Nearly 200 farmers from a five-county area met in Friona, Tuesday night, in a Farm Bureau-sponsored session centered around the topic of "Development of the Milo Industry," with ample discussion of price supports, marketing methods and farm acreage trends.

Key speaker was Walter Hammond, president of the State Farm Bureau, and nationally-recognized farm authority.
Hammond approached the grain support disagreements with the comment that most disagreements come from "you knowing something that I don't, and vice versa." He continued, in comment on the present grain price arguments, that "it is most difficult to get the truth in time of confusion," urging jumping to conclusions on demands for high supports.

Aubrey Ellison, president of the county organization, served as master of ceremonies. The meeting was opened with prayer by Harry

Dr. A. W. Young of Texas Tech spoke on "Irrigated Soils," grouping his comments around four questions: What do we want in irrigated soils; How do we have in irrigated soils; How do we get what we want in irrigation; How do we maintain these soils.

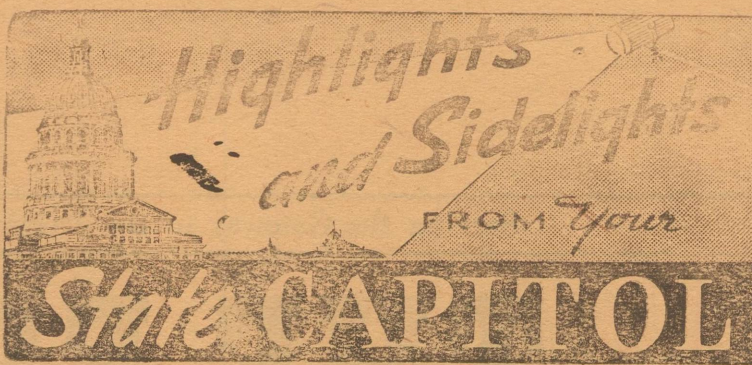

than \$30,000 to expedite block. Reveal sharp difference of opinion over the bill was the fact that it passed House engrossment by a close vote of 74 to 60.

Without surprise, the Legislature found it easier to spend money than to raise it. A few examples: Liberalizing of the teachers retirement system by constitutional amendment was voted by the House.

Governor Allan Shivers asked for emergency consideration by the Legislature of a bill to pay indemnity to owners of sheep and goats destroyed in an effort to halt a scabies epidemic.

Extension of the veterans land program was approved by a Senate committee. (Theoretically, this program is self-financing. The state issues bonds to buy the land, and the bonds are retired as the veterans make payments on their property.)

Requested by the governor was an appropriation to give underprivileged children the Salk polio vaccine.

Proposals were made by the Travis County delegation, that the state sponsor a supplement to state employee retirement benefits in the amount of \$600,000 per year.

CAR DEALERS LICENSES

Seventeen amendments were added in the House before the car dealers licensing bill gained initial approval.

Principal provisions of the bill would: Make new car dealers pay \$50 for a seller's license, and used car dealers \$25; prohibit offering for sale as a new car any vehicle that had been driven or towed more than 50 miles; and require dealers to post \$10,000 bond.

Original purpose of the bill, before the amendments were added, was to prevent used car dealers from offering latest model cars for sale as "new" cars.

TRINITY BILL FADES

A big segment of the Texas population lives in the Trinity River valley.

Hopes of those people for an organization to administer flood control, water conservation, and irrigation were dimmed when the Senate Water Committee rejected a Trinity River Authority Bill and sent it to a subcommittee.

Representative Barefoot Sanders, of Dallas, who pushed the bill through the House, blamed the railroad lobby for its failure in Senate committee, said Sanders.

"The railroads, in the final analysis, are responsible for this setback because of the propaganda they put out on the effects of this bill."

WATER BILL FALTERS

Trouble was ahead for a proposed constitutional amendment rated high on the list of administration-recommended water legislation.

Purpose of the measure would be to let the people vote on whether to authorize \$100 million in bonds to finance water projects of the state.

Passed to concure and asked for a conference committee.

VETERANS LAND PROBE

Far from abating, the veterans land investigation was expanding and reaching as far afield as Minnesota.

Cecil E. Burney, special assistant attorney general, told the Senate Investigating Committee that two years ago, when Attorney General John Ben Shepperd was vacationing in Minnesota, he happened to see former land commissioner Bascom Giles.

Giles invited Shepperd to visit his Minnesota farm of 8,000 acres.

"When the veterans land investigator to Minnesota. As a result of that investigation, Burney predicted, the people will hear that money from the veterans land program went to Minnesota to buy land for Texas.

"It is amazing," said Budney, "that some of the same people who anxious to buy cheap Minnesota land at high prices were the same persons who were anxious to sell cheap land in Texas to veterans for equally high prices."

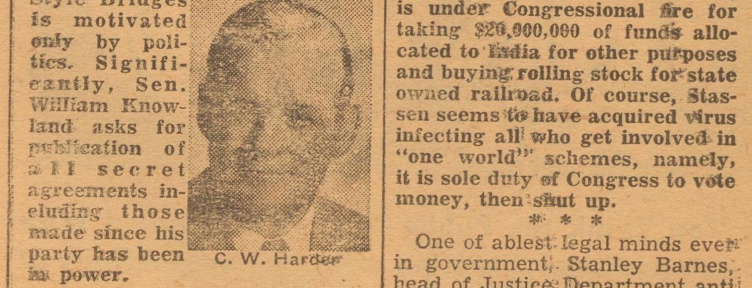

SMALL BUSINESS

Readers ask: "What does disclosure of Yalta agreement mean?"

Many pundits take stand disclosure was pure politics with 1955 elections in mind. Yet Washington observers are reluctant to agree such men as Sen. H. Style Bridges and Sen. H. H. Clegg are motivated only by politics.



Real issue now is prevention of future Yaltas. Almost daily examples show executive branch of government playing ring-around-the-rosy, with duly elected Congress. Harold Stassen, head of foreign aid, now in charge of disarmament, is under Congressional fire for taking \$20,000,000 of funds allocated to India for other purposes and buying rolling stock for state-owned railroad. Of course, Stassen seems to have acquired virus infecting all who get involved in "one world" schemes, namely, it is sole duty of Congress to vote money, then shut up.

Once majority of nation's legislators were well grounded in classics and acted with long roll of history's lessons in mind. This attribute has been largely lost in today's public life. So-called Bricker amendment introduced by Sen. John Bricker, defeated in last session, and now before this session, and backed by an overwhelming majority of nationwide membership of National Federation of Independent Business, recognizes this illuminated backdrop of history.

History shows republics founder when it is forgotten that it is basic human nature for unchecked messiah complex. Caesar was a noble and selfless Roman until he found he could push Roman Senate aside. Napoleon was an ardent republican until he found he could shackle French Assembly.

So blame for Yalta's bitter pill is shared by a Congress that permitted its authority to be usurped to such an extent secret agreements could be made without its approval.

Monday Morning Musings

NO PROBLEM HERE

Notice that considerable publicity this week is being given the "suitcase farmer" as cause of the excessive dust blowing and wind erosion.

Looks to us that this situation is at a minimum in Parmer County and should be publicized at every opportunity. The "suitcase farmer" term has been coined to indicate those landowners living off their farms - those who neglect the farming operations because they have too many other interests or are farmers merely on highly speculative basis.

Irrigation is the thing that has almost brought to extinction the loose suitcase practices here.

Profitable irrigation farming requires a close contact and kinship with the soil, vigilant watch over the motors and water if nothing else. Even the day laborer or the tenant on the irrigation farm must watch his operation more closely than does the dryland renter. The "off the farm" landlord cannot be blamed for much in our area. If he has an irrigation well, chances are that some good employee, renter or partner is watching that land, operating for the high returns necessary in modern irrigation farming.

The point is not far distant when there will be a farm family to every well in Parmer County. We definitely believe this.

And a more healthful condition we cannot imagine. The increasing population of wholesome, energetic farm families sets off an endless chain - more business to the retail merchant, increasing membership and accomplishments in the church, and larger and better equipped school systems - all in all making for a well-rounded community. Can see no menace of suitcase farming here - no siree.

EVERYONE BENEFITS

The Turners, O. J. Beene, Wesley Foster, Loyde Brewer and John Blackburn may have new fronts on their farms, but we're still ahead of them. We can look across the street and see all these new and modern installations, but they can only look across the street at the same old buildings. We're the lucky ones. Similar situations all over town should be ample incentive for a lot of us to improve.

NEW HOSTESS PLAN

In one section of this edition is found a "directory" or advertisement of a hostess plan being inaugurated in Friona.

To prevent mis-understanding, two points may need clarification:

It is not the place of this newspaper to comment on the merits of the plan, as probably these have been weighed by the cooperating merchants.

Wish someone would bring us up to date on the functions of the Water Conservation District, its executive and office personnel, together with a fairly recent report on plans of that organization.

Believe we can safely say we have a minimum of news releases from that body. Yet we see their clearly marked vehicles most every time we get on the road. Looks like considerable activity, but we and some of our readers still want to know "for what?"

Every so often a meeting is called, and sheafs of material are handed out, and lengthy speeches are made, and innumerable questions are answered. Well and good. 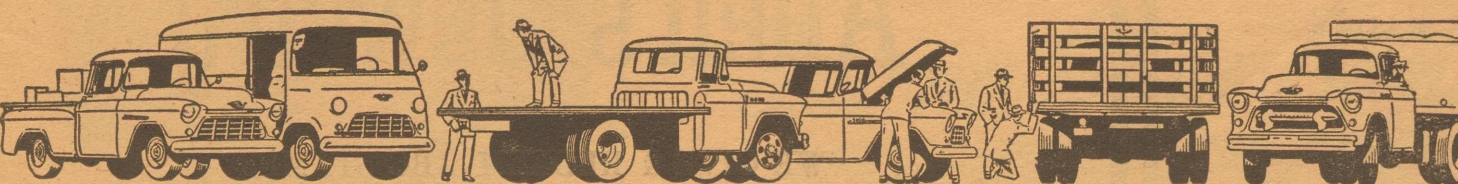

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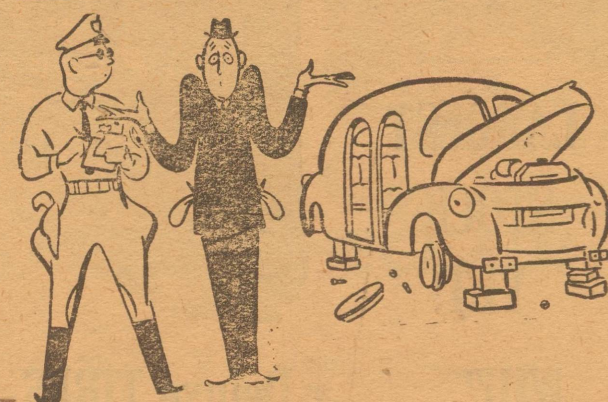

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LUMBERMEN

Washington Views -

The House passed H. R. 4393 by 372 yeas to 3 nays, 7 answering present, and 51 not voting. This bill was referred to as the fiscal year 1956 Navy Shipbuilding and Conversion Program. Actually, it will take four years to complete the program therein posed. It involves the construction of 34 new ships, 24 being combatant types. It authorizes 14,000 tons of landing craft and provides for conversion and modernization of 28 other vessels. The cost of the new ships and landing craft is one billion 150 million dollars. The remaining cost is 202 million for modernizing the 28 old vessels, and there is an item for advance material procurement and preproduction plans, amounting to around 33 and one-half million. This was all in the President's budget and is now being considered by the Appropriations' Committees. The bill before the House yesterday was an authorizing bill.

In the debate it was pointed out that our Navy today has 1100 ships in commission, 1300 ships in mothballs, 16,000 airplanes and 665,000 men. 407 of the 1100 ships are battleships, aircraft carriers, cruisers, destroyers and submarines. 26 are aircraft carriers. 150 vessels are now under construction and 13 more have been authorized but construction has not started. Four of the 105 vessels are FORRESTAL class carriers, 11 are destroyers and 11 are escort vessels. Nine submarines are included, four being nuclear powered. These vessels are being constructed at 80-odd shipyards, and the overall cost will be about 2 billion 300 million dollars.

This gives you some picture of the present strength of the Navy of this country and the increase that will be provided by the new authorization. One of the big controversies concerns whether or not aircraft carriers are obsolete. The answer to this will probably come if and when we have another war. As the matter presently stands, we would be taking a serious chance not to provide a sea-going aircraft fighter planes to protect our long range bombers. Frankly, I do not feel that all of the information that is contained in this letter should be made public, but it is well known in every corner of the globe and is set out in detail in the Congressional Record and in the hearings before the Armed Services Committee.

The Afro-Asian Conference

You have been reading lately about the Afro-Asian Conference in Bandung, where the Chinese communists seem to be taking a terrific beating at the hands of the free nations. Not much

has been said about it, but this country is indebted to Congressmen Adam Clayton Powell, of New York, who is attending the conference as a United States observer. Congressman Powell did a masterful job of putting the communists, both Chinese and Russian, on the defensive, from which they have not recovered. He is entitled to much acclaim and credit for his contribution against communism at this conference.

Farmers Versus Foreign Aid

It was recently announced that the administration would ask for three and one-half billion dollars for new Foreign aid money. This announcement came shortly after a small group of farmers from the Southwest had been in Washington trying to obtain slight relief from the drastic price support cuts engineered by the Department of Agriculture. Many people, including this writer, find it impossible to understand policies which are depressing farm prices going along side by side with practices increasing grants to foreign countries. One fellow suggested that what we need to do is put Benson and his policies in charge of the foreign aid program and let Stassen and the foreign aid appropriations be used in the Department of Agriculture. He might have something.

THE GAS HEARINGS

A witness at the gas hearings who represented quite a utility empire referred to his empire and another giant fuel corporation as guinea pigs. One committee member remarked that they might look like guinea pigs to the witness, but they resembled full-grown hogs to him.

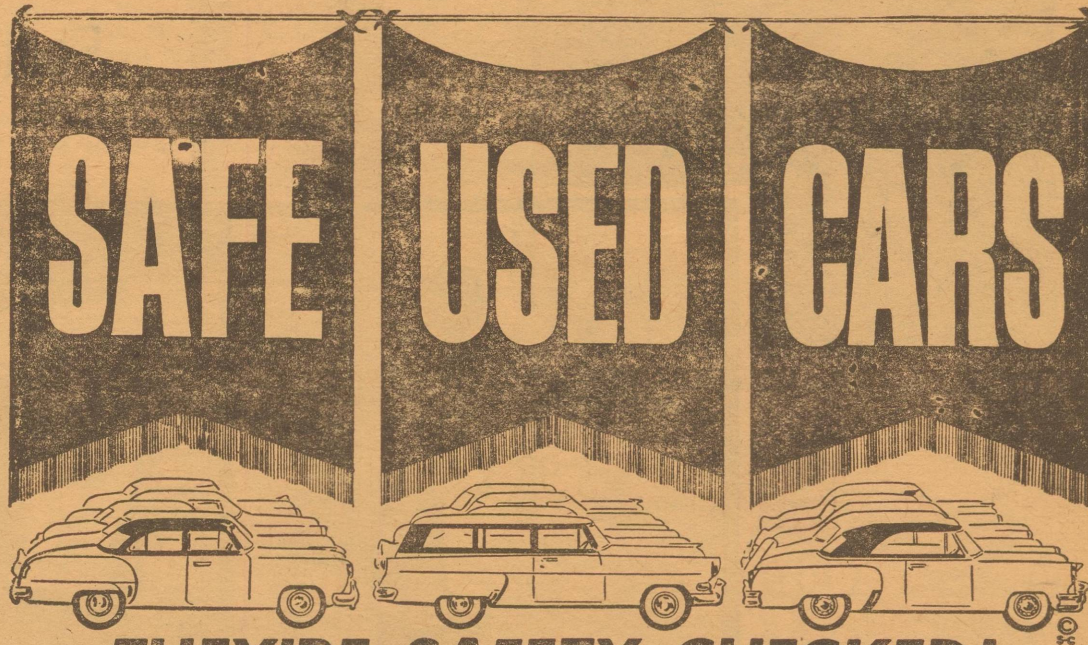
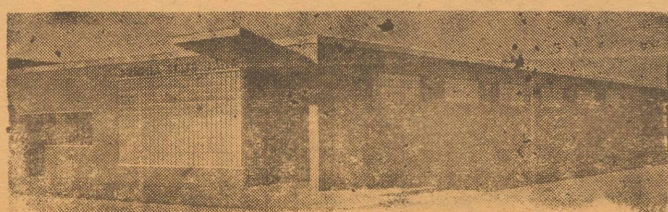
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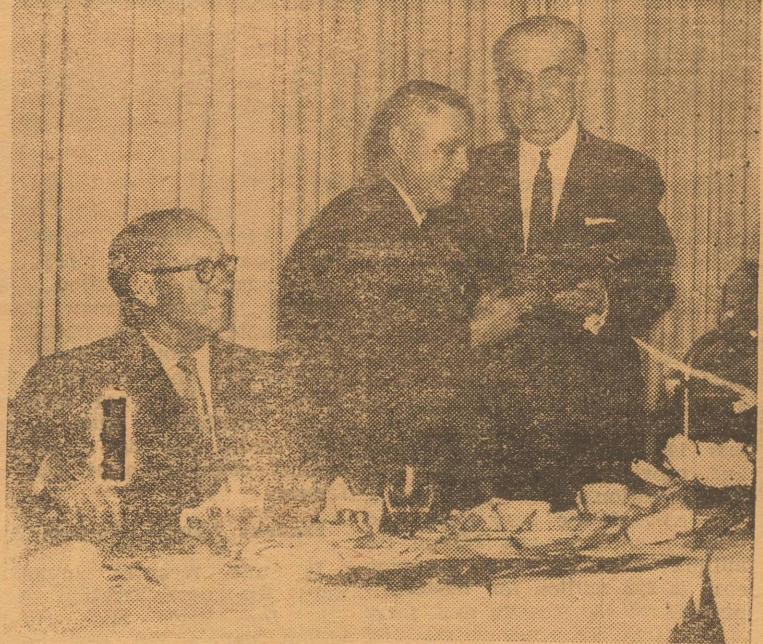

Dividends Announced by Southern Farm Bureau Insurance Companies Serving Area (Adv.)

Announcement of a 50 per cent dividend by the Southern Farm Bureau Casualty Insurance Company means a savings of \$16,616.22 to farmers of Farmer County, according to President A. J. Ellison of the local County Farm Bureau.

The farm leader said that 529 Farm Bureau members in the county would receive dividend payments. The amount each receives will be half of the amount of his premiums paid during the one-year period ending March 31, 1955. Dividends will be paid in semi-annual payments, as policies come up for renewal.

This is the second year that Farm Bureau members in Texas have received 50 per cent dividends on their auto insurance premiums. Raymond Euler, service agent for the County Farm Bureau, said that the dividends were made possible because farmers and ranchers were found to be preferred risks.

Since the Southern Farm Bureau Casualty Insurance Company began providing lowcost insurance for Farm Bureau members in Texas, the premium rates for auto insurance for all farmers have decreased 20 per cent, he said. The company was able to declare a dividend again this year in spite of the fact that the premium rate to farmers living on the farm was lowered by 15 per cent a year ago, he added. The 50 per cent dividend totals \$1,600,000 for the entire state. Some 57,000 policyholders in Texas will reap this savings. The dividend became effective April 1.

Texas is one of six southern states served by the Southern Farm Bureau Casualty Insurance company. The others are Arkansas, Florida, Louisiana, Mississippi and South Carolina. The Farm Bureau in these states own and control the company. Assets of the company at the end of 1954 totaled \$12,128,401.54.

Q — I am planning to take a correspondence course under the Korean GI Bill. For purposes of my GI allowance payments, what does VA consider as the beginning and ending dates of the course?

A — The beginning date of your course is the date on which the school furnishes you with your first lesson. The ending date is the date the school serves your final lesson.

Q — I hold a permanent GI insurance policy. Since it has been in force for more than one year, I have the right to borrow money on it. How much can I borrow?

A — You may borrow an amount that does not exceed 94 percent of the reserve of your permanent GI policy.

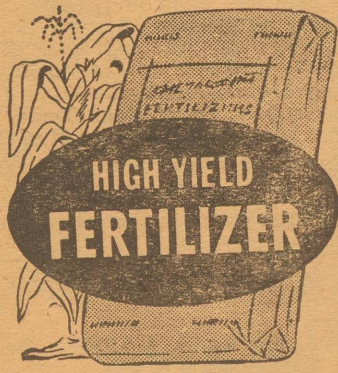
Q — I am drawing a VA pension, and I have just received a legacy that will push my yearly income above the maximum allowed by the law. Am I supposed to inform the VA about it?

A — Yes. You should notify the VA immediately, so that your pension payments can be stopped. Failure to inform VA of your added income will result in an overpayment of pension that you may have to pay back to the Government.

Q — Where may I obtain the forms required to apply for a GI home loan?

A — You should be able to obtain the necessary forms from your lender. Lenders who do not have the forms may get them from their nearest VA Regional Office.

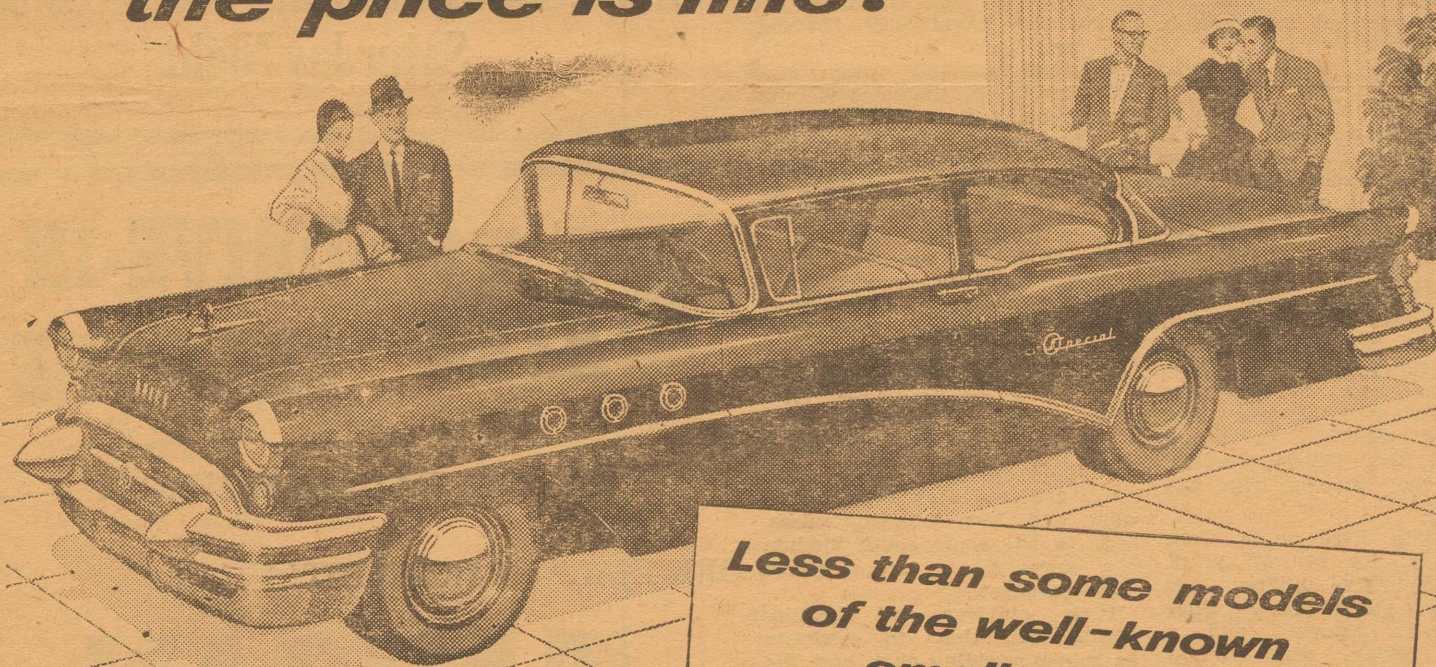

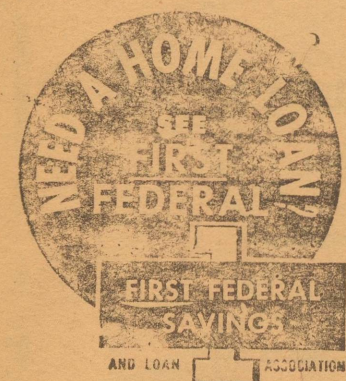

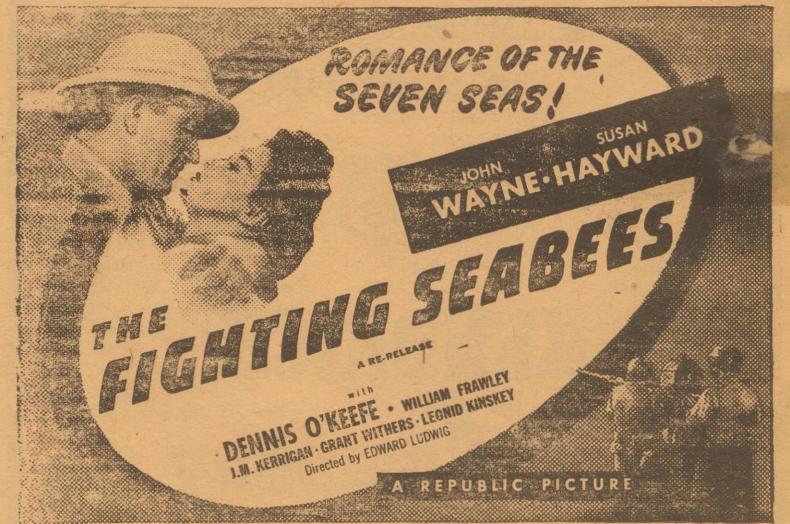
