



> He said the loans will be limited to the minimum amount necessary to meet the immedtate and actual cash needs of farmers who are unable to obtain credit from any other source, and in no instance excced \$200 to one farmer. Applicants who can get credit from any other source, including a production credit association, will not be eligible for emergency loans, he expained.

> Loans will be made for the production, planting, cultivating, and harvesting of crops for summer fallowing, for supplies where they are necessary for production of 1936 crops, or to produce necessary feed for live-

According to the Governor's statement, preference will given to applications of farmers whose cash requirements are small, and no loans may be made for purchasing livestock or machinery or for payment of rents, debts or tax-

The loans will bear interest at the rate of 51 per cent a year and be secured by a first lien, or an agreement to give a first lien, on all crops financed in whole or part with the proceeds of the emergency loan. production of feed for livestock, they will be secured by a first

Where farmers applying for emergency loans are the tenants of a private landowner or concern, the maximum amout of loans to the tenant of one landowner in one county may not exceed \$500. The maximum amount of loans to members of one household who are occupants of the same farm is \$200.

All disbursements will be made from the regional Emergency Crop and Feed Loan Offices located at Springfield, Mass. Baltimore, Columbia, S. C., Memphis, Dallas, St. Louis, St. Paul, Omaha, Wichita, Salt Lake City, and Spokane.





FIRST COOPERATION AGREED ON PROTECTION OF WILD LIFE SIGNED

The first cooperative agreement for the protection of wildlife to be reached between a Southern State and the U. S. Forest Service was signed in Atlanta on March 9 by Zack D. Cravey, Fish and Game Commissioner, and Joseph C. Kircher, Regional Forester in charge of the Southern Region of the Federal Forest Service.

The area affected by the agreement is a tract of nearly half million acres in North Georgia that constitutes portions of the Nanthala and Cherokee Nathional Forests. Heretofore, the management of game on this area has been governed solely by the laws of the State except in areas set

aside as Federal gam refuges. Under the Kircher-Cravey covenant, the Forest Service agrees to furnish the Georgia Fish and Game Department an annual game management plan, recommending the number of mancays fishing, number of fish to be taken per man-day, number of hunters and trappers, bag limits, seasons, hunting and trapping areas to be opened or

Commissioner Cravey agrees to provide necessary game wardens and deputies for the proper enforcement of game laws, to obtain the approval of the Forest Service on each man selected, and to deputize Forest Service employees to serve as wardens for the State of Georgie without compensation. Several other steps important to game management were included in the agreement.

Kirchr said he hoped the forward step taken by the Georgia conservation authorities would lead to similar agreements between the Forest Service and the conservation authorities in other Southern States.

GOLIAD PLANS OBSERVANCE OF TRAGIC EVENT

Goliad, March 20 .- The Fannin massacre, one of the most tragic events in Texas history, will be commemorated with impressive services here on Friday, March 27, the Centennial anniversary of the cruel slaughter of 390 Texas heroes by the enemy.

A solemn Pontifical field mass in memory of the martyrs of Goliad will be celebrated in the quadrangle of La Bahia mission, according to plans made by the Corpus Christi diacese of the Catholic church. In attendance will be six Bishops of the church, 10 Monsignori, and several hundred priests and nuns.

The mass in the morning will be followed that afteroon by a colorful parade of historical floats and military and school bands. Later, in Goliad State Governor Allred, L. A. Woods, state superintendent of education, and L. W. Kemp, Markers at Missions Espiritu Sante and San Rosario will be unveiled by the Rev. Father Foik of St. Edwards University.


