



THE WAR DEBTS AND THE BONUS

The immediate future of the movement for payment in cash of the veterans' bonus holds some interestthe Patman bill, which provides for issuance of green- City Drug ing possibilities. The President will undoubtedly veto backs to pay the veterans. If the Senate should then sustain the veto, there is a likelihood that the Vinson bill will be enacted. This bill makes no effort to answer the question where the money is to come from. If the President should then veto the Vinson bill on the ground that no satisfoctory method of raising the funds are provided, an attempt might be made to authorize the settlement of the war debts for an amount sufficient to cover full bonus payment.

The amount involved in the full and immediate payment of the bonus would range from about \$1,750,000,000, to \$2,350,000,000.

The total war debts owed to the United States on March 1 were more than six times that figure, namely \$12,200,000,000. It is generally agreed that the indebtedness will have to be reduced if any substantial part of it is going to be repaid.

One proposal is that the United States should ask only for the return of money actually advanced, forgive all interest payments, past and future, and credit all payments already made, both for principal and for interest, against the principal. The actual advances by the United States amounted to \$10,300,000,000. The total repayments on all accounts up to March 1, 1935, were \$2,700,-000,000. The difference is seven billion six hundred thousand dollars-almost four times the amount involved in immediate payment of the bonus in full.

Of the three principal debtors, Great Britain, France and Italy, the first named has repaid sums amounting to 47 per cent of the original advances. France's repayments are but 14 per cent, and Italy's 6





You can't get a crystalline, disappointing product when you make a marlow. You may use a mechanical refrigerator, or an ice cream freezer. without the bothersome agitating usually called for, or simply pack it in a tightly sealed covered mold, in an ice-salt pack. Seal the mold with adhesive tape.

About those marshmallows - you really can keep them on the pantry shelf, with no danger of their drying out and becoming stale and hard. quarter-pound pack-ettes, each holding sixteen marshmallows, each sealed separately in waxed paper, and the four contained in a triple-sealed pound carton. This recipe, as you see, contains just sixteen marshmallows. or a quarter of a pound, so you need open only one of the four pack-ettes, and the others will remain moist and tender indefinitely

MAPLE NUT MARLOW

16 marshmallows 4 cup maple 2 cup water teaspoons lemon juice

1/3 cup pecans chopped fine ½ pint whipping cream

Put marshmallows, syrup and water in top of double boiler and steam until marshmallows are melted salt, and set aside to cool. When quite cold and slightly stiffened. freeze without stirring.
