BUD TRUSS KILLED IN REAR-END CRASH OF CARS EARLY THURSDAY MORNING

TWO OTHERS IN HIS CAR HURT ALSO: MAN IN OTHER CAR, SLIGHTLY

Evidently blinded by the dense fog, shortly after midnight Thursday morning, Bud Truss was killed, and the two other occupants of his car were cut and bruised. W. H. Dudley, of Dublin, driver of the other car was badly shaken and had a sprained wrist. Truss' head drove into a fixture above the windshield of his car, and crushed his skull. The other two were a Mr. Maxwell and Jack Tennison.

The accident happened about 5 miles east of Coryell creek. Dudley was driving west on the highway, and heard the other car approaching behind him, and just about that time, it hit the rear end of his car. He was reported driving slow, due to the fog, and the other car crashed into the rear end of his car, it is said. Dudley's car was not badly damaged, only the rear bumper and part of the turtle back being damaged.

The car driven by Truss had the entire front end damaged and crushed, the windshield broken, and the rear of the engine, dash, etc., pushed back nearly into the front seat. The two passengers in Truss' car were principally injured by the flying glass from the windshield.

Truss, Maxwell, and Tennison lived in the eastern part of the county.

Funeral services for Truss will be held at 10:30 today at the Ruth Cemetery, with Scott's in charge of the services.

TOM L. ROBINSON IN DIST. ATTY RACE

To the voters of Coryell and Hamilton Counties:

I would like to serve this District again as your District Attorney and herein submit to you my candidacy for that office. No more important office exists within the rights of the people. I feel that the selection of an attorney to represent the State in the protection of the rights, liberty and lives carefully considered. Those who know me know the character of service I rendered and what I stood for while I was an officer of the District. I desire the office because of the salary it pays and because of the beneficial service I believe I can render the citizenship. The office now pays a salary of Four Thousand Dollars per year which is sufficient to justify an experienced attorney to devote his entire time to the duties of the office. I know that we have as efficient, experienced attorneys in this district as you will find anywhere and my experience has taught me that when individuals violate the law, whether done intentionally or otherwise, they seek the counsel and service of the best experienced defense attorneys their financial ability will permit. In order, therefore, to protect the rights, liberties, property and lives of the citizenship, your District Attorney must meet and compete with these attorneys not only from this District but also from various parts of the state. Proper investigation, pleading, presentation and argument must be combined. Whether I possess the necessary qualifications and whether you desire to employ me for the next two years as your District Attorney is for you to decide.

For your consideration, I submit herein some of the things I believe in:

An active co-operation by the District Attorney and Sheriff in the very beginning of the case.

A thorough, fair and impartial examination of all violations of the law in Examining Trials and before the Grand Jury.

Recognition and protection of every citizen's constitutional and statutory rights.

Prosecution of every defendant, fairly and impartially alike, upon the facts made by the defendant and the circumstances of the case, without persecution.

I believe our jury system is the most perfect and effective means ever devised to protect the rights, liberties and lives of the people, guilt or innocence of the defendant and the determination of whether a suspended sentence shall be granted or denied. Therefore,

The farm debt adjustment committee, the supervisor explained is a group of local men who seek to work out a repayment schedule for the farmer that is within his ability to pay and is fair to both him and the creditors.

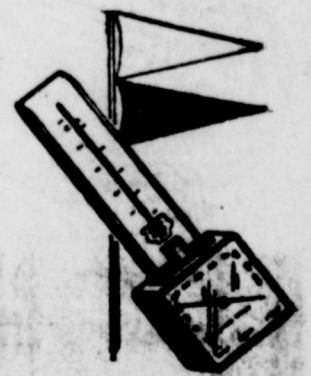
He was known throughout the state in banking circles and had for many years attended meetings and conventions of banking associations.

Many of these players are not available this year, but many more have sprung up and will be able to fill the shoes of most of those missing from the ranks.

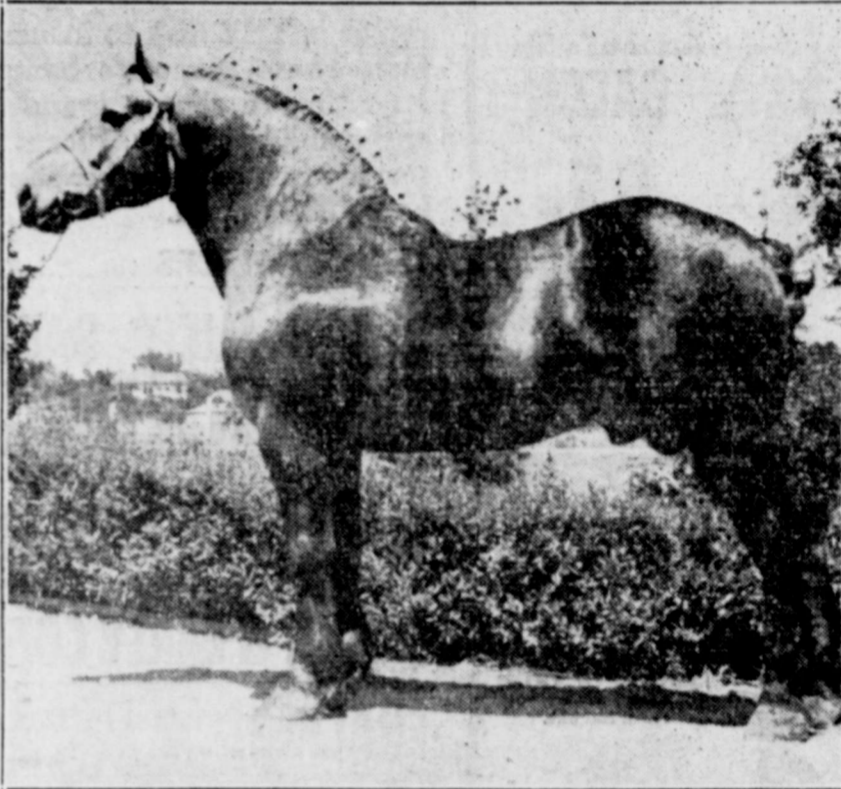
Coryell County should be able to produce at least six crack baseball teams and we solicit the support and cooperation of all to make the 1940 league a great success.

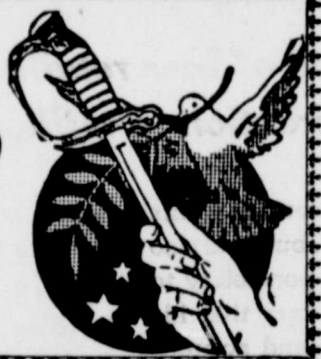

Western civilization suffered another setback with the capitulation of Finland to Russia' territorial demands. Democracy has again retreated before the advance of totalitarianism. The ideology of brute force has taken another forward step.

The war of the Allies against Germany is essentially the fight of Western civilization against an alien concept of life. And the defeat of Finland was defeat for the Allies, who were unable to save

a country that was fighting for the selfsame principles which inspired the Anglo-French war against German National Socialism.

For the Allies, the military consequences and the political repercussions of the Finnish debacle may be far more disastrous than the ideological defeat suffered by the Reich as a result of the "rapproachment" made with the Soviet Union last August.

With the war materials which will be available in Russia now

that hostilities on the Finnish front have ceased, Germany may launch a "blitzkrieg" that will tax to the utmost the defensive power of the Allies. Free of possible involvements in Scandinavia—an eventuality far from pleasing to the German high command—the Germans now can attack either through Belgium or Holland or in the Balkans.

An offensive by the Nazis in either direction would constitute a serious threat to the Allies. If the Nazis could overrun Holland or Belgium or both and establish sea and air bases on the North Sea, they would be in a position to cripple British shipping and to launch devastating attacks against British industrial centers.

Extension of the war zone to the Balkans might insure for Germany needed sources of metals, wheat, food and oil, thus circumventing the effective Allied sea blockade.

After the recent examples of Poland and Finland, Belgium and Holland have little reason to count upon Allied promises of aid,

although the geographical barriers which prevented help for Poland and Finland do not exist in the case of Belgium and Holland. Yet it is possible that Belgium and Holland will choose to capitulate if threatened by Hitler, rather than rely upon doubtful Allied assistance for their protection.

The Scandinavian states, for example, may consider it advisable to swing into the Russo-German orbit in order to preserve a semblance of their territorial sovereignty. Rumania and Turkey are allied with France and Great Britain by treaties of mutual assistance, but they may now reconsider their strategic positions in view of increased strength which the Russians and the Germans will be able to mobilize in the Near East and the Balkans.

Consecutive continental losses by the Allies have strengthened Germany's economic and political strength to the extent that some experts doubt that the sea blockade can ever reduce Germany to

starvation.

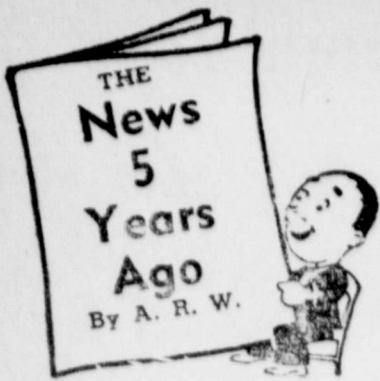
Losses on the continent were to be expected in the initial stages of the war, as this conflict represents a test of strength between an island empire and a land empire and the land power always wins the initial victories.

But the failure of the Allies to dispatch effective aid to Poland or Finland, or to save Austria, Czechoslovakia or Albania in the pre-war period has lost for them some of their key allies and valuable strategic positions.

If Hitler succeeds in continuing the stalemate in the west and subjugating all of central and perhaps southeastern Europe, he will be firmly entrenched economically and military and virtually unconquerable.

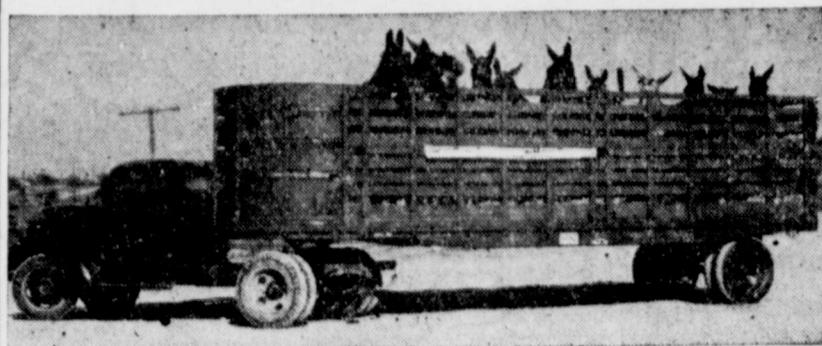
