Former G'ville Attorney Figures in Law Suit at Waco Over Pipe Line

SON OF LATE DISTRICT ATTY

Clay McClellan and Allan McDonnell, who aided city attorney John McGlasson in the suit of the city of Waco to recover on Lake Waco pipe line will get approximately \$29,000 fee if the case is finally settled in favor of the plaintiff. Judge Giles P. Lester, Tuesday, issued a judgment to that effect. The case has been appealed by the pipe line company.

The popular Waco attorneys agreed to assist the city attorney with the understanding that they were to be paid \$5,000 each, win, lose or draw, according to the Waco News-Tribune. In addition to this they were to receive 5 per cent of the first \$100,000 and 10 per cent on each additional \$100,000 of the final judgment. The lawyers have already been paid \$2500 each of the flat fee.

ON TEXAS FARMS

Sixty varieties of canned products in 650 containers, valued at \$142, are the sufficient barrier to keep the wolf from the door of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Kennedy at Inez this winter.

Averaging four tons of hegari per acre, Pecos county farmers are following the demonstration planting of this grain sorghum on the Webb farms in 1932. The price has been around \$18 a ton with a profit of about \$58 an acre on irrigated lands.

Bees have proved to be a good side line for E. Schokade of Shackelford county. Beginning with 20 hives the number has increased to 26 colonies which have harvested 90 gallons of

With contour ditches, Hal McCampbell, ranchman living near Hebronville in Jim Hogg county, is utilizing the waste water from his artesian well to irrigate land which he has sown to grain for winter pasture. Mr. McCampbell plans to plant and water 100 acres in this way.

From a garden subirrigated with old pipe, Mrs. W. J. Stoneman of the Anderson ranch in Baylor county gathered tomatoes from June to November. "We've had plenty all summer picking from a gallon to two bushels daily. We have eaten them raw and canned them honey, even in this dry year. The honey was gathered largely from mosquite blooms, it is estimated.

Comanche—Four tons of sheep manure when applied under sweet potatoes returned an increase of 14 bushels per acre for Otis Cox of Comanche county according to J. A. Barton, farm demonstration agent. The potatoes sold at \$1 per bushel so the hanure increased his profits by \$14 per acre.

Mr. Cox stated that very little rain fell on his potatoes, but that he had prepared the land well, placed the sheep manure deep, and planted potatoes on a bed. In addition to the value to the crop this year, Mr. Cox figures that there will be an increased yield for the next four or five years.

Jefferson—"Very little attention is devoted to fruit in East Texas, but my pear orchard is a fine example of what a little work and attention will do toward making an orchard profitable," says A. I. Herren of Marion county, according to John H. Erickson, farm demonstration agent. Because of the long drought, all the field crops on the Herren farm yielded almost nothing, but the sale of more than 800 bushels of pears saved the day for the Herren family. More than \$400 was realized in this way.

Lipscomb — Ensilage made from Russian Thistles is being fed to the dairy herd of G. A. Robbins and sons of Lipscomb county, according to C. M. Gay, farm demonstration agent. Mr. Robbins reports that Russian Thistle ensilage is very palatable and that his production records

compare favorably with records from past years for corresponding cows that were fed alfalfa and sorghum hay as roughage when these feeds were more plentiful.

Groesbeck—A good mattress made at home for \$5.21 is the possession of Mrs. T. B. Morton of Limestone county, according to Miss Cora Kirkman, home demonstration agent. "I have a good mattress at a cost of \$5.21, and I would not take twice that much for it," Mrs. Morton says. "The mattress cost \$2.25 for 10 yards of feather mattress ticking, 10 cents for the cord to make the roll around the mattress, and \$2.51 tax on a 50 pound round bale remnant. The seed paid for the ginning."

Bastrop—"It is the nicest thing we have ever had," says Mrs. Oscar Anderson of Bastrop county in speaking of the clothes closet constructed by her daughter Gladys as a part of her work as wardrobe demonstrator for the Kyleberg 4-H club, according to Miss Dessie E. Hoerster, home demonstration agent.

The closet is 12 feet high, 9 feet wide, and 26 inches deep, and has a rod that extends the length of the closet, shelves for storing folded garments, shoe racks, hat racks, and a large space for storing quilts and blankets. The entire cost was \$6.75.

Olton—A sink has been built for her kitchen from a part of the body of an old car and a drain board made from an old sheet iron board by Mrs. George Wallace of Lamb county, according to Miss Bernice Westbrook, home demonstration agent. Mrs. Wallace has also increased the size of her kitchen by taking in a small back porch. The kitchen has been ceiled with sheetrock, the ceiling and walls finished with a cost of calciche and a

cabinet and woodwork finished with cream paint. The total cost of this improvement was \$3.50 which was spent for the sheetrock and a new glass for the kitchen door.

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World Comment

By JOE BURNS



What does the average citizen of Gatesville and Coryell care about the export trade of the United States? How does an adverse trade balance affect the little man in the small town? George N. Peek, special adviser to the President on foreign trade, has shown that from 1910 to 1932, 18 per cent of the American farmer's income came from exports. And most of the people of Coryell county are engaged in agriculture. Nine out of every ten bales of cotton grown in Texas—and Coryell county—must find a foreign market. With this market closed, the average income of Texas from cotton has dropped from \$600 a year to \$200 a year. The evidence seems conclusive that the trouble with our farmers—and I mean the farmers of Coryell county and of all the U. S.—is due primarily to the loss of our foreign trade but this does not begin to reveal the losses suffered from this cause. When farm incomes are reduced, the consumption of industrial products fall by approximately the same amount, since the farmer spends most of his cash for things he can not produce. This means that a good part of our

domestic market for very kind of manufactured goods—goods that the merchants of Gatesville have for sale—has been lost because purchasing power on the farms of our county and nation has decreased. I don't intend to bring anything into this column that does not affect the people of our city and county—directly or indirectly.

99 per cent of the subscribers of the NEWS reside in Coryell county, and it is to these that I am writing—especially to those who do not receive a daily newspaper. Or perhaps you overlook some of the high points of the news in reading your newspaper.

If I bring a discussion of a naval race into this column, I do so with the realization that such a condition might lead to war—war in which you and I would have to participate. Otherwise, you and I would have to shoulder the burdens of such a competitive struggle between our nation and another. In other words, this is your column—trying to bring you something that you will miss in the daily news, the high points of the news of the week. Or, as said above, if you do not receive a daily newspaper, you will have some idea of what is going on the world over—in your own state, in Washington, in the nation at large—news that the world over seeps into our space here and there. We will try to live up to the standard of the NEWS in bringing only news that is good and wholesome into the home—"only the news that's fit to print." I want it to be

your column; it is your column.

Thirteen members of the Texas Congressional delegation have already pledged their votes and support to Rep. Sam Rayburn of Bonham in his race for speaker of the national house of representatives. I had presumed that the entire delegation would give its enthusiastic support and endorsement to Rayburn until last week when, as pointed out in an editorial in the NEWS, Congressman Tom Blanton of Abilene declared he would support Byrns of Tennessee. Rayburn's candidacy is becoming stronger each day and indications are that the big fight will be between Rayburn and Byrns, with the administration leaning toward Rayburn. Recently, Rep. McMillan of South Carolina has been mentioned as a new "dark horse" candidate. O. H. Cross of Waco is among those supporting Rayburn.
