However, neither Congress nor the President is overlooking purely military preparations. On Tuesday the House passed two very important bills. One to expedite naval shipbuilding, and the other to expand the naval air force. I, of course, supported both of these bills. The one relating to shipuilding involved the removal of some of the existing red-tape and minute control that at present slows down naval construction. Personally, I feel that we made a step in the right direction, but I feel that we are going to have to give the industry still further relief from governmental regulations if we are to keep pace with the aggressor nations. We understand here that Japan is building battleships in just about one-half the time it takes the United States. We are trying to cut the red-tape.

I think it is interesting to know that on tomorrow (June 1st) the United States will launch our first new battleship in 19 years. The S. S. Washington will go down the ways at Philadelphia tomorrow, and two weeks later her sister ship the North Carolina will follow at New York. Nor are we over looking the fact that while the British retreat from Flanders has shown that battleships are still a vital force, the German advance has at the same time proven that to be safe much less effective these ships must be supported by a powerful force of modern aircraft. We are, therefore, expanding the naval air force, just as we voted to expand the army air force the preceeding

On yesterday we considered what was termed the War Department Civil Functions Appropriation Bill.
