OPM GIVES DOPE ON **OTHER RATIONING** YOU MAY NOT KNOW

From the Dallas office of the OPM we get the following:

"Other recent actions affecting the home front include orders to telephone companies to discontinue conversions of manual offices to dial offices and to refrain from replacing any more wall or desk phones by hand sets; laundries must get along with only 10 per cent of the chlorine they've been using; glass containers makers must turn out bigger and simpler jars so that the curtailment of tin cans won't be felt so drastically and orders placing bedding equipment under temporary price control, setting a permanent maximum price schedule covering wholesale sales of domestic wool rugs and carpets.

Guns "frozen"; new pistols, rifles and shotguns have been added to the list of consumers' durable goods frozen. Dealers are prohibited from selling or delivering only to agencies or officers of federal, state and local governments.

230,000 ACRES OF PUBLIC SCHOOL LANDS ARE OFFERED

Bascom Giles, Commissioner of the General Land Office, states that the Public Free School Fund which now amounts to approximately seventy-three million dollars, will be considerably increased by the selling of a large part of the 230,000 acres of land that is now being offered for sale.

Commissioner Giles further points out that these lands are sold on one-fifth down payment, together with a note on the remaining four-fifths of the principal bearing 5 per cent interest on forty years time, the payments on the principal being deposited to the Permanent School Fund; whereas the interest payments are payable to the Available School Fund for immediate use. The State retains one-sisxteenth free royalty in all oil or gas that may be found on these lands.

Commissioner Giles also states that these lands offered for sale are of varying types and are located in 120 different counties of the State. A purchaser of said land is


