## COUNTY BOARD MEET CALLED FOR MONDAY AT 10:00 A. M.

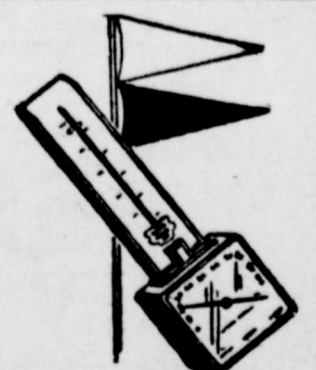

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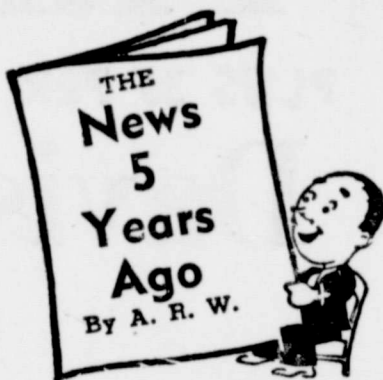

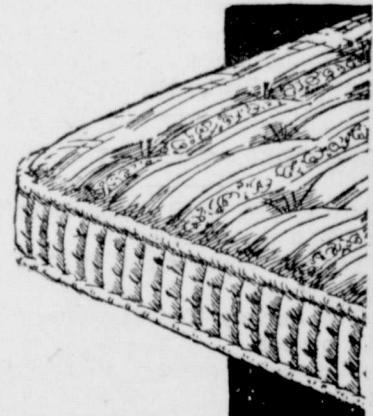

So, the total cost of oil and gasoline for the 3820 miles was \$43.09, if our figures are correct. The average, with the V-8 60 was slightly better than 21 miles to the gallon, which, with the 3 year old, is not half bad.

As for hotels, tourist camps, etc., the price for four ranged from \$2.75 to one \$8.00 stay, where we misunderstood. The New York hotel was \$7.50 per day for the

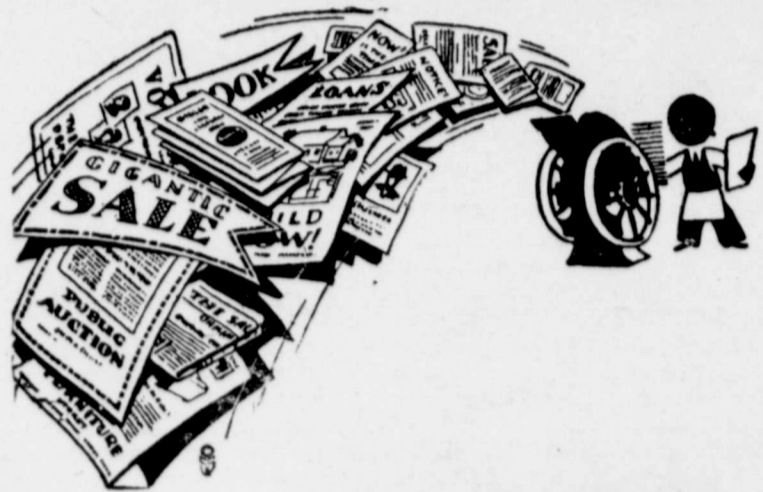
four of us, and car storage was \$1 a day.

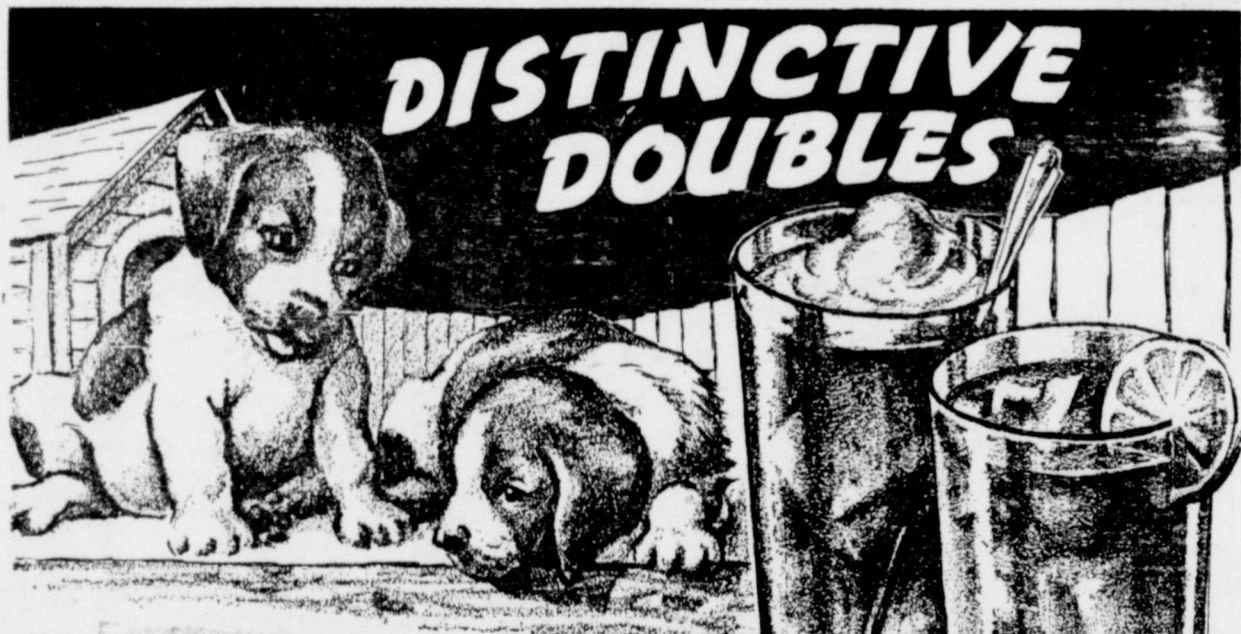
