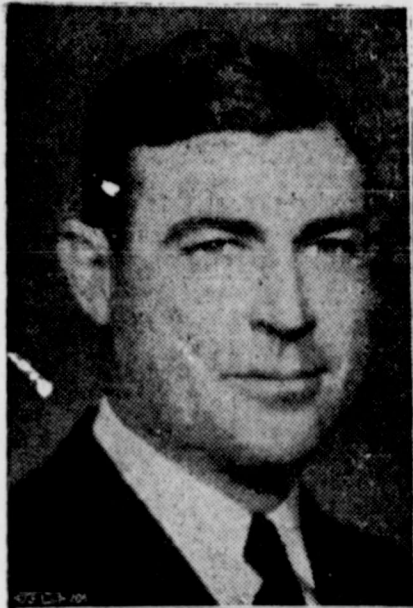

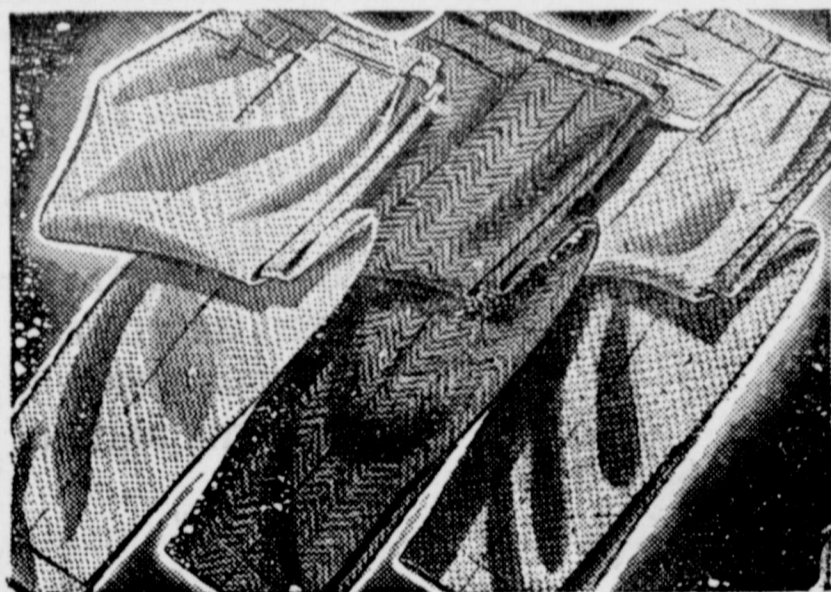

**Gladys Marie Phillips Initiated Into Club**

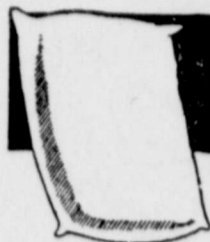

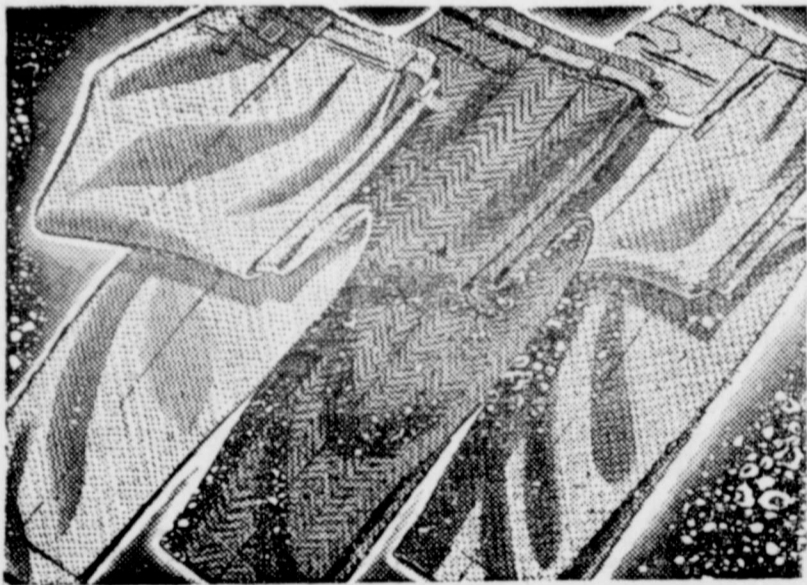

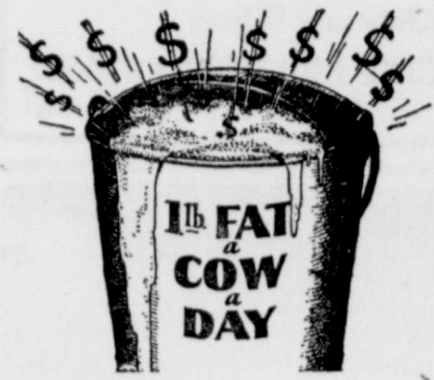
## Daily Pound of Fat Is Money Making Minimum for Cows

**Get Rid of Poor Milkers and Give Good Cows a Chance, Expert Urges.**

On today's market, a dairy farmer's opportunity to make money is with a herd averaging one pound of fat a day per cow, or 300 lbs. per cow per year, according to Meade Summers, Manager of the Dairy Department of Purina Mills.

"This is in accord with the judgment of leading dairy authorities," says Summers. "Quoting just one—the College of Agriculture of the University of Missouri says in Dairy Bulletin 405, May, 1939: 'Cows producing 300 lbs. or more of butterfat will, in addition to paying for their feed, return on an average more than \$40.00 per cow to cover other costs and a reasonable profit.'"

"Other authoritative sources concur that a pound of fat a day, or its equivalent in milk is a money making yield. On the average for Jerseys, a pound of fat equals 20 lbs. of milk daily or 6,000 lbs. a year;



for Guernseys 22 lbs. or 6,500 lbs. annually; for mixed breeds 27 lbs. a day or a yearly production level of 8,000 lbs.; for Holsteins, 30 lbs. of milk a day or 9,000 lbs. a year.

### Cash In the Culls

"Since the daily pound of fat is the money making minimum, according to today's best authority and knowledge, every dairyman who is in business to make money should 'take stock' on his cows to see if they are measuring up," advises Summers. "If a man is selling butterfat, or condensory milk, it will pay him to 'cash in' to the butcher any cow that can't make at least a pound of fat a day. Then by following a proven milk making plan like our Purina Program, he should strive to get all the fat he can from the remaining money makers.

"The dairyman selling fluid milk should figure out how much he can sell at top price—not surplus. Then he should cull his herd to that base and give his good cows a chance to make money," Summers says.

### Easy to Make



#### Indian Korn Kake

- 1/2 cup Spry (triple-creamed shortening)
- 1 cup milk, scalded
- 1 1/2 cups corn meal
- 1 egg, well beaten
- 1/2 cup sifted flour
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 4 slices bacon, sliced

Melt Spry in hot milk and pour over corn meal. Add beaten egg to corn meal mixture. Sift flour with baking powder and salt. Add to corn meal mixture. Pour batter into 9 x 9-inch pan greased with Spry. Sprinkle bacon over top. Bake in hot oven (425° F.) 20 to 25 minutes. Place under broiler 1 minute to crisp bacon. Serves 6.





# BRACKETED

By BRACK CURRY



In all discussions of the peace which is to follow World War II, official Washington projects the formula that the neutrals should have equal rights with the belligerents in the formulation of peace terms. The theory of administration leaders is that the world is so integrated economically that there can be no peace without the concurrence of neutrals and belligerents alike.

If this theory were put into practice, it would mean that the

neutrals of the world would demand equal rights with the belligerents who have expended their blood and their treasure to achieve victory, in dealing with the vanquished.

Let us consider, for the moment, the position of the United States as the foremost neutral, as the state that would have the greatest voice in any peace deliberations, aside from the belligerents.

What right has the U. S. to say to France and England, assuming that they win the war, "You've whipped Hitler (while we stood on the sidelines); now we'll help you negotiate peace?"

From the American viewpoint, participation in negotiating the new peace would be fortuitous, for we could seek to impose an equitable peace that would prevent another war within two or three decades.

But if the Allies achieve victory only after a long and enervating struggle, after hundreds of thousands of their young men have died, they will feel that the peace which is to be established be one that will repay them for their efforts.

If the neutrals—including the U. S.—seek to participate in the peace conference, they will be met with an answer of this nature: "You (neutrals) claim a 'right' to help negotiate the peace for which we have fought. We will recognize this 'right' if you recognize a corresponding obligation to help maintain the peace which we establish through our mutual efforts."

The Allies have never forgotten that the U. S. helped make the Treaty of Versailles, then refused to ratify it or to help enforce it. Thus in their eyes it would be foolhardy to permit the U. S. and other neutrals to participate in peace negotiations which might rob them of the fruits of their victory if those selfsame neutrals refused to help enforce the peace.

Are the American people prepared to participate in a system of world collective security once peace is established? They are not at the end of World War II. Hence the rebuke administered

Senate—a rebuke which constituted a deathblow, as later events proved—and to the World Court.

The answer to this question is of the utmost significance for future world peace. If the U. S. will join with the other neutral powers in the negotiation and enforcement of a just peace, the world may enter a new era of peace on earth for all men. Conversely, if the isolationist policy of 1919-1920 is re-adopted, another Versailles peace may be imposed with all its appalling potentialities for the future.

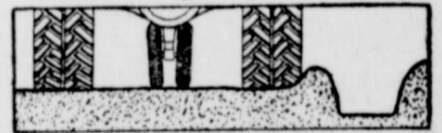

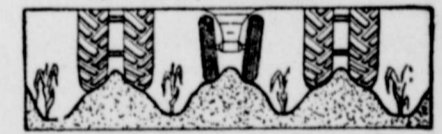
Rear view of tractor with tires set for plowing

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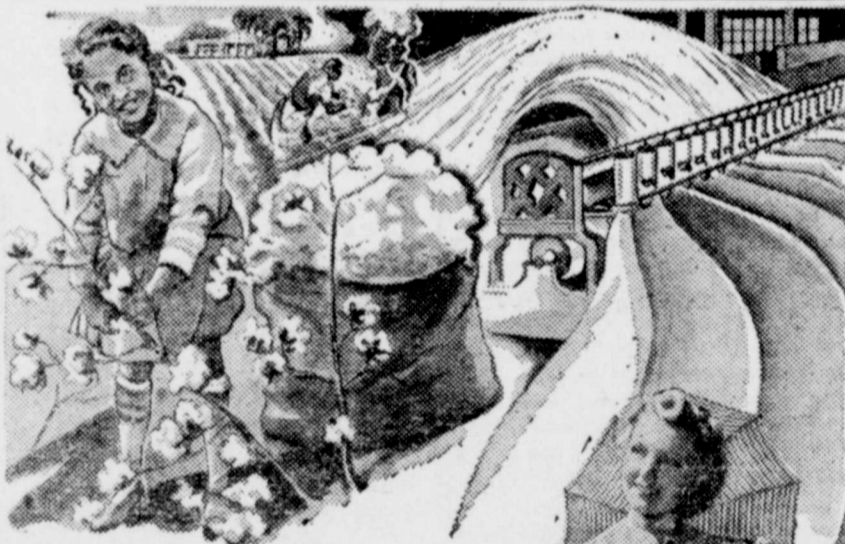
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## MIRACLE OF COTTON FILMED IN COLOR
