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

### IRELAND OPENS SPRING GRID DRILLS; FIRST TEAM IN HISTORY

The Ireland Cardinals will have the first grid team in the history of that school next fall. Coach Dickerson issued a call for candidates for spring training and some twenty boys answered his summons. They have participated in daily practice sessions for two weeks, and although none of the boys have had any previous experience they are shaping up fast.

### HORNETS IMPROVE; BLOCKING STRESSED IN SPRING DRILLS

After a week of extended blocking practice sessions for the last week the Hornets have shown a potent offense the past few days. When the candidates first started scrimmage the second-stringers did not allow the regulars to run over them, but held the first string down as well as could be expected. However, Thursday and Monday (cold weather not permitting a workout Friday) the regulars peeling off gains averaging 40, 50 and 60 yards at a clip. This is due directly to the tough blocking drills that Worley has put the linemen thru and their blocking in-the-line and down-the-field was a sight more beautiful to the football eye than Hogarth's line of beauty.

Jack Jackson, who has replaced John Albert Lester at the left half post, Lester not being able to practice on account of a nose injury, has shown excellent speed and shiftiness; and if he continues at the fast pace he has been traveling so far this spring he will see plenty of duty next fall.



# The SNAPSHOT GUILD

## WHEEL PICTURES



The motion of the ferris wheel was stopped at 1/100 second at f.9. The exposure of the still locomotive wheel was 1/10 second at f.16. The wheel of the barrow was taken at f.8, exposure 1/25 second, after a long study of lights and shadows and much changing of camera position.

"The world is a wheel."

**WHEELS**—man's first invention—make photographic subjects of absorbing interest. There is a lot of fun in making a hobby of wheel pictures.

There are so many kinds of wheels — wagon wheels, spinning wheels, automobile wheels, locomotive wheels, water wheels, steering wheels, cog wheels and the thousand and one other sorts and sizes used in machinery. And every one of them, when pictured in a photograph, tells some kind of story of human interest.

Wheels tell you tales of speed and power; they are witnesses to man's inventiveness and ingenuity; from the wheels of the ox-cart to the landing wheels of an airplane, they symbolize the history of man's progress; new wheels tell of life and activity; old wheels, broken and abandoned, spell obsolescence, decay and the end of things. What a stimulus to philosophic reflection are pictures of wheels!

Wheels to photograph may be found everywhere—in junk heaps and farmyards, in streets, in factories, in your own home. Photo-

graphically, their many patterns and the shadows of their patterns offer a variety of fascinating studies. Wheels are easy to photograph. You can be leisurely in your preparations, unless, of course, they are wheels on a moving vehicle. As still subjects, you have an opportunity to use time exposures on them if needed, not forgetting a small stop opening for sharp detail, particularly for shadows. Wheels provide subjects for striking angle shots, especially when they form a part of masses of machinery in factory or engine room.

Pictures of wheels call for close-ups. They should fill the view finder. Often when the impression of size and strength is desirable, the print may be trimmed so that the wheel crowds the picture space to the limit.

When wheels are in revolution, don't think you should always use a fast shutter speed. Blurred spokes in the photograph will give the sense of motion just as they do to the eye.

Try some pictures of this intriguing subject; and may the wheel of fortune favor you.

### EXPLANATION OF FEDERAL HOUSING PROGRAM

Under the Federal Housing Program the government does not loan to individuals but it is a program sponsored by the Federal Government to encourage the building of homes in order to stimulate industry and improve the standard of living conditions of the people.

The loans are made by loan companies on very liberal terms and to encourage these loans, the Federal Government insures or guarantees the payment of the loans up to a specified per cent and offers a market for the sale of the loans by the loan company.

Loans may be made on both city and rural property for residences as well as business buildings and from a few hundred dollars up to any amount which good business might justify under the circumstances.

Loans may be made for repairs as well as new structures and different provisions apply under the law to the different character of a building or the amounts of the loan. Loans may be made up to 90 per cent of the value of the completed structure if it is occupied by the owner as a home and up to 80 per cent of its value if business or revenue property.

The loan companies are under no obligations to accept a loan but it is optional with them and they pass on the application strictly on a sound business basis.

Interest rates are based on 3 1/2 discount or 5 per cent discount (which is approximately 3 1/2 or 5 per cent interest depending on the title under which the loan is made) and loans run from one one to 24 years and monthly payments are made to include the principal, interest, taxes and insurance which elim-

inate the extra expense of a lump sum for payment for taxes. All loan companies making these loans require the usual abstract of the title, deed of trust, recording fees, etc. the same as any other loans not made under the Federal Housing Program.






is checked. And the three well defined groups of his advisors are not at all in accord as to the method of checking it.

The conservative group has been reduced to despair by two recent events, his removal of Dr. Morgan as head of the TVA which the conservatives feel smacked too much of dictatorial power; and his speech on southern feudalism which they believe alienated the wealthier and more cautious southern Democrats.

The radical groups of his advisors feel that these two moves have been but feeble and faltering steps in the right direction. They argue that his popularity is waning in direct proportion to the increase of this new depression. And while they regret that he did not attack sooner they urge him to point out to the country that he new depression is due; First to a Congress which revolted against administration measures while accomplishing nothing on its own; Second, to a greedy taking of excessive profits by big business which resulted in high prices; and third to an allegedly organized attempt at sabotage of new deal prosperity by the old dealers.

Naturally it is too late to accomplish anything by simply making these charges. They insist that he must go before the voters with a definite program and that program must consist of, first and increase in taxes on the rich, on capital, on undistributed income and in some way, on excessive prices. There must be they say, a wage-hour law which will spread employment, and a more comprehensive farm bill which will insure an adequate living to the farmer while it gives food to the public at a reasonable and stable price. And they want to bust the trusts.

It is pointed out that no such radical program need be feared for the president is primarily a politician and has up to now shown neither sympathy with nor ability to fill such a dictatorial role. And both his conservative and radical advisors fear that he will end up on the fence between the two of them and, they sigh audibly for the old days when Louis McHenry Howe was at the Roosevelt elbow to guide things that comparative smoothness which marked the early day of the new deal

**EASTER MENUS FIND INSPIRATION IN FINE FLAVORED HAMS**

Somehow the flavor of a well cured ham seems to bring out the very best in fruits and vegetables that make their appearance

with early springtime. And here are many delectable ways to serve left-over ham that it is really not an extravagance to treat the family to a whole baked ham on Easter.

**BAKED HAM**

Place a ham, fat side up, in the baking pan, add 1 cup of water and bake at 3000 degrees F. till tender. Allow about 20 minutes to the pound. Take from oven, remove rind, score fat, pat in brown sugar and dot with whole cloves and wee segments of orange peel, stuck in fat. Remove excess fat from the pan and replace in oven, a little hotter than at first and bake for 70 to fifty minutes.

If you are using one of the new 'ready-to-serve' hams and wish to bake, follow the directions that come with the meat.

**GARNISH FOR BAKED HAM**  
Cut three bananas in half, lengthwise. Place in a baking dish, cut side down. Beat in one-half cup strawberry jelly with a fork, add 1 tablespoon lemon juice. Spread on the bananas. Bake uncovered in a moderate oven for 20 to 25 minutes, basting frequently.

**RASIN SAUCE FOR BAKED HAM**

Mix one-fourth cup brown sugar and 1 tablespoon flour, add three-fourths cup water, bring to boiling point. Add one-fourth

teaspoon salt, one-fourth cup orange juice, one-half cup orange juice, 3 tablespoons lemon juice one-half cup raisins and boil slowly for 5 minutes and add 1 tablespoon butter. As the ham is sliced for several top each slice with a spoonful of the rasin sauce.

vided on two sides, assuring cross ventilation and plenty of light to make the room bright and cheerful. A grade entrance to the basement also serves as a rear entrance to the house.

A small hallway opening off of the dining room gives access to the two bedrooms and bath that complete this attractive home. A convenient linen closet (which, because of its location, will also hold dining room linens), also opens off to a hall.

Each bedroom boasts an extra large closet, and both of them are large enough to accommodate twin beds. The bathroom is located between them, and is completely equipped, from medicine chest to modern shower bath and built in tub.

Space for laundry, heating plant, and storage is provided in the basement, and a modern recreation room might be built here.

The stairway to the attic provided by this plan makes it possible to finish additional bedrooms in this space at some later date.

The house, as shown in the illustration is of frame construction, finished with shingles combined with brick veneer and clap market

boards. The same floor plan might have been used for a house in the colonial type is preferred.

The interior walls would be attractive finished in rough plaster, or smooth plastered walls or wallpaper might be used. Woodwork could be painted or given a natural stain and waxed. Hardwood floors are preferred in homes of this type, except in the kitchen and bathroom, where linoleum or tile would be most practical.

Lighting fixtures and hardware reproducing the lines of old English metal work are available in stock patterns at most electrical supply firms, and equipment of this type would be most appropriate for a home of this design. Brass, copper, and bronze finishes could be used with natural wood, and other finishes for use with painted or papered walls are also available.
