Nazi Escapee Is Nabbed By Flat Residents

Friedrich Bonnenberger, 22, a German prisoner of war, who escaped from a work detail at North Camp Hood Saturday morning was captured near Flat about 4 p. m.

R. C. Surman of San Antonio, special agent in charge of the FBI said Bonnenberger was captured by R. W. Wells and Floy Whaley Cold Springs farmers.

Bonnenberger offered no resistance and was returned to N. Camp Hood internment center.

According to Sheriff Joe White, the prisoners were working in or near Pidcoke.

New USO Building To Be Built At Gatesville

Pans are now underway for the construction of a new USO building at Gatesville, according to word received at Camp Hood, from Harry J. Emigh, regional recreational representative of the Federal Security agency at San Antonio.

The project was recommended by Col. C. M. Thirkeld, camp commander at Camp Hood and to augment the present USO facilities here.

With the establishment of North Camp Hood, the number of soldiers has increased beyond initial plans, necessitating more recreation facilities.

The State of Texas vs L. Z. Gordley, burglary, 2 years, sentence starting May 15.

MUSSOLINI QUILTS, OR "IS QUIT"! KING & BADOGLIO TAKE OVER

LONDON, July 25 (AP).—Dictator Benito Mussolini resigned tonight as premier of Italy and King Victorio Emanuele, in a possible bid for peace with onrushing allied armies, assumed command of Italian forces for "a stand against those who have wounded the sacred soil of Italy."

Marshal Pietro Badoglio, former chief of staff and never an admirer of fascism, came out of retirement to succeed Mussolini as head of a military government accorded "full powers" by the king to do what is best for a war-shattered and weary country.

WHAM HAMBURJ!
 London, Monday, July 26 (AP). American bombers battered four places in Germany and struck a target in Belgium by daylight Sunday in the mightiest single day's onslaught of the war, following up a record breaking RAF 2300-ton raid on Hamburg Saturday night. Nineteen American heavy bombers were lost.

 Detroit, July 25 (AP).—V-P Wallace called upon all Americans

 Washington, July 25 (AP).—The design of new dikes to hold back the inflation flood occupied high administration officials today, with indications the President Roosevelt may go to the people soon with the blueprints. It's government made inflation and of course should be, government stopped.

SICILY NEARLY THRU
 N. Afrca, July 25 (AP).—The campaign in Sicily reached its last and decisive stage today as Gen. D. D. Eisenhower's headquarters announced the occupation of Trapani, last of the three major ports in the western part of the island, by the American 7th army.

THEM REDS STILL GO
 London, July 25 (AP).—The great Russian counteroffensive battering upon Orel from 3 directions engulfed 30 more popu-

lated laces and swept forward to 5 miles today. Moscow announced in a special communique and complete encirclement of the Nazi base appeared only a matter of time.

NEWS OF OUR MEN and WOMEN IN UNIFORM

Here's another letter we didn't get written by Sgt. Columbus D. Homan, whose parents Dr. and Mrs. David C. Homan live in Oglesby. It was published in The Houston Post, recently, with this Editor's Note: 'The communication below was written by Sgt. Columbus D. Homan in North Africa, perhaps now fighting in Sicily to his father and mother, Dr. and Mrs. D. C. Homan of Oglesby. It sounds a ringing challenge to American patriotism'. The letter is as follows:

Reading and hearing about strikes back home really burn the fellows up. They all say induct them into the army if they don't appreciate that their lot is better than ours... isn't enough money in the U. S. A. to pay off a man who gets a German flame blower in his face, or has a tank cut him in two. How can they expect us to do the job of dying like men for such ingrates at home? (Like the little old maid trying to mother a dead-end kid.) John E. Lewis, the bushy eye-browed goat, should be sent to

the European front where he would be too busy ducking 88's to worry about wages and hours. Though some don't know what the strikes are for, they can't be bad enough to go through with them now. The men back home even dare think of going out on strike when we are over here doing our job. The government should outlaw strikes for the duration. We could easily lose this war as a result of strikes.

Battles aren't fought with bare fist but with modern monsters of destruction. The British as well as the Americans have well learned this lesson from experience.

Where and how did we acquire this freedom of being able to strike? Abraham Lincoln advocated the freedom to strike. He died for personal liberty and freedom, as did so many of our forefathers. This and all personal liberties were acquired by self-sacrifice and the sword. How can the strikers walk out on their jobs when these very liberties are at stake. Under Nazi domination all personal

liberties have ceased. Ask the French, the Poles. The starving Greek is not allowed the privilege of eating his own garden produce. Don't deceive yourself that any lasting good can come from force.

The miner hasn't enough guts to stay with his job, let alone face a bullet. Typical of the afterthought of most men is the propaganda bait the strikes afford the Axis. German Lillie (an English speaking girl over German broadcast station) tells us each night that 'America's John L. Lewis and his crowd want to prolong the war and fill their jeans.' I'll bet its just the kind of news Mussolini and Hitler like to hear.

While the boys are over here sweating, bleeding and dying to protect America and (even the right to strike), those people back there have the gall to quit their jobs. There isn't a man who wouldn't gladly trade jobs with any of them. The people back home must back up the men here with guns.

FOR GOD SAKES, AMERICA. WAKE UP!

These are the combined and unbaised thoughts of 90 per cent of our fighting men and taken from many who brought their union cards into battle.

A message from the boys in the front lines to the American laborer I am fighting for you. I am fighting for America because I want America to remain free. I have seen the enemy, and I do not want them to tell you are me how to live or what to do.

If you and I work together, we will win eventually. Let's compare notes:

I get so tired I feel I can't take another step... but if I stop, I die. I get so thirsty my tongue swells... but, if I drink poisoned water I die. When I should be sleeping myself, I stand guard so my pals and I may live.

I get homesick for one of my mother's meals... but I eat food from a can and like it.

I remember the flower garden at home... but all I can smell is dead bodies.

I'd give anything for a short beer... but I keep on so I do not get a short bier instead.

I think of beautiful music... but all I hear is screaming shells that are trying to take my life.

I think of a hot bath... and I am glad my beard covers my dirty face.

My muscles ache, my feet hurt, I am exhausted... but I fight on for you and me... and for 129,999,999 other Americans.

Now you tell me what you are doing for me... when my life itself depends on you. And don't forget... my pals and I have no use for people who walk off the job, or who don't do their utmost while they are working.

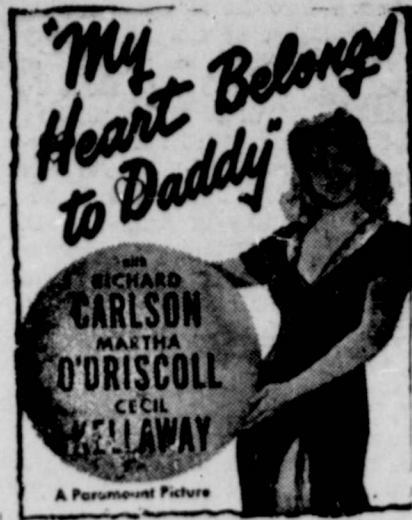
