Somewhere in England.

Dear Mom:
It is eleven o'clock and not quite dark yet. The sun doesn't set until ten-fifteen P. M. When it sets in a fog it is red and round as a ball. It doesn't hurt your eyes to look at it. I think the Country is prettier than ours and is not as far into Spring as we were there, altho it is pretty and green.

All their fences are rock. Their fields are about five acres each which is planted in sudan. All they have in the country is cows and sheep. Their hills are almost straight up. I am really going to like it.

The water wasn't so rough coming over here. Quite a few of the fellows got sick but I didn't. That is, except one day it was pretty rough and made me a little sick, but got over it. The food was terrible so I ate can goods which I brought. The food is good over here. The English cooked the food on the boat and it had no seasoning in it. They seem to be really good to us.

I got your V-Mail letter also six others. It sure made me feel good.

You tell Mattie Pearl to take it easy before she gets in. Even tho she is a nurse she may not get a furlough to come home, I didn't. Send me her address as soon as she gets settled.

District Judge:— We, the Grand Jury for the July 1943 term of the District Court submit the following report:

We have been in session five days and have examined 57 witnesses and have found 7 true bills of indictment, all of which are felonies.

We find the County to be in good condition generally with reference to law enforcement and observance in view of the unusual conditions which exist. Numerous violations have occurred as a result of the large transient population which has been in the county, but Coryell County has fared better than other places with similar conditions. 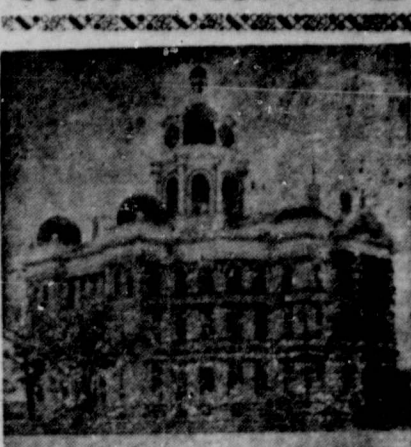

YANKS HALF ACROSS SICILY

N. Africa, July 18 (AP).—British 8th army troops, driving deep across the plain toward Catania, have seized vital positions protecting the great seaport after the heaviest fighting to date in Sicily reports relayed from an allied command post said tonight.

American troops, meanwhile were battling 22 miles inland in central Sicily, rolling up a conquest which already has given the allies one third of Sicily.

SOVIETS GAIN NEAR OREL

London, July 18 (AP).—Russian shock troops battering down powerful German defenses before Orel surged forward another 2 1/2 to 4 miles today, Moscow announced in a special bulletin, to complete week long gains of 26 to 50 miles.

500 PLANES WHAM NAPLES

N. Africa, July 18 (UP).—The greatest force of allied bombers ever to attack the Italian mainland blasted Naples with hundreds

of tons of bombs yesterday, smashing axis reinforcements bound for Sicily from that point.

CIO & AFL TO UNITE

Washington, July 18 (UP).—A new CIO political committee tonight embarked on a campaign to convert the "present anti-labor congress into a pro-labor win-the-war congress" by bringing the maximum possible influence to bear on legislators in their congressional districts.

SUBS STILL GET 'EM



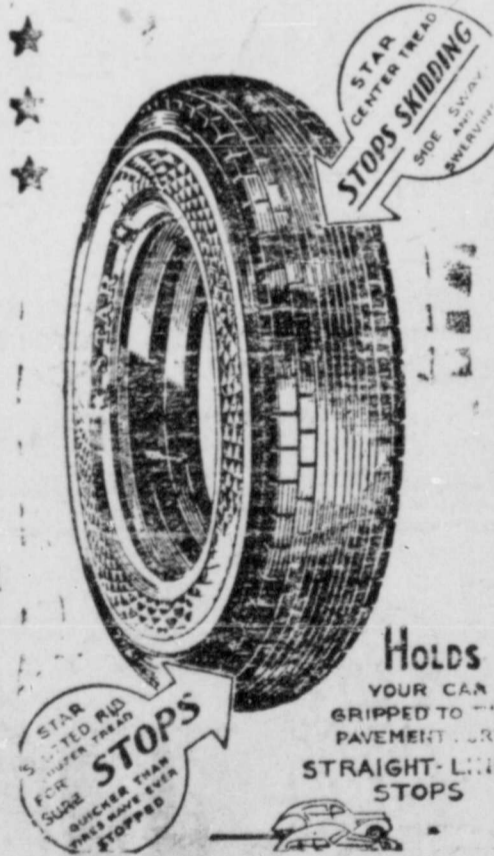
