

It was apparent from the time revolutionary proposal for the increasing of the membership of the Supreme Court that there would be no compromise—that a cisis has been pecipitated that would be fought out to the finish. There has been no change in this condition in the intervening weeks.

During one of the recent White House discussions between the President and a group of Senate members, an unamed Senator supporting the President's plan advanced a compromise proposal, by which the President would be empowered to name two new high court justices, increasing the total membership to eleven in place of the usual nine, and would abondon the proposal of naming new judges for those who do not retire or resign when over seventy years of age.

The president evinced no enthusiasm for the plan, we are told, and reiterated his determination to pursue his objective to a successful termination. Such a plan, we are also informed, would be entirely unsatisfactory to the opponents of the original proposal.

Thus there is and will be no break in the deadlock between the new dealers on the one hand and the people as personified by the Senate on the other.

The recent turn of events indicates that the best plan of action for the president is to beat a hasty and dignified retreat from his present untenable position. The lineup of conditions in the Senate and in the nation at large points to a certain defeat for the President if he insists upon enactment of his proposal into law. Public opinion is crying out with every increasing animosity toward the President's plan.

The number of avowed opponents of the proposals in the Senate has increased to 36, while 28 have publicly declared in favor of the plan. The non-committal list numbers 32 at this writing. Senator Donahey of of Ohio, a Democrat, is the latest to speak his opposition to the plan, insisting the issues involved should be referred to the

people.
The opposition includes such true statesmen as Senators Borah, Burke of Nebraska, Connally, Copeland of New York, Glas and Byrd of Virginia, Johnson of California, McNary of Oregn, Vandenburg of Michigan Van Nuys of Indiana, and Wheeler of Montana.

More and more the tide of public opinion is swinging to the viewpoint of Senator Donahey and other opponents of the proposal. If the nation is really at the crossroads in its inspiring history, if the constitution must be altered to give the people a proper voice in their affairs, the voice of the people must be heard.

Instead, we find the new deal-· ers and administration forces using every means of political pressure at their command to force reluctant and unwilling representatives into support of the President's measure in spite of the rising tide of resentment among the representative's constituents which is as perceptible to the new dealers and it is to the affected representatives. The chief executive and his associates thus cast in the rather dark light of seeking to gain their ends regardless of the will of the people, and in opposition to the will of the people if necessary.
