GOOD TIME TO SPRAY FRUITS. AND HERE'S HOW FROM C. A.

Spraying fruit trees? Now's the time, according to County Agent Guy Powell.

And here's how. Spray No. 2 (When most of blossoms have shed). To control curculio (worms) in peaches and plums, mix 2 lbs. zinc sulphate, 4 lbs. hydrated lime, 1 lb. arsenate of lead to 50 gals. water. Caution. Where the annual rainfall is less than 30 inches, do not use zinc sulphate in the spray mixture. Important. Mix this spray in the following order. Dissolve the zinc in spray tank, add the lime as a thin creamy paste to a nearly full tank before adding the lead arsenate.

No. 3. Spray with 3 lbs. wettable sulphur to 50 gals. water. This spray is to protect early fruit against brown rot and scab.

CAMP HOOD TO GET BETTER TRAIN SERVICE GRANTED BY OD

Post of Tyler. This will insure two trains daily each day between Camp Hood and Mount Pleasant, providing through service to Memphis and St. Louis.

FSA is accepting orders for workers from farm operators who cannot obtain locally sufficient labor to fill their needs. Farmers needing these workers will only pay \$100 fee to the government and the government will transport, train and subsidize the workers until placed on the job.

BRITS HURL AXIS BACK

N. Africa, March 7 (AP). — Marshal Erwin Rommel's first two thrusts against Sir B. L. Montgomery's 8th Army bounced off the British defenses in southern Tunisia in a welter of blood and twisted tank wreckage, but the Germans continued to press the attack thruout Saturday and Sunday, and there are no indications that the battle has ended.

MEN OVER 38 COUNTED "IN"

Washington, Mar. 7 (AP). — Men over 38 lost their special draft classification Sunday.

Selective service ordered local boards to put no more 38 to 45 year old men in class 4-H and to transfer men now in that classification into the regular classes (such as 1-A, 3-A, 4-F, etc.) but not actually draft them. Now, I'll get my third Classification Card. Got 2 now.

NAZIS SINK 5 SHIPS

(By Associated Press) Five cargo vessels were announced last week as sunk in the Western Atlantic by Axis subs, the

highest weekly toll in those waters for more than a month. The total is now 621.

REDS GET 50 MORE TOWNS

Moscow, Mar. 7 (AP). — Adolf Hitler's shivering troops retreated at an accelerated pace Sunday down the cold road to Smolensk from the ruins of Gzhatsk as the Russians announced the capture of more than 50 settlements on the approaches to the great base of Vyazma. US PLANES HIT 5 JAP BASES

Washington, Mar. 7 (UP). — American warplanes blasted Jap positions at five Solomon Island bases Friday and Saturday and the enemy retaliated with a single raid on Tulagi Island in which 2 men were killed, the Navy announced Sunday.

MME CHIANG NEAR COLLAPSE

Wellesley, Mass., Mar. 7 (AP). — Overcome by the emotion of her

return after 25 years to her alma mater, Mme. Chiang Kai-Shek nearly collapsed as she began a speech to the Wellesley student body Sunday.

NAZIS HIT COAST TOWNS

London, Mar. 7 (AP). — Fifteen or more German Focke-Wulf 190s bombed and machine gunned S. E. coast town Sunday, scoring hits on a large hotel, a bank and a store and causing casualties.

CHINKS PUSH JAPS BACK

Chungking, Mar. 7, (AP). — After being subjected to furious Chinese counterattacks, Jap troops on the west bank of the Salween River have started a general retreat, the central news agency reported from Tali Sunday.

LEND LEASE ACT UP

Washington, Mar. 7, (AP). — The lend lease act will reach the house floor tomorrow with all factions agreed on the necessity for the continuance but with prospects of controversy over attempts to write some postwar foreign policies into the law.



4. To clean broiler grill, let cool before washing with soapsuds; use fine steel wool. (Remove grill and pan from the range, as soon as food is taken off.) Whenever possible, use only a moderate heat for broiling, and you will find the broiler easier to clean. (Many foods broil well with a moderate heat.)
5. The oven-lining will last longer, if you roast meats at low temperatures (250° to 325°). It makes better-tasting meat besides, and also cuts down grease-spatter on oven-walk.
6. To clean up spill-overs on oven-floor, let cool, and then use a fine steel wool.
7. Don't load the oven-door with heavy roasts, as you put them in or take them out. It might warp the door.



FLYING A KITE, THEN FLY IT WHERE THERE ARE NO "HOT" WIRES

A soaring kite dives into a power line. A small boy climbs a pole to untangle it. Suddenly there is a flash and a limp little body hurries to the ground.

Dozens of times each year this tragedy is enacted in communities throughout the land. Dozens of little children annually lose their lives or suffer painful injuries in accidents involving kites and wires, either through lack of knowledge of the hazards involved or because of a youthful disregard of danger.

It is to prevent occurrences of this kind from happening here that the local power company annually publishes warnings in the newspapers and schools. This year the company again asks the cooperation of parents in calling the following safety rules to the attention of their children:

1. Don't use fine wire or metallic string.
2. Don't use wet string or fly kites in damp weather.
3. Don't use metal kite sticks.
4. Don't climb poles to get kites caught in wires.
5. Don't poke sticks at tangled kites or attempt to pull them down by their tails.
6. Always fly kites in open fields, clear away from power lines and busy highways.

"Both fine wire and the tinsel string sold for gift wrapping are conductors and so is string that is wet," cautions C. H. Wallace, power company manager. "When any of these falls across a power line, it may result in a fatal shock to the kite flyer, and may also cause a short circuit that will interrupt power service. Children should use only dry cotton string in flying their kites and they should avoid the use of metal or wire in making them. If a kite becomes tangled in electric lines, it is best to call the light company office and let one of our men take it down. In climbing a pole to get a kite a child may come in contact with a live wire or in attempting to pull it down by its tail or poke it loose with a stick, he may cause

If you are silly, he longs for a bright mate, and if you are brilliant, he longs for a playmate.




