A solemn Pontifical field mass in memory of the martyrs of Goliad will be celebrated in the quadrangle of La Bahia mission, according to plans made by the Corpus Christi diacese of the Catholic church. in attendance will be six Bishops of the church, 10 Mon signori, and several hundred priests and nuns.
The mass in the morning will be followed that afteroon by a colorful parade of historical hoats and military and school bands. Later, in Goliad State park, talks will be made by Gc vernor Allred, L.
