Cotton Checks Here

Cards were mailed out today to four hundred forty-one conthat their first cotton rental checks for 1935 had arrived. These checks amount to \$12,-496.02. The other hundred contract checks will arrive soon making a total of about \$50,000.00 first rental payments. These payments are for old contracts. New contracts are just now being signed up along with Bankhead applicathons. Farmers are requested not to make a trip asking for their check until a dard is received by them. The card will be mailed immediately upon receipt of their checks and it will save them time and expense to wait until they do receive a

Cotton Contracts Signed Every producer, either landlord or tenant, who made application for a new cotton contract must sign up the actual contract before it can be sent in for payment. These contracts have been attached to the respective Bankhead Applications and should be signed up with the community committee. The contract as now drawn up contains all of the adjustments in acreage and lint which were required by the State Board of Review, and the producer may accept or reject such adjustment. However, Bankhead Application will be based upon the data contained in the contradt itself. Landlords who were not notified to sign the contract should come sign the contract at least by May 25, which is the deadline

date for signing new contracts.


