNORTS:

Navigation was taken out of the Trinity River Authority bill by the House. . . . Unemployment compensation benefits will be increased from \$20 to \$25 under a bill passed by the Senate. . . . A bill to permit the state to fix minimum prices on natural gas has failed so far to get House approval. . . . Water conservation groups won a round when the Senate decided to let the people vote on a \$100,000,000 bond issue next September. . . . The House is debating a counter bond plan. . . . Final action sent to the governor a bill to put "Section 1303-B" trust companies stocks under state securities control. . . . Also passed was one of the major corrective insurance bills dealing with fire and casualty companies. . . . Both houses have approved an increase in drivers' license fees to \$2 (every two years), effective September 1. It will permit the hiring of 200 additional highway patrolmen. . . . A bill to prohibit the carrying of pistols in automobiles was withdrawn after a swarm of protests by motorists. . . . Pensions of \$100 per month for teachers, after 10 years of service, was called for in a proposed constitutional amendment passed by the Senate. . . . Passed by both Houses and awaiting concurrence in amendments was a bill to ban objectionable comic books. . . . The House has refused to consider a bill calling for removal from office of elected public officials who refuse to give testimony when their agencies are being investigated.

### INTERESTING NOTES

I picked up a large city daily the other day, and on the front page was a picture of a person involved in a scandal. I opened the paper, and on page three was a picture of Winston Churchill and a write-up about his retirement.

The thought struck me that the headline should have been: "Historic Figure Replaced on Page One by Cheap Scandal." How tragic. What is our yardstick of importance?

Watch for some interesting developments on the small business front. There is a gigantic struggle going on behind the scenes between forces of monopoly and independents. This could turn into the "Battle of the Century."

## FARM BUREAU LISTS STAND OF CONGRESS MEMBERS ON GRAIN PRICE QUESTIONS

A price support program appears to be necessary to the future of agriculture, but it must be one which does not simulate production beyond the needs of the market.

Those consensus of opinion was voiced in a recent radio program by Congressman Harlan Hagen (D.) of California; Congressman Karl C. King (R.) of Pennsylvania; and AFBF President Charles B. Shuman.

Agreeing that a program of rigid price supports of supply, has been harmful to U. S. agriculture, the three men discussed H.R. 12—a bill to restore this program for a three year period.

H.R. 12 was reported out of the House Agriculture Committee by a 23 to 11 vote. Both Congressman Hagen and Congressman King voted against the measure.

Representative King said, "I consider the action of our committee in reporting this bill out as rescinding last year's action and sort of ordering a retrial—retrial of a system which last year we condemned and sentenced to modification."

"THE SENTENCE really was a light sentence in that it reduced rigidity only to 28½ percent made it flexible only to that extent, but it was a definite change ordered by the House in line with its judgment that we should turn away from socialistic scheme of guarantees and regulations gradually returning to a free market system," Mr. King said.

He pointed out that agriculture must eventually return to its position as an important segment of our free enterprise system, or "we must proceed to create a fixed system in which farm prices are set in Washington, and all farmers regimented into tight crop monopoly such as we already have in tobacco production."

Mr. King further explained that his opposition is based on the belief that government subsidy in any form tends to create overproduction, which puts farmers in a weak bargaining position in the economy.

Mr. KING called for turning away from rigid price supports out sticking to the idea of gradually so as not to suddenly destroy the program. He favored a trend toward lower supports until "we get down on a basis where the government guarantee

is not a prime factor in promoting production."

"My principal interest," said Congressman Hagen, "is in the man that I consider to be a typical farmer. That is a man who lives on the land, who intends to bring up his family in the business of farming, who is not merely an agent for some big city bank where they are both making a profit. Nor is he a man who is in such a low scale of economic activity that he is merely selling his labor or the land as a marginal scratcher of the soil or a tenant for some large landowner."

MR. HAGAN continued by saying that last year he voted for rigid supports. But he continued, "in working in this Congress trying to get what I consider equity for my cotton producers in California, I have come to the conclusion that one of the effects of a high level support program ultimately will be the forcing out of this typical farmer that I am most interested in in favor of some submarginal producer or some agent for a lending institution."

Mr. Shuman, who served as moderator, pointed out that rigid supports place a premium on inefficiencies and result in shifting production from areas best adapted, to areas that are marginal production areas or that aren't as well adapted to producing the crop.

Congressman Hagen referred to a statement in the minority report which accompanied H.R. 12, which said that the problems of the basic crop producers are being transferred to the producers of non-basic commodities in quota situations.

"I SUPPORT a program of supports for farm prices, but don't feel that the present—the mere continuation of 90 percent of parity is the answer to the present huge problem we have with surpluses and declining farm income," Mr. Hagen said.

Mr. HAGEN added, "I don't say that the farmer should be reduced to a disaster level of support, but certainly the level of support should be one which does not encourage non-farmers to get into the field with an assured return on their investment and thereby in a quota situation—which will, I think, inevitably occur—before out the typical legitimate farmer."

## From the Farmers Union:

By W. L. EDELMON

The temporary organization of the local unit of National Farmers Union which was formed in Bovina, February 24, 1955, has grown to the extent that it is to receive its charter from the national office in Denver with authority to conduct business in the name of National Farmer Union. Its membership has exceeded one hundred, necessary for a charter and is increasing constantly as the farmers of Parmer County are becoming acquainted with its program.

The Texas Farmers Union group recently in Washington made many Congressional contacts explaining the urgency of restoring price supports to grain sorghums for this year. The Texas Farmers Union farmers were able to tell the grain problem to every Texas congressman as well as many from other states. All the congressmen were very courteous to their reception and some of them expressed hope the support price of this commodity could be raised before harvest time, saying, "the Department of Agriculture is certainly disturbed."

The "Bustrippers" is a term that has been applied to the National Farmers Union program of sending to Washington a bus load of farmers from each state in Farmers Union. This program was started eight years ago and has grown until this year, when four buses, each week for eight straight weeks, have been in Washington during this session of congress.

Arrangements are made for the Bustrippers to carry their problems to the Department of Agriculture, to their congressmen or senators or other branches of government. This assures members of National Farmers Union that their wishes can at least be heard by those in our government who make the laws fixing the prices on farm products.

National Farmers Union leaders are recognized for their integrity and understanding of the farm problems. This statement from Clifford Hope, ranking Republican of the House Agriculture committee will illustrate: "Mr. Talbot, state president of North Dakota, and Johnny Baker, the paid economist of National Farmers Union, made the finest presentation before the House agriculture committee this session of Congress that I have ever seen before a committee of congress."

Mr. Hope answered when asked about the kind of program Farmers Union had before Congress. The testimony of all the groups interested in agriculture can be secured by writing to our congressman, Walter Rogers, and asking for a copy of the hearings on "Price Supports for Basic Commodities"—HR12. The basic philosophy of Farmers Union is and always has been that farmers should receive a fair share of the national income. In these times of controlled economy, the farm income must be kept high if the same protection is assured every other phase of our economy. A study of the national budget reveals 527 separate subsidies paid by our national government. This number of subsidies does not include special benefits received from contracts with the different departments of government, as mailing permits, river and harbor maintenance for shipping, control of freight rates to prevent competition between carriers and special franchises to utilities. A high level of prices for all farm commodities must be maintained if the cost of production continues to rise. This can best be done by government-supported prices in the form of loans which will provide an orderly marketing of farm products rather than "dumping" at harvest time.

**Dairy Scholarship Program Is Told**

AUSTIN.—Scholarships amounting to \$1,000 each for the study of dairy manufacturing at Texas A. & M. College and Texas Tech were approved this week by the Dairy Products Institute of Texas, Ralph D. Eyer of Wichita Falls, president, announced.

High school seniors interested in making the dairy industry their career may obtain application forms for the dairy scholarships from their county agent, high school principal, vocational agriculture teacher or the registrar at either Texas A. & M. college, or Texas Tech, Eyer said.

All applications must be sent to the registrar of one of the two colleges before June 1 along with a 300-word essay on "The Importance of the Dairy Industry to Texas," and a 100-word statement on "My Reasons for Choosing the Dairy Industry as a Career."

The two winners of the scholarships will receive \$250 a year for four years of college study.

Scholarships will also be awarded to high school seniors in 1956, 1957 and 1958.

Eyer said there was a shortage of trained personnel in the dairy industry and it was hoped that through the scholarship program the industry would interest more students in dairy manufacturing and thus fill some of the gaps in the industry.
