## Supervisors Plan District Soil Work

At a meeting Tuesday in Gatesville, District Supervisor of this district of the State Soil Conservation Program, Shrunk, Hugnes and Jones of Hamilton and Lockhart and Chairman Blankenship of Coryell County, outlined work to be done by the different communities on the State Soil Conservation program. This work, will be outlined by the farmers themselves, with the supervisors only assisting, and the program will be made to as nearly as possible suit the communities.

The supervisors had the assistance of the various governmental agencies, farmers and others, and the plans will be written in "farmers" language, and not be of a technical nature that make it difficult to "savvy".

C. M. Caraway, member of the State Soil Conservation Board of Temple discussed the plan of developing these programs and expressed his appreciation of the way farmers of this section were working toward the soil conservation work.

## \$19,456.28 Is Here For 618 Farmers: Cotton Parity

Farmers of Coryell county will come into their own, or already have.

Already 618 checks of the 1940 cotton parity checks are in, and some are already "out". The amount is \$19,456.28.

## Central Texas Water-Sewer Men Here

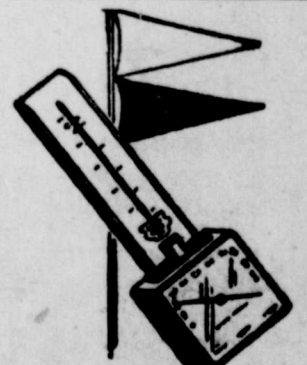



**CCC Loans on '40 Cotton Available To AAA Co-op's**

If you are a AAA co-operator, the Commodity Credit Corporation loans may be made on the 1940 cotton crop, according to a release from the USDA.

Loan rate will be based on 15-16 inch middling cotton, net weight basis, with differentials for grade staple and location. The rate for this cotton will vary from a high of 9.90 in the Carolina mill areas to 9.16 in West Texas and New Mexico.

**PUBLIC ATTITUDES**

Two diverse and highly contradictory attitudes are apparent among the American people in regard to our defense preparations. These attitudes are best exemplified by two recent occurrences that attracted nation-wide attention.

In the debate on the conscription law in the Senate, Senators Minton of Indiana and Holt of West Virginia during two days' proceedings engaged in personal recrimination which had no connection with the subject of compulsory military training.

As Senator Holt's father was a conscientious objector to American participation in World War I, Senator Minton branded his senatorial colleague with the unfortunate epithet of "slacker" and characterized the family of Senator Holt as a "slacker family."

Now, aside from the fact that Senator Holt should not be held responsible for the actions of his father, who as a minister undoubtedly acted according to the dictates of his conscience, Senator Holt's family record is not of any significance in preparing this nation for defense.

Yet, with Britain's defeat within a few days or a few weeks a definite possibility, two members of the United States Senate engaged in a personal, time-consuming debate upon irrelevant issues at a time when every discerning person realizes that haste is necessary to rectify many years of neglect of our defenses.

This incident is characteristic of one attitude which is peculiarly apparent among our lawmakers in Washington, but also is indicative of a widespread public attitude.

This attitude might appropriately be described as one of mental lethargy toward the dangers confronting this country, perhaps within a few weeks.

In this space it is not possible to discuss the possibility of a German attack upon this country if the British succumb to invasion or to an aerial blitzkrieg. But, if Britain is defeated, an attack in some form is as certain as the fact that the United States is woefully unprepared to repel any invader.

The immediacy of the problem of readying this country's defenses through such action as enactment of the compulsory military training bill is apparent to a majority of the American people. But a most vocal and often vitriolic minority is sabotaging defense preparations solely and simply because this is an election year and politicians are therefore unusually sensitive even to minority sentiments.

The reaction aroused by the address of Colonel Lindbergh demonstrated the other attitude which pervades great numbers of our people--an attitude which is

equally dangerous to our unity and to our defense preparations.

Colonel Lindbergh was charged literally with every crime from "treason" to "pro-Germanism" after his address on American foreign policy, and a movement was launched in Congress to "investigate" the noted aviator.

This writer believes that Colonel Lindbergh is 100 per cent wrong in his opinions on foreign affairs, but he does not believe that the Colonel or any other American should be charged with lack of patriotism because he shares convictions contrary to that of a majority of the people.

The fact that Colonel Lindbergh had the courage to speak when he realized that his opinion was not shared by most Americans is most commendable. But simply because most of us feel that he is mistaken in his conceptions of America's future policy toward Germany does not accord us free reign to halting his patriotism, according to any conceptions of fairness or of democratic practice.

There is absolutely no basis for charging or even for assuming that Colonel Lindbergh would commit any act detrimental to the welfare of the United States. Therefore, the charges made against him can only be attributed to an hysterical attitude among many people--an attitude that is extremely dangerous to the unity of the country at a time when unity of is of the utmost importance.

Tolerance, understanding and sympathy for the other fellow's viewpoint are essential if America is to pursue a sane and sensible defense policy during the coming months.

The surest road to the destruction of America and of the blessings that all of us enjoy as Americans is to engage in internal disputes over irrelevant and inconsequential subject, and to brand every man with an opinion different from our own as a traitor to the cause of American liberty.

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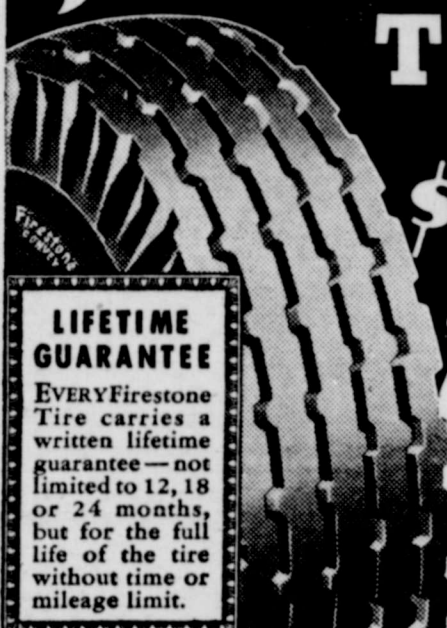
