

The 1940 cotton estimate as forecast by the United States Department of Agriculture is 12,772 bales as compared with the predicition of 11,429,000 a month ago, was released Monday.

This estimate is based on conditions prevailing September first.

The area of cotton for harvest this year was placed at 24,406,000 acres, compared with 23,928,000 last year and the 10 year average of 31,235,000 acres.

A yield of 250.7 pounds of lint cotton the acre is indicated from the September 1 condition, the department reported, compared with 222.3 pounds indication a month ago, 237.9 pounds produced last year, and 198.1 pounds, the ten year average.

Federal Housing Administration in Dallas was in Gatesville Thursday and Friday. On Thursday evening at the City Hall he met about 80 interested citizens and prospective home owners and explained in detail the various steps necessary to become a home owner under the FHA plan.

This project is sponsored by the Federal Government and has as its object to enable low income families to become home owners. People who have an income of \$75.00 per month or more and who have a good credit rating can borrow up to 90 per cent of the cost of a new home. Owning a satisfactory lot can serve as the other 10

### **Paper Prices Advonce**


