

Coahoma RCCI group begins identifying hinderances to growth

COAHOMA Community leaders here learned that turning a town's fortunes around takes time and lots of effort.

Fortunately, they don't seem daunted by the task. The Coahoma edition of the Rural Community

College Initiative - a community development program aimed at towns in rural areas - held its monthly meeting Tuesday, and most of the time was spent identifying impediments to the community's growth.

Solutions to those problems, they were told, will take some time.

Gene Theodori, a rural sociologist with Texas A&M University who helped establish a RCCI program in Big Spring, told his audience of about 20 people that a key to community development identifying and removing obstacles to a town's growth.

"A community is a natural commodity that is going to develop on its own as long as the impediments to that development are removed," Theodori said. "What we're going to do here in

remove them." Those in attendance identified several areas that were in need of improvement, including:

 Sense of community — Many who spoke at Tuesday's meeting said that Coahoma suffers from a lack of community identity because of several factors, most notably apathy.

'The attitude here seems to be that this is what we are," Coahoma Mayor Bill Read said. "People tend to think that we've always been this way, and there's nothing we can do about it."

Loma Jean agreed that there was a general lack of interest in the community, describing many residents as Coahoma is ... identify "no-shows and no-cares."

 Housing — Many at the meeting decried the lack of quality in housing in Coahoma, saying that too many dilapidated, abandoned houses mar the community.

· Youth activities -Another problem commonly agreed upon was the lack of activities for people young Coahoma, which leads to problems such as drugs and violence.

Other problem areas identified included lack of employment opportunities, adequate shopping, a need to improve school facilities and a general aging of the town's population.

Theodori was quick to reassure people at the meeting that they were not alone in their concerns.

"If you go to other towns, you'll see these same issues," he said.
"The only difference between here and other places is how the issues are ranked."

The group will now turn its attention toward addressing these problem areas, and will begin that process at their June 14 meeting.

"We will go forward," Theodori told the group. "We're not stopping."

"This is a ridiculous bill ... I don't know how this bill got to the floor. It's stupid.'

But, proponents say they like the measure because it gives parents support in addressing their teenagers' behavior.

"I think that to have suggestive performances is not good for the girls or the guys at a time in life when hormones are already very active," said Cathie Adams, president of the Texas Eagle Forum.

Woman helped husband fake death

GEORGETOWN (AP) -A few weeks after her in neighboring Burnet picion: The body was not husband was supposedly burned beyond recognition in a car wreck, Molly Daniels introduced her 4year-old son to her new boyfriend, Jake Gregg.

However, investigators said Gregg looked much like her dead husband, Clayton Wayne Daniels, with his hair dyed black.

Molly Daniels pleaded guilty in a Williamson County state district court Tuesday to insurance fraud and hindering apprehension for her role in a plot to use the corpse of an 81-year-old woman to fake her husband's

A jury will decide her punishment this week for the felonies. She faces probation to 20 years in prison.

Court records showed that Daniels' husband, Daniels, Clayton exhumed the remains of Charlotte Davis for use in the scheme. The records show Daniels had robbed her grave last year, one year after the woman's death.

Clayton Daniels is jailed results confirmed his sus-County pending trial on Daniels'. arson charges.

Assistant District Attorney Jane Starnes blamed greed for the bizarre case surrounding the Leander couple. She cited a \$110,000 life insurance policy taken out two years before the wreck.

Defense lawyer Thomas Vasquez said that Molly Daniels did it for her children, ages 4 and 1. Vasquez said that at the time, Clayton Daniels was soon to have begun serving a jail sentence for sex crimes involving children, and the terms of his sentence would not allow contact with his children.

In court, investigators said the June 18 wreck, in which the scorched green Chevrolet was found at the bottom of cliff in Burnet County, seemed fishy from the start.

Suspecting foul play, Texas Ranger Garth Davis took a DNA sample from the body and from Clayton Daniels' mother. When the sample came back months later, the

"We have people who say the name of my town three ways: allsteen, all-stun, all-stine."


Delta knows about that man with the long name. He was a member of a prominent black family. The name was genuine and legal and had 26 words in it.

Immigrant-bashing vigilantes to take 'dog and pony show' on road

nergized by the completion of their month-long mission — patrolling the Arizona-Mexico border against "an invasion" of illegal immigrants - a group of selfappointed guardians

of U.S. sovereignty declared their Minuteman Project a huge success last week.

Yet their numbers were not impressive. It took 876 Minuteman volunteers a month to spot only 335 illegal immi-

grants. The very **Border Patrol agents** they said they were

trying to help called them a nuisance. And President Bush took it even further. He said they were doing the work of vigilantes.

But Minuteman founder Jim Gilchrist has no problem with that label. As he dismissed his troops, at a last-day meeting outside a church in Palominas, he reportedly admitted that he is "proud to be a vigilante."

What matters, the vigilantes said, is that they proved the border can be patrolled by a group of civilians who find it necessary to do the work the government is not

Minuteman co-organizer Chris Simcox reportedly told the group that, lacking adequate leadership from the government, the American people will lead them-

selves "in an effort to secure our borders, to protect our families, our children, our neighbors and our way of life.

immigrants they are trying to stop. That blatant contradiction is not important.

What matters, they say, is that their message got out to the rest of the country: They are tired of illegal immigrants, and they are not going to take it anymore.

Of course, immigrant and human rights advocates see the Minuteman volunteers as the realization of their worst nightmares an army of American xenophobes rushing to the Mexican border to take the law into their own hands.

But wait, it gets better — or worse, depending on your point of view.

Gilchrist warned his followers that unless their anti-immigrant crusade continues, the Minuteman Project is "going to be viewed as just a month-long dog and pony show."

And so, now that they have completed their Arizona mission, the vigilantes said they plan to expand not only to other states bordering Mexico, but to some bordering Canada — in Idaho, North Dakota, Vermont and Michigan.

They are also preparing a new phase of their project, which consists of identifying and organizing demonstrations — all over the country - against employers who hire illegal immigrants.

It means that their "dog and pony show" will soon be coming to your local diner, car wash, nursing home or hotel - or even your backyard, if you happen to have an immigrant landscaper trimming your bushes.

And amazingly, this xenophobic militia may actually be welcomed by officials in some states.

"They've done a terrific job," said California Gov. Arnold

Schwarzenegger on a Los Angeles radio station. "And they have cut down the crossing of illegal immigrants by a huge percentage."

You have to wonder where Schwarzenegger gets his numbers.

The governor's remarks came only a week after apologizing for putting his foot in his mouth with another comment about illegal immigrants.

"Close the borders," Schwarzenegger had told a gathering of newsp. per editors. "Close the borders in California, and all across Mexico and the United States." One day later, following a tor-

rent of criticism, Schwarzenegger blamed his poor command of the English language and said he meant "securing the borders, not closing them." But now, by condoning the work

of the Minuteman volunteers instead of calling on the federal government to expand the Border Patrol, the Austrian-born governor can no longer blame his English. When he said we should close

the border, instead of securing it. he quipped that maybe he should "go back to school and study" English.

Put if he is praising vigilantes who interfere with law enforcement, maybe he should go back for a civics course.

Or maybe he should take a U.S. history lesson, so he can figure out why, for immigrants, he is rapidly becoming an Uncle Tom.

MILWAUKEE young girl growing up in Meenakshi Jayaraman never dated. She came from a conservative Hindu family, and even though her friends went on dates, Jayaraman always knew she would her husband through the ancient prac-

tice of arranged marriage. Years later, she's still surprised it worked as well as it did.

She and her husband, Arvind Ganesan, hadn't met when the families exchanged their names in early 2001. He finished his education at Marquette University and was working in Madison, Wis., at a small company.

Before they met, they knew of their similarities: close-knit families, devout Hindus, strong education and interest in arts and culture, particularly dance. They started with formal messages that began with "Hi" and graduated to love poems, a mutual concern for one another and signing emails, "With tons of love.

Even before they met, they believed they had something special.

"Love means sharing your life or spending the rest of your life with someone who not only cares about you but respects you, likes your interest and helps you pursue it, and is just there for you always what." matter Jayaraman said.

When people think of love and marriage, they tend to think of the first leading to the second. That's the way it's been in-the United States for denenations. But for couwho decided on an arranged marriage - a

tradition that is still popular in many parts of the world — it is usually the opposite.

In arranged marriages, other factors such as education, culture future goals, family duty and religion take higher priority. Love is learned and can come afterward, they say.

An enduring tradition For immigrants who

come to the United States, a large number look for spouses from their native country. While love marriages are growing more popular in India, much of India and other countries continue this ancient practice, said Barbara Ramusack, a professor who teaches modern Indian history at the University of Cincinnati. Marriages are based less on the andividuals and more on families coming

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together, she said. These marriages also last longer because divorce remains taboo throughout India.

"Indians would say marriage is too important to be based on love, which is frequently based on sexual attraction," she said. Their idea is you can get married and learn to love the individual; that love can be a learned behav-

In India, arranged marriage has survived for many centuries. The arranged marriage system was born out of the caste system, which is a pattern of social classes in Hinduism. At the top of the system were the priests or Brahmans; at the bottom were the laborers. Marriage within top classes of the caste system was permitted until it became stricter.

The caste that people were born into was their social network. From their caste, people found their marriage partners.

Families usually initiate contact. Even though families have a big part in any marriage, in many cases prospective brides and grooms can reject a possible partner.

Over the years, as South such as Asians Pakistanis, Sri Lankans and Bangladeshis — have migrated to England. Australia and the United States, the arranged marriage system also has evolved.

Scanning the personals As families have wanted to keep with ancient practices, they've had to employ modern techniques to do so: personal ads and the Internet.



Hardbacks are: "The Fiend in Human," by John MacLachlan Gray; this is a Victorian England thriller; and "The Carbon Murder,"

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
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

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

Hammond, Ind.: If she doesn't want more kids, SHE should have the surgery. It's her medical problem, not his.


Naples, Italy: Three years after my vasectomy, my wife wanted a divorce. My second wife would like to have children, and so would I, but the reversal has been unsuccessful.
