OUTDOORS AT NIGHT

Taking the pictures is simplicity itself. Place the camera on a firm support, such as a tripod, box, post, or other solld object. Load with high speed nim, of course, and time th Hght, as follows:

seconds with a box camera, or other
camera at $f / 11$ lens opening. If there
