Friona emerged as undisputed winner, both of the season league play and of the Shaughnessy play-off, taking a thrilling and close game Sunday from Umbarger, 11-10.

Barrett pitched the entire game, giving up 9 hits, accounting for 8 strikeouts, and allowing 2 walks. Brandt of Umbarger was losing pitcher, giving up 12 hits, 2 walks, and chalking up 3 strikeouts.

Umbarger took the first lead, 1-0, in the first inning, Friona unable to bring in a run until the fourth. Then in the fifth, Friona broke loose to bring in 6 runs, holding a comfortable lead until a late-game rally of the visitors held the results in jeopardy until a Friona double steal in the eighth. Umbarger's luck seemed concentrated in the eighth inning, when they made a real threat for the championship cup.

## Youths Bear Brunt City Court Fines

September records of the Friona Justice of the Peace Court reveal only four cases to date, two filed by Sheriff Lovelace and two by Patrolman Kirkwood.

Bobby Hix was apprehended and convicted of a drunkenness charge, fined \$50 and costs.

Bobby Fillpot was assessed \$50 and costs on a speeding charge. The charges signed by Kirkwood were for driving infractions.

In City Court (presided over by Judge Lovelace also) only cases to date have been filed by Deputy Roberts against local youths, all involving traffic violations. Roberts signed complaints with charges including parking in hospital driveway, speeding and racing, driving without proper title to car, driving without tail lights, driving without out-of-state tags and driving without windshield safety inspection sticker.

## Travelers Injured As Car Overturned

One person was hospitalized and two others escaped injury last Friday afternoon about 1:45 o'clock, when the 1951 Mercury sedan in which they were riding had a blow-out and overturned two miles east of Black on Highway 60.

Hospitalized in the Parmer County Hospital was Mrs. Patsy Kathleen Snow, 21, of Springfield, Mo., driver of the car. She received numerous cuts and bruises on her face and head and her right ear was almost severed. She was released from the local hospital Wednesday of this week. Mrs. Snow's husband, Wilvan R., and son, Ronnie Lee, were given emergency treatment at the Friona hospital and released soon after the accident. They were brought to the hospital in Marcum-Claborn ambulances.

Highway Patrolman James Kirkwood, who investigated the accident, said the Snows were traveling east when the left rear tire of the car blew out, causing the car to swerve to the left and then back to the right before overturning.

Mr. Snow had been stationed at Camp Pendleton, Calif., and had received his discharge from the Marines last week. The Snows were returning to their home in Springfield, Mo.

## J. W. Wright Delivers First Bale '55 Cotton

First bale of 1955 cotton last Friday as delivered in the area.

J. W. Wright, living 3 miles east of Hub, took the first bale to the Mills & Fleming Gin where it was ginned late Friday afternoon, then brought to the Friona State Bank where it was displayed on the sidewalk over the week-end.

The September 9 date for first

bale was three days earlier than the first one of last year, that one grown by J. C. Redwine, also south of Friona.

The Wright bale weighed out 546 lbs. from a 2,000-lb. load, according to the ginners. It was of Georgia Hi-Bred variety.

A. G. Earp, cotton buyer, purchased the bale at a premium price of 50 lb.

### Parmer Resident Is Sentenced on Assault

Hiley Lucy, Parmer County resident of the Clay's Corner area, Wednesday was placed in the county jail after an early morning assault and battery offense and speedy trial the same day.

County Attorney Sheehan reports that Lucy ran a stop light in Muleshoe at a 2 a. m. hour, with a Muleshoe deputy giving chase, which continued for several miles. Lucy and a companion pulled out into an open field where the deputy accosted them. As the officer was taking license data, etc., Lucy is alleged to have assaulted him, disarming him, then dishing out a severe pummeling that placed the deputy in the hospital.

Lucy, in trial before Judge Smith, was assessed 60 days in the county jail plus a fine of \$100.

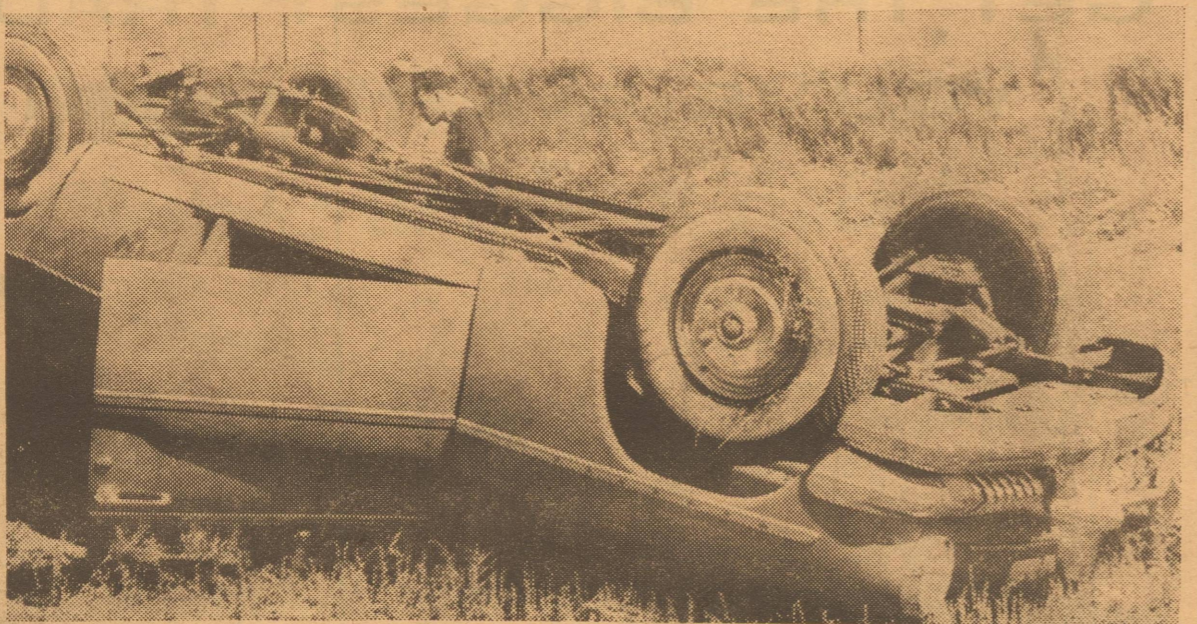

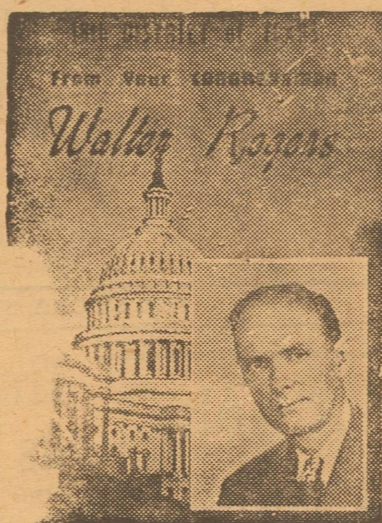

To the People of the 18th District:  
**BACK TO THE CAPITAL CITY**

The Rogers family arrived back in the Capital City at 11:59 p. m., September 8. It was the end of a long day and a long trip. There is a common expression in this section of the country that a trip to the south or southwest is "down hill." This no doubt finds its origin in the fact that the top side of a map is north and the lower side south. Although the Panhandle is well over two thousand feet higher above sea level than most of the eastern section, I must admit that the Rogers family found the trip home to the Panhandle "down hill and easy sailing all the way." The trip back to Washington was up hill all the way and I don't know whether the children dragging their feet had anything to do with it, but it was sure a hard pull. This is true no matter how the trip is made. I had been all ways but one so we came back that route. We left Texas at Texarkana, crossed Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, turned north through Georgia into the Carolinas, both North and South, anti-goggin across the state of Virginia to Richmond and north to Washington, D. C. Our last day

on the road is one of the most important ones in our life, not only because we arrived back in Washington safely, but because it is the birthday of our youngest. We started the day at Seneca, South Carolina, which is about 40 miles from Greenville. First on the schedule was the fanfare and trumpet blowing that always takes place in the Rogers household on everyone's birthday, including the old man's. Mary Catherine was seven. Four of her birthdays have been celebrated on the road. Her mother told her that she was the only girl she had even known who had had birthdays all over the United States. This pleased Mary C. very much.

Many interesting things happened on the trip, some humorous and some otherwise. We drove into a filling station in a southern town and the minute the wheels stopped, Robert, the 8-year-old, was out and gone as was his usual practice. Just as we started to leave Jean counted heads and found only five. She jumped out of the car in a startled manner and said, "Where is Robert?" A short, fat negro attendant grinned and said, "He quit." Jean said, "I'm talking about my Robert, not yours." We found him at the funny book stand and departed in good order.

### HIGHWAYS

A trip through seventeen states and the District of Columbia makes one feel that he is pretty well versed on the highway situation. It is not difficult to point out many of the highway defects in the several states. However, it is very difficult to provide an over-all solution to the many arms of the problems involved. The Texas highways, in my opinion, are far and away ahead of most states. In many of the other states the highways are poor and the traffic regulations are cumbersome. There must be some drastic changes, about which much complaint can be expected. However, we would be foolish to spend money on a gigantic highway program without using a little foresight to correct some of the mistakes that have been made in trying to do patchwork on antiquated systems. The program must be a well planned program, fully recognizing the increased traffic that can be expected from the increased production of automobile equipment and the inevitable increase in the population. Had such a program been presented at the last Congress, it would have been adopted.

# Editorially Speaking

Believe the largest crowd ever assembled in Friona was on the streets Saturday for the final day of the County Fair. At least a number of the old timers have come forward with this estimate.

We think the Fair showed a number of improvements this year, with the mistakes more evident, possibly, than before—all of which should lay the groundwork for an even better organized and planned Fair in future years.

We pass the following observations on for what they are worth. They have been made by visitors and residents—not our own ideas, but the comments of residents over the area:

The parade showed market improvement. Only a greater number of merchant entries is needed—and that badly.

The barbeque was again a prime attraction. Selection of the day for the feed seemed to be main controversy. Some think the free barbeque should be on opening day to start the fair off with a "bang," others think it should be on

the final day. This should be studied most carefully before another year.

The livestock exhibits were scanty, to say the least. Probably diminishing number of livestock in the area, coupled with the fact that most livestock activity is directed toward the Spring Fat Stock Show, accounts for the poor showing at the Fair. Maybe more emphasis should be made on community exhibits, women's handiwork, etc.

A parade or rodeo would be a fine "starter" for the fair, to attract early interest, getting everyone in the Fair mood.

More bunting, flags, and other decorations should be displayed.

Community days could be designated, with one day as "Rhea Day," one as "Bovina Day," etc.

A paid employee might prove advantageous in managing Fair preparations, devoting full time for several weeks at least to the project.

AUSTIN. — There is an election coming up next week in which the "Candidates" are not known. It is the election of Texas' new Democratic national committee man—to replace ousted Wright Morrow.

A nominating committee will make a recommendation on September 21. Its choice will be revealed at a meeting of the State Executive Committee in Ft. Worth on Sept. 22.

Discussed for the place have been former Congressman Lloyd M. Bentsen, Jr., of McAllen; Congressman Joe Kilgore, also of McAllen; Rep. J. O. Gillham of Brownfield; and James E. Wheat of Woodville. Wheat now is secretary of the State Executive Committee.

Possibility that State Chairman George W. Sandlin might get the nod also has been discussed.

Gov. Allan Shivers has indicated his desire that the new committee man be someone who will work with the National Committee.

National Chairman Paul M. Butler said that the new member must have voted for Adlai Stevenson in 1952 and be acceptable to Governor Shivers, House Speaker Sam Rayburn, and U. S. Senator Lyndon Johnson.

State Chairman Sandlin will address a meeting of the Democratic Club of Ft. Worth on the same date the committee meets. He will reply to the speech made to the same group by Morrow just before the state committee voted Morrow out. Morrow has severely criticized Sandlin. The invitation to speak was extended in order to show that the club, while conservative, was not dominated by the ultra-ultra conservative backers of Morrow.

### Candidates Active

Friends of Agri. Commr. John White met in Austin over the weekend to encourage his entry into the governor's race. White is one of several under consideration by the Loyalist forces.

Brown Bailey, Midland attorney and leader in the effort, said the group conferring with White was not allied with any political faction. "We simply want White to run," he said.

Reuben Senterfitt of San Saba is the only announced candidate for governor so far. He's busy building his fences. Active also is State Senator Jimmy Phillips of Angleton, although as yet unannounced. Other possible is James P. Hart, former chancellor of the University of Texas. And Will Wilson, associate justice of the supreme court.

Not to be overlooked is Coke Stevenson, former governor. It appears there may be a build-up urging him to enter. Stevenson has been inactive politically since his 87-vote defeat by Lyndon Johnson in the Senate race seven years ago. Look for House Speaker Jim Lindsey of Texarkana—in the attorney general's race. Also being

talked for that job, if Hart runs for governor, is Will Wilson. He would not run against Hart.

### New Veterans Land Plan

Texas' veterans land program is off to a fresh start.

Under new laws the board places responsibility for administration squarely on the shoulders of the land commissioner. Ex-officio members of the governor and attorney general, are charged only with policy-making functions.

Commissioner J. Earl Rudder said he was ready to accept the responsibility.

Local advisory committees, blue-printed in the 54th Legislature's reform laws, are already being formed. These committees, appointed by commissioners courts, will provide a check on findings of state appraisers.

Land purchasers who are delinquent in their payments, have been notified to pay up or forfeit their land. Many delinquencies involve block deals believed to be of questionable nature.

Rudder indicated the board should be able to start considering loan applications again soon. All the original \$100,000,000 was exhausted under the administration of his predecessor, Bascom Giles. Some, however, has been recovered by court action.

Giles has been sentenced to the state penitentiary on charges of accomplice to theft and consenting to accept a bribe.

### Representatives Appointed

Ten appointments to the Texas Legislative Council, an interim research group, have been made by House Speaker Jim Lindsey.

Names were Rept. Ben Glusing of Kingsville, Tom King of Dallas, James W. Yancy of Houston, Joe Burkett Jr., of Kerrville, E. F. Crim of Henderson, Pearce Johnson of Austin, Obie Bristow of Big Spring, Gustin Garrett of Raymondville, W. G. Kirklin of Odessa and William S. Healy of Paducah. Lt. Gov. Ben Ramsey will select five senators to complete the council. Its duty will be to study pressing legislative needs prior to the next session.

Lindsey also appointed Wade F. Spillman chairman of the house investigating committee. Its tasks include further land office inquiry. Other members are Reps. Reagan R. Huffman of Marshall, Jesse M. Osborn of Muleshoe, Jack Welch of Marlin and Scott McDonald of Ft. Worth.

Named to the water resources committee were Reps. Stanley Banks, Jr., of San Antonio, Leroy Saul of Kress and Bill Wood of Tyler.

Farm Bureau policies for 1956 will be decided by the membership between now and the second week in November. Your county officials are hoping that every one of you will avail yourselves of the opportunity you will have to present your suggestions at the open forum meeting that will be announced soon. Over 1,000 of you will receive personal invitations, through our mailing list, and all of you will be just as welcome to come and participate in the discussions that will determine what your resolutions committee will present at the county convention for final vote, just a little later. It seems that perhaps there has never been a time when it was more urgent for the people who till the soil to speak, than now. Every powerful group that exists, outside of agriculture is lobbying for a farm program that will benefit others, without consideration for the farmer himself. Unfortunately, we have some government authorities of influence who are willing to listen to those who have no interest in farming except as it can be used to further their own cause.

There are many matters vital to your future, and to all Americans, that can be guarded to a great extent through Farm Bureau with

your active support now. The "Right to Work" law of Texas is facing a great threat, and is very important to all farmers. . . . A feed law is badly needed, to insure you that you get what you pay for when you buy expensive rations for livestock and poultry. . . . Many think it is wrong for a farmer to be fined for taking his family to church (or anywhere else) in a farm licensed pickup, yet it has been done, and under present state law can continue to be done. . . . What do you think?

The tendency of federal agencies usurping state's rights as guaranteed to you by the Constitution needs your attention. Too many people are unaware of the extent of the trend for the safety of the individual's rights. A national farm program is important to the future of the farmer and of the nation. And you are urged to participate in the meetings called to study these problems that face you.

SHOTGUNS must be plugged permanently to three-shell capacity, may not be larger than 10 gauge. Hunting doves with rifles prohibited.

NO HUNTING permitted in game refuges and game reserves.

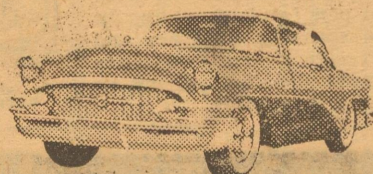

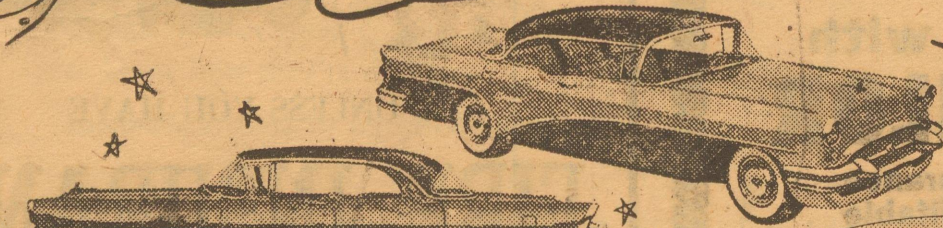

## National Farm Export Figure Shows Increase

COLLEGE STATION — All U. S. agricultural exports for the month of July were valued at about \$265 million as contrasted with \$213 million for the same month a year earlier.

The 25 per cent gain, says John G. McHaney, extension economist, was chiefly due to government export programs which increased shipments of principal grains, tobacco and some fats and oils. Exports of wheat, corn, grain sorghums, soybeans and cottonseed oil improved.

Cotton exports, points out the economist, were less than half of the July, 1954, total. Foreign buyers limited purchases to short-term needs because of uncertainty as to this country's cotton export policy in the new marketing year.

United States agricultural exports for the fiscal year which ended on June 30 total \$3,153 million or 7 per cent more than for the previous year.

McHaney says that government programs are expected to continue to give strength to farm exports during the current year. As a result of recently enacted legislation, by the U. S. Department of Agriculture for foreign currency sales culture now amounts to \$1.5 billion for the three-year period ending June 30, 1957. Authority for foreign currency sales by the International Cooperation Administration for the current fiscal year amounts to \$300 million.

These facts coupled with generally favorable business conditions in most foreign countries should help to maintain or increase the present rate of farm exports, says McHaney.

Chartered busses of Tech alumni and friends are planned from Dallas, Houston, Fort Worth and San Antonio. L. C. Walker, Tech Ex-Students' Association executive secretary, reported.

The Tech meeting may assume even larger proportions as interest mounts among Red Raider backers in all parts of the state and even out-of-state.

The Tech Ex-Students Chapter in Austin—which has 81 members—will sponsor the alumni meeting, with Bob Williams and Jack Walker, both 1949 class members, handling the arrangements.

COLLEGE STATION — Sales of all fertilizers throughout Texas, January 1 - June 30, inclusive, totaled 375,177 tons against 374,308 tons during the first six months of 1954.

According to Dr. J. F. Fudge, state chemist, this "very slight increase was due mainly to enlarged sales of materials—from 154,197 tons in 1954 to 167,341 this year."

At the same time tonnage of mixed good dropped 6 per cent below that of last year, or 207,836 tons this year and 220,111 tons in the first six months of 1954. Notwithstanding, these totals represent, respectively, 55 per cent of the total tonnage sold the past spring and 59 per cent in the same period one year ago.

## Inspection Stickers Now Available for Vehicles

AUSTIN, Sept. 13. (Spl.) — Col. Homer E. Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, announced today that the Public Safety Commission has set September 15, 1955, through April 15, 1956, as the new Motor Vehicle Inspection period for state motorists.

Garrison pointed out that this will give Texas car owners a full seven months to report to one of the more than 4,000 licensed inspection stations in the state for a safety check of their vehicles.

Indicating trends, Dr. Fudge says that the 1955 sales of the 5-10-5 grade (93,544 tons) were about 25,000 tons lower than five years ago, while more than 37,000 tons of higher analyses grades of the 1-2-1 ratio were sold this year compared with only 14,000 tons five years ago.

"Over a five-year period sales of the 10-10-10 and higher grades of the 1-1-1 ratio have increased greatly," the state chemist observes.

"Stated in another way, the 130,904 tons of goods of the 1-2-1 ratio contained plant food equivalent to 169,142 tons of 5-10-5. The 8,118 tons of grades of the 1-1-0 contained plant food equivalent to 11,385 tons of 10-10-10. These data emphasize the strong trend toward use of fertilizers of higher analyses."

Commenting on regional distribution, Dr. Fudge says that East Texas absorbed more than one-half of the total tonnage of mixed goods sold in the state. East Texas, Gulf Coast and North Central Texas Combined used 83 per cent of the mixed goods. Moreover, East Texas used more than one-half of the ammonium nitrate bought throughout the state; Gulf Coast region about one-third of the ammonium sulphate and one-half of the unacidulated phosphate and ammonium phosphates; and West Texas used more than one-half of the anhydrous ammonia and normal superphosphate.
