This letter leaves me just fine. Hope you are the same. I'm out here in the land that God forgot, Guadalcanal, Solomons Islands. You can find it easy on the map. I'm driving a large gasoline truck, filling airplanes. So you don't need to worry about me. I'll be okay. There is nothing here much but coconuts, limes, lemons, pineapples, bananas, etc. All kinds of animals from horses to monkeys. A lot of Japs but not as many as there were, and a bunch of rugged Marines. This place is very hot, and work is very hard, and truck driving on the place is no exception. I'm still in the Air Corps ground crew and like my job fine. We have been at New Caledonia-you can find that on week. the map too. I wrote you there and also got your letter of Dec. 4th there. We've been everywhere since we left the states. I can tell you lots of things whn I get back. We usually stay out here 5 or 6 months then come home on a 30 to 40 day leave. I'm looking forward to coming home but am doing okay. So don't worry if you don't hear from me often because


