Rhodes, charged with burglary and theft of wool, plead guilty and was given 90 days in jail, and so was J. M. Arnold given the same sentence on the same charge.

Frank Hughes, charged with swindling over \$50. Case dismissed on recommendation of District Attorney Bill Allen.

J. M. Wright, plead not guilty to a charge of failure to stop and render aid after collision, and was given 6 months in jail.

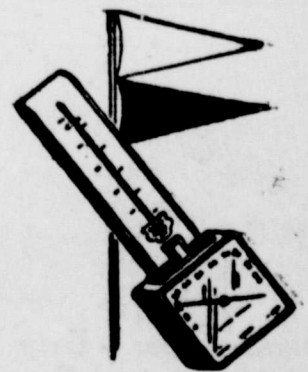

FURTHER HISTORICAL FACTS PERTAINING TO THE LIFE OF JAMES CORYELL

The following information of the heirs of James Coryell, for whom Coryell County is named, was copied from the county records of Coryell County.

Know all men by these presents, that I, James L. Coryell, of the state of Ohio and held and firmly bound unto W. C. Gayle, of the county of Montgomery and State of Texas in the sum of five thousand and five hundred and thirty-five dollars for the payment of which sum will and truly be made I bind myself, my heirs and executors, and administrators, and every one of them by these presents. Witness my hand and scrawl, by way of seal, the 25th day of December A. D. 1854.

The condition of the obligation is such that whereas the above bounden James L. Coryell has this day bargained and sold to W. C. Gayle all the piece, or parcel of land lying between situated on Coryell Creek and its junction with the Leon (River) and known as the Coryell Survey containing eleven hundred and seven acres for the consideration of two thousand and seven hundred and sixty-seven dollars and fifty cents for which the said W. C. Gayle has three promissory notes bearing even date herewith and made due payable on or before the first day of April 1855. One for the same amount due and payable April 1st. 1856. And one for the same amount due and payable April 1st 1857.

If the first payment should not be paid on the date specified, said W. C. Gayle shall pay interest at the rate of ten per cent per annum on said payment up to the first of July following, and if said interest is not then paid, with the interest accrued thereon the said Gayle shall forfeit to said Coryell the sum of fifty dollars which the said W. C. Gayle acknowledges to

be due said Coryell in case said second failure should occur, then this obligation to be null and void, but if said W. C. Gayle shall pay or cause to be paid, unto said Coryell or his legal representative the above described promissory notes according to the above specifications then said Coryell shall make, or cause to be made, unto said W. C. Gayle, a good and perfect deed of conveyance to said above described premises then this obligation to be null and void otherwise to remain in full force and virtue in law.

Know all men by these presents that we A. J. Coryell, Sarah A. Coryell, and Nancy Coryell, of the County of Adams and the State of Ohio, have nominated, appointed and constitute and do by these presents constitute and appoint James L. Coryell of county and state aforesaid, our true and lawful attorney for us and in our name to sell, lease, or otherwise dispose of all our interest, or share in and to certain lands in the state of Texas Viz one-fourth of a league in Milam district and 396 acres on Elm Creek in the County of McLennan, being the headright and augmentation of James Coryell late deceased, said one-fourth of league being described as follows. Situated in Milam District on Coryell Creek. Commencing on 7 oak mound S 19, W 1000 varas, from Cavetts' Creek 2180 varas to Sam Andrews 20 varas wide 250 varas to Cavett's corner thense N 71 W 500 varas to the Sam Andrews 800 varas to a prairie 2500 varas to a mound of rocks which is at the corner. Thense N 19 E 500 varas to a creek 1000 to another creek 2500 varas to an ash 5 inches in diameter which is at the corner. Thense S 19 W thense 1000 varas to the timber of the river 1200 varas to a creek 1300 varas to a prairie 2500 varas to the place of beginning.

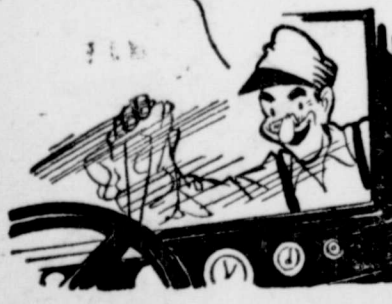

GENERAL MOTORS OFFICIALS SAY IT TAKES TIME TO GET WAR GOODS



Assurance that industry stood ready to cope with all problems of the moment and retained undiminished confidence in the future progress and bright future of the nation.

Discussing the nation's defense program, both Mr. Sloan and Mr. Kettring cautioned the American people not to expect the country's industrial plant to produce immediate miracles.

Mr. Kettring likened it to the time spent in "make ready" in publishing a newspaper, and added:

All we do in the automobile industry is to publish autos instead of books or newspapers.

"The trouble is that people do not understand, and you start to make a new engine or airplane or automobile and a fellow says; "I would like to change a curve in the top back here," and you start back where you started from.

"So if we are going to get mass production ideas in national defense, we have to decide what we want to make. Then let us 'make ready' which in this particular case is about nine months to a year, and then let us stay put".

Answering those who call for a halt technological development as a means of curing unemployment, Mr. Kettring declared:

"We are away behind on technological development in this country, not ahead at all. We are the only country in the world that ever had the peculiar kind of problem that we have today.

"We have excesses of men, money and materials. The only thing that means is that we haven't got any projects. We are one lap late, and everybody thinks we are ahead. In other words, we have got to broaden this industrial base of ours so that we supply new jobs, new projects, take up these excesses of men, money and materials.

The reason more is not being accomplished in this direction, Mr. Kettring said, is "because it is the most difficult thing in the world to get a new thing started".

"Today, that very simple thing, the aeroplane, only 36 years ago is one of the determining factors in this great political European situation.

He urged the newspapermen and all others, to stop gazing into the past at the "good old days" and stop backing into the future, because "that is the reason we get so many surprises. We should face the future and try to make the best out of it that we can because you are going to spend all the rest of your lives in the future."

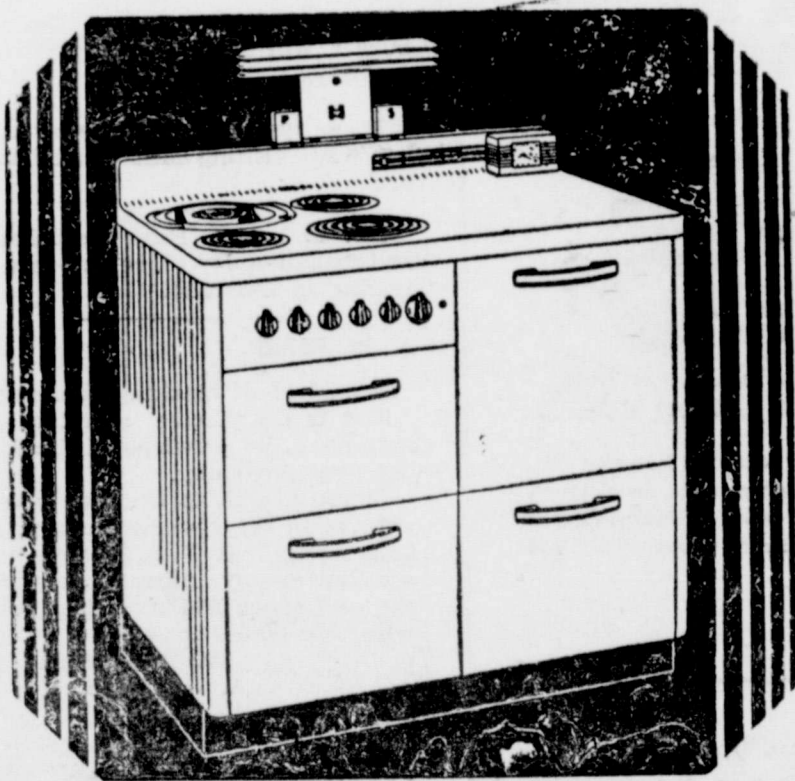

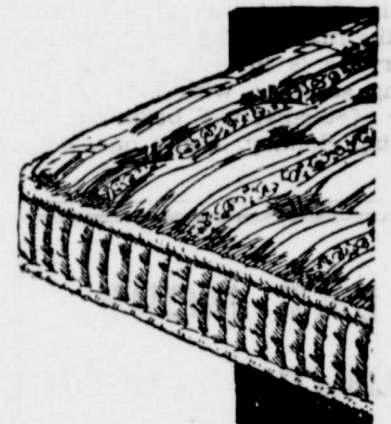

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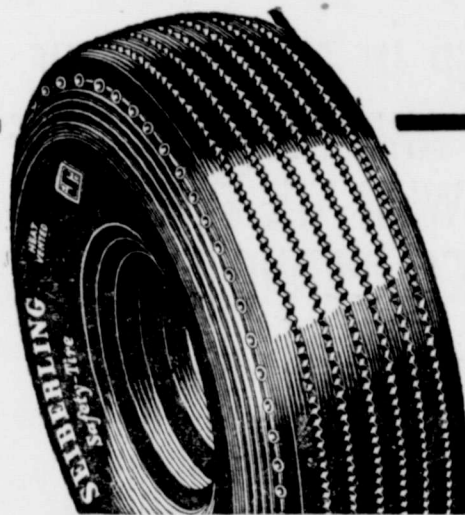
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
