W. F. Barnett, superintendent of the Methodist Orphans Home of Waco was stricken ill Wednesday and died at the home of his son, Dr. Barnett, in Hillsboro.

### In Line of Duty

Mr. Barnett's death was "in line of duty." He was stricken with fatal illness as he started to enter his automobile at Arlington following his address to Methodists of the Fort Worth district. His son, Dr. T. R. Barnett, of Hillsboro, was summoned by telephone and carried the sick man to his home at Hillsboro, where death came.

Classes at the Orphans Home were discontinued Wednesday, and plans for the children to present an operetta Thursday night were indefinitely postponed.

B. J. Osborne, assistant superintendent, assumed charge of the operation of the home Wednesday morning.

### Born in Illinois

Mr. Barnett was born in Illinois 64 years ago. Before he came to Waco to take charge of the Methodist Home he was superintendent of the state orphans' home at Corsicana. He is survived by his widow, his son in Hillsboro, a daughter, Mrs. Claud McKinney, of Van Alstyne, his mother, who is 86 years of age and lives in Terrell, two brothers, George of Wolfe City and Gert of Terrell, and a sister, Mrs. Tom Briens, of Illinois.

The malady which struck Mr. Barnett down had been troubling him for some time. Earlier in the year he spent six weeks in Marlin under treatment for it. It was thought that it had been overcome.

### U. S. TREASURY ENTERS OPEN MARKET FOR GOV. BONDS

Washington, May 25.—The first move under the inflation act, the federal reserve board today went into the open market for the purchase of \$25,000,000 in government bonds.

Secretary Woodin explained the purpose of the move was to replace \$25,000,000 in government bonds with currency. No currency inflation is involved, rather credit expansion is sought, he added.

The outstanding government bonds will be bought in the open market with \$25,000,000 fixed for the first step.

The recently enacted legislation authorizes \$3,000,000,000 of such purchases, but the secretary said he did not believe this would be necessary.

### ACREAGE REDUCTION OF COTTON TO BE DEMANDED

Washington, May 23.—C. A. Cobb Atlanta farm editor, today accepted administrator under the new farm adjustment act, arriving at noon from Birmingham prepared "to get down to work at once."

Cobb went into conference with Secretary Wallace soon after his arrival. Later he planned to confer with George N. Peek, chief administrator, and Chester Davis, general production administrator.

Peek has made an inquiry into the amount of cotton on which the government has made loans which would be available for application of the Smith cotton plan under the new act.

### To Seek Acreage Reduction

It is understood that in preliminary drafting of a program for cotton that use of the option plan exclusively is not contemplated for this year's crop. Instead, there is a tentative understanding that it will be combined with an acreage reduction program to be put in into effect either through the leasing of lands already planted to cotton or through use of the voluntary domestic allotment plan.

### KERRVILLE FIRM SELLS MILLION POUNDS WOOL

Kerrville, May 24.—L. A. Schreiner of the Schreiner Wool and Mahair Commission company today announced the sale of one million pounds of 12 month wool to Stokes and Allison, Lampasas, representing Winslow and Company. Bids on a quarter of million pounds of eight month wool by two others were rejected.

The wool was sold at sealed bids and no price was made known. The prices received recently for 12 mo. wool in Texas ranged from 22 1-2 cents to 25 cents.

### \$611,865 LOAN MADE TO TEXAS

Washington, May 23.—Emergency relief loans aggregating \$5,336,317 were granted eight states today by Harry L. Hopkins within two hours after he took office as Federal Emergency Relief Administrator.

Loans granted were: Illinois \$2,500,000, Michigan \$1,630,450, Colorado \$302,645, Texas \$611,865, Mississippi \$164,193, Iowa \$47,297, Georgia \$40,622, and Ohio \$39,245.

### JEWS SET OUT TO RAISE MILLION DOLLARS TO FIGHT HITLER

Washington, May 24.—American Jews today set out to raise one million dollars as a fund to be used to arouse public opinion for protection of the rights of their race in Germany and other parts of the world.

Raising of the fund was agreed upon at an extraordinary session of the American Jewish Congress called to determine means on combating alleged persecutions of Jews by the Hitler regime.

### WANTS NATIONS OF WORLD TO DISARM AT ONCE

Geneva, May 24.—The United States called on all nations today to disarm drastically, and offered to consult and cooperate with other powers in the punishment of aggressors.

President Roosevelt, boldly taking leadership of the world's efforts for peace, even proposed to abandon his Nation's cherished neutrality in event peace is threatened, and virtually offered to scrap the navy, army and military air force, if other nations will do the same.

The President's dramatic and sweeping proposals were presented to the general commission of the world arms conference by Norman H. Davis, his special Ambassador to Europe.

It was pointed out that another war threatens unless armaments are reduced to the basis of domestic police force.
