Location of the court is not yet definitely settled but it will be under construction soon. Lonnie Wharton and Dr. Otis Ray have been soliciting funds to pay the cost of the lighting system and they report a response far beyond their hopes. They have raised upward of \$100.00 but \$250.00 will be required to properly light the court.

The "fire eaters" are opening the way for the organization of a softball league in Gatesville. Any organization may have a team and become a member of the league or payment of the entry fee.

## Authorities Ask Support In Immunization Drive Against Dread Disease

Through the co-operation of the County and City Health Officers, the Public Health Nurse and the Coryell County Red Cross there is to be a campaign of immunization against diphtheria conducted through the schools of the county.

Each and every child who has not been heretofore immunized will be offered the inoculation whether they be of school age or under age. The nurse and doctor will be at the several schools at appointed times for the purpose of administering the toxoid and those who desire to be immunized are to be present at the school at that time. The charge will be 30 cents which is less than the actual cost of the administration. The Red Cross is caring for the difference in the cost.





### DIPHTHERIA IMMUNIZATION CAMPAIGN

Beginning next Monday every child of age which is susceptible to diphtheria will have an opportunity to be immunized against that dread disease for the price of a theater ticket through the unselfish work of the County Health Officer, the City Health Officer, The Public Health Nurse and the County Red Cross. The price has been set at less than cost so that none need be denied the toxoid.

Such a campaign was conducted in this county last year with gratifying results. There have been very few cases of diphtheria in the county in the last year and these scattered cases were those who had not been immunized. Last year's campaign has made a financial profit as well as the saving in hours of dread and agony.

It is to be hoped that there will not be a child in the county between the ages of one month and twelve years who has not been inoculated against diphtheria within the next thirty days. The parent who does not see to it that his children are immunized in this campaign will be directly responsible for any future cases of diphtheria in his home. The hours of suffering and agony may be done away with and diphtheria can be driven from our county if the parents will but co-operate.

be administered to any child from a babe in arms to a child 10 years of age without fear of any complication. It is effective in immunizing against diphtheria in almost 100 per cent of the cases. There has been very little diphtheria in Coryell County this year and there should be less next

year if all children are inoculated.

School authorities in the several schools will be notified of the time set for the visit to their school. Not many dates have been set to date. The first campaign will be in the Gatesville Schools and will begin at 10 o'clock on Monday morning, February 26. The pupils of the Gatesville School and the children of Gatesville will require the entire day. If your child is not in school bring him or her to the Grammar School building at 10 o'clock in the morning or at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon next Monday. On Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock those who have not been inoculated in the following communities will be brought to the Gatesville School, Turnover, Mountain and Schley.

At 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon those in the Ames, Coryell Valley and Hay Valley communities who have not been inoculated will be brought to the Gatesville School.

The nurse and doctor will be at the Carden or Bigham School on Wednesday morning at 10 o'clock to administer the toxoid to the children of that community.

Teachers are requested to see that those in their communities who have not been inoculated are provided with transportation to the immunization centers.

Like most of Hollywood's musical comedies it is a stage picture, but the action largely takes place between the closing curtain of one season, and the opening performance of the next. This does not, however, stop Crosby from singing his best, or the chorus from dancing.

Crosby, primarily a singer, proved himself an actor in "College Humor." In "Too Much Harmony" he has definitely added to his laurels. If Bing should lose his singing voice (and may that calamity never happen!) he could easily continue in pictures as a leading man type.

Humor in profusion is provided by Jack Oakie, Skeets Gallagher, Harry Green, Ned Sparks, Sammy Cohen, Lilyan Tashman, Kitty Kelly and Grace Bradley. Given clever lines and situations, these veterans of Broadway are hilarious in their respective roles.

LeRoy Prinz, a newcomer to Hollywood, definitely establishes himself in the front rank of dance directors with this picture. Two of his routines, "Black Moonlight," and "Buckin' the Wind," are about the most spectacular ever offered on the screen.

Judith Allen has the leading feminine role opposite Crosby. Miss Allen had played but one previous role before being assigned the part in "Too Much Harmony" but proved that faith in her had not been misplaced by her thoroughly effective performance.

Credit is due, also, to Arthur Johnston and Sam Coslow, who wrote the songs for the picture. Certain to be "hits" are "Thanks," "Boo-Boo-Boo," "The Day You Came Along" and "I Guess It Had to be That Way," which Crosby sings in the typical fashion.
