MORE THAN 1300 WOMEN FORMERLY ON RELIEF NOW EMPLOYED

Waco, April 13 .- More than 1300 women formerly on relief rolls throughout the 13 counties comprising Works Progress Administration District No. 8 are now gainfully employed on women's projects, it was announced today by C. H. Harrison. district director.

Harrison estimated that approximately 1000 of these women are at work in the 33 sewing rooms scattered among the counties of the district. Sponsored by the county governments, those sewing rooms are distributed among the 13 coun-

"We believe our sewing room projects are of far-reaching significance," said Mrs. Alice Lee Willis, District Supervisor of Women's Projects, "because of their four-fold aims which we are realising.



REPORT ON FEDERAL LAND BANK AND LAND BANK COMMISSIONER GIVEN

San Antonio, April 13 .- During the period from May 1, 19-33, through December 31, 1935, 508 Federal Land Bank and Land Bank Commissioner loans, amounting to \$1,167,000, were closed in Coryell County, according to an announcement made by H. P. Drought, State Director of the National Emergency Council for Texas. Of this number, 204 loans, amounting to \$645,100 were made by the Federal Land Bank, and 304 loans, amounting to \$521,900, were made by the Land Bank Commissioner.

The total amount of loans closed by the Federal Land Bank and Land Bank Commissioner in Texas during the above period was \$139,850,750, representing 56,380 individual loans.



TEXAS WILD LIFE

With its vast area, its pine forests, its wooded hills and valleys, its rolling brush country, Texas should be by far the greatest hunting and fishing State in the Union. financiers. Texas does lead in the total value of wild life resources but has a disappointing record in game conservation and propagation. Some of the State's most valuable game animals are in danger of becoming extinct.

As Alonzo Wasson pointed out recently in The News, Pennsylvania, with a fifth of the area of Texas, offers sportsmen as many deer as this State. Pennsylvania the government, President Lazissues five times as many hunting licenses as Texas, New York four times as many, Illinois and Ohio each three times as many. Other States are increasing their fish and game while those of Texas are allowed to diminish.

Despite the fish propagation and other work done by the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission of Texas, the depletion of the State's wild life has continued. Stream pollution and the unlawful use of dynamite have made fishing an idle occupation in many places. Prairie chickens and wild ducks are disappearing; bear and antelope, once plentiful in Texas, are now hard to find.

Instead of tightening game laws and providing greater means of enforcement, Texas has reduced the number of game wardens from 125 to 65. This number is obviously inadequate. While violations of game laws probably have increased in the last few years, prosecutions have dropped to a low figure.

Hunters and fishermen spend \$25,000,000 a year in Texas but they would spend much more if additional game were provided. A more active propagation of Texas wild life would greatly increase the State's food supply, as well as expanding the opportunity for healthful and exciting recreation .- Dulas News.
