Comparing it to vitamin A, so important in preventing infections which is found in eggs, and is decidedly oil soluable, it is evident that frying is not the best method of cooking eggs. These and many other important facts were made so clear that any ordinary layman could understand and apply them. We wonder how any community can dare attempt to rear its children without the help of an H-D agent. Realizing her importance, our state has made her service free to all who are progressive enough to take advantage of it. 




