For families who live on a farm, the census-taker will fill out, in addition to population and housing, a farm schedule about acreage and planted, crops grown, and livestock raised. It is important for farmers to know as exact figures as possible on the amount and value of their acreage and crops, since the total of all enumerators' reports will give the only available picture of farming as it is in the United States today.

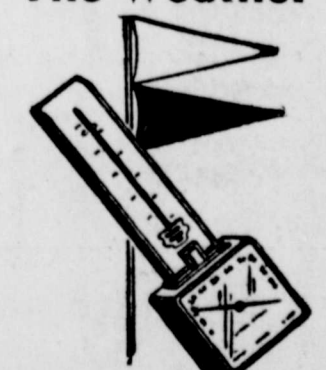

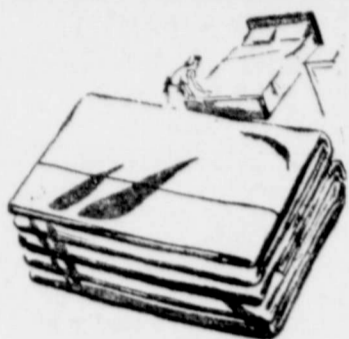

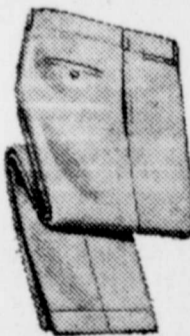

Mrs. Comer is a Seminary graduate and her years of experience in many varied places and fields mark her as 1 of the leading religious workers in Texas.

The congregation of the First Baptist Church considers themselves unusually fortunate in having secured her services.

She will move to Gatesville next week to take up her duties in the church here.

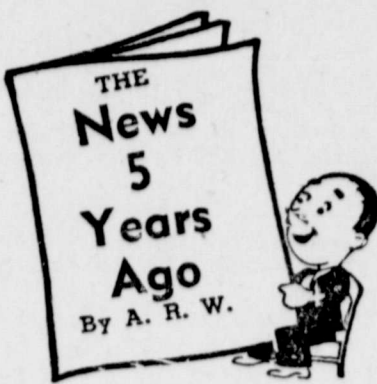

The House has this week taken up the consideration of the Labor and Social Security Appropriation Bill, and has been debating its provisions, but includes the appropriation not only for the Department of Labor but also for the Social Security Agency, and the various other retirement and compensation boards. It also includes the Public Health Service, The National Youth Administration and the CCC. As reported by the committee this bill provides for a cut of \$15,000,000 in NYA and \$64,955,000 for the CCC. The bill does not affect the payments for old age assistance or unemployment insurance. There are many other reductions proposed by the bill, chiefly administrative, of which I approve, but I believe that the NYA and the CCC are two of the very best of the government relief agencies, and I hope that we will be able to continue the fine work of these agencies are doing without a cut in their support.

Early this week the Senate passed the second Hatch Bill, which is intended to keep all State employees who are paid in whole or in part from Federal funds from taking any active part in political campaigns. Today, the Senate has just passed the Agricultural Appropriation Bill, and has added more than \$300,000,000 to the amount carried in the bill as it passed the House. Their increase includes \$212,000,000 for parity payments, and \$85,000,000 for the disposition of surplus agricultural commodities (this sum will be expended chiefly for the "food stamp" plan). The Senate also restored the cuts in the appropriations for soil conservation and for the continuation of the tenant home ownership program. I am happy to see these items put into the bill as I believe that they are vital to our people. I hope that we will be able to get the House to agree to the amendments that the Senate has made, but I recognize that there will be a hard fight. Each year it is getting harder to get adequate appropriations for agriculture. This is due to the fact that more and more of our people are living in cities and they just don't realize the importance of maintaining a prosperous agriculture in our nation.

The House committee on Flood Control is holding daily hearings on the flood control problem of the nation. I am a member of this committee. Each day we take up the problem of a given section of the country. On next Tuesday we shall consider projects in Texas including the Brazos District, and I am very hopeful that we may be able to get a favorable consideration. Unfortunately, for us, the Army Engineers have reported only on the Whitney Dam. This great dam is of vital importance to Central Texas. It will afford much (not complete) protection to the City of Waco and the Brazos Valley all the way down through Falls and Milam Counties. It will not give any protection on the Little River. This protection is desperately needed and I had hoped up to the last minute that we might get a favorable report from the Army Engineers on the surveys that are still going on on the Leon and the Lampasas Rivers.

Back in 1936 Congress passed a very comprehensive flood control bill authorizing hundreds of projects all over the United States. This bill included many projects that had never been surveyed and provided that the authorized projects should be surveyed and approved by the Army Engineers before any work should be commenced. This bill was intended to provide a great list of projects on which people might be quickly employed, but the policy was adopted of prohibiting Congress from

thereafter considering any flood control project for consideration until after it has been approved by the Army Engineers. The Brazos Project was not included by Congress in the general bill of 1936, nor was any survey of the River and its tributaries ordered until after I came to Congress in 1937. Early in 1937 Congress passed resolutions asking the Engineers to survey the Brazos and all its tributaries. The Engineers estimated that it would take five or six years to make this survey, but we were able to get a partial report last May. This report covered only the largest of the dams that the Army had under consideration. No report has yet been made by the Army on the Leon or the Lampasas. I hope that these reports may be had in the near future, but it must be remembered that no action was taken to secure such a survey until three years ago, and it often takes many years to get one of these great projects actually built. For instance, many people overlook the fact that work was actually commenced on Buchanan Dam by a private corporation more than ten years ago, and that the great Red River Project, in which the Majority Leader, Mr. Rayborn, is so vitally interested, has been under consideration for a number of years.

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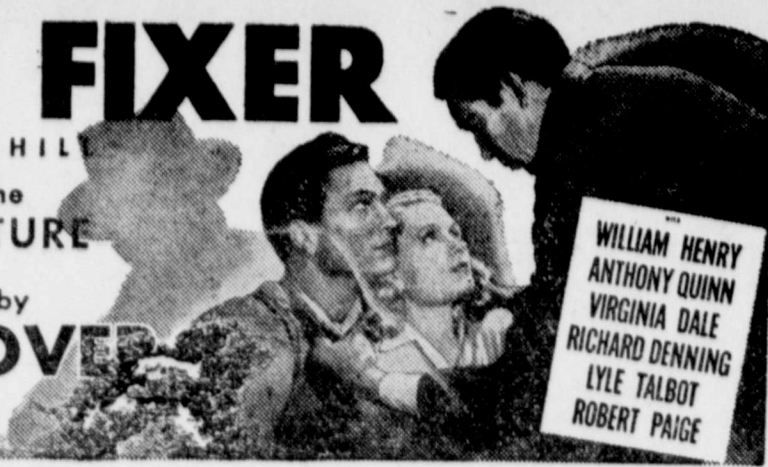

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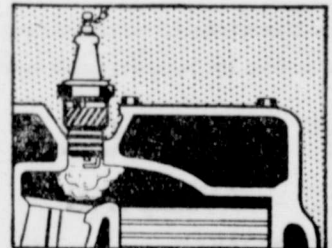

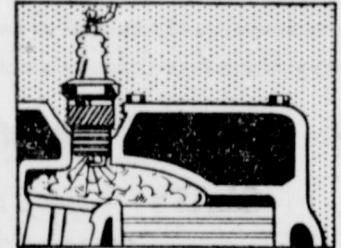
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
