



BEN H. RICE TO BE U. S. JUDGE

WASHINGTON, Sept. 10. (AP). President Truman today nominated Ben. H. Rice, Jr., to be U. S. Judge for the Western District, Texas, succeeding the late Walter A. Keeling.

Other nominations to the Senate were: Guy McNamara, as U. S. Marshal for West Texas, Re-appointment.

VIDKUN QUISLING GETS DEATH

OSLO, Sept. 10. (AP). Vidkun Quisling was condemned to death today for treason. A seven man judge, and jury panel convicted him for treachery in dealing with the Germans, who established him as a puppet premier during the Nazi occupation of Norway.

MACARTHUR K. O'S. IMPERIAL HEADQUARTERS

TOKYO, Sept. 10. (AP).—Gen. Douglas MacArthur struck Japanese militarism a death blow today by ordering the Japanese Imperial Headquarters abolished and simultaneously clamped press and radio censorship on the beaten empire.

He issued a directive that the headquarters must dissolve by September 13, and also proclaimed any act to disturb peace in Korea, or by any hostilities against occupation troops to be punishable by death or such other penalty as the occupation corps determines.

Employment First

People who work in the fields, in mills, mines and shops, on railroads and in industry generally, are to be congratulated upon President Arriving on the SS Stephen Truman's choice of Fred M. Vinson, the new Secretary of the Treasury of the United States. His undertaking is enormous, delicate and vital. But it is my belief that nobody else in government is quite as well qualified to handle the job as

The new cabinet member knows taxes. Things he has said already prove that he is keenly aware of two things that are currently the most important facts about taxes. (1) High taxes are necessary, now and for some time to come. (2) Wrongly devised taxes in the United States can wreck the financial structure of the entire world in a few months. Dark Ages might visit the earth again.

A Dependable Thing

The "yankee dollar" is one of few known quantities left in the financial world. While this condition lasts, there is a way for weak and depleted countries to gain industrial and then financial strength. The dollar will remain good so long as Uncle Sam keeps meeting his obligations promptly, fulfilling promises and paying the interest on his stupendous national debt.

Our debt is so big and America's moral obligations are so exacting that taxes must be high after the war, much higher than they have ever been in peaceful years before. Government has no way to get money except by taxing its citizens. Consequently the citizens have to be prosperous. There must be full employment, plenty of jobs at good wages-otherwise not enough taxes.

Holding our Ground The world is relying on the solncy of America, on the soundnes of the dollar, and it all depends on jobs. Mr. Vinson said: "Taxes should be levied in such a way that they have the least harmful effect on the expansion of business investment and the creation of jobs because productive employment is the source of . . . revenue which the government collects from taxes."

The Secretary's eye was not on taxes alone. In a recently published report he made it clear that productive employment is the foundation of America's living standard (highest in the world), the source of all income and the basis of prosperity for business and agriculture. We may be assured that Vinson will always do his best to prevent ruination of jobs by taxing business to a standstill.

A Rational Economy

Here is a powerful and rational sentence from Vinson's pen: "The sooner uncertainties in the post-war tax structure are removed, the sooner business management will be inclined to make firm commitments for expansion and the faster men can be put back to work following the wholesale cancellation of contracts that will occur with the unconditional surrender of Japan."

Persons who would like to see America in chaos, people who would like to see a dictator climb to power over America's wasted estates, may call the new Treasury head a friend of big business. He apparently is, to whatever extent such a friendship means jobs for workers, prosperity on the farm, customers in the store and food on the table for America's plain people.



Q. Will the proceeds of a Nat-Kunming, China; who helped lay ional Service Life Insurance policy down the parallel pipe line and that has been converted to a pertelephone line, and who fought maennt policy be paid to the bene-

> A. Under the law there is no provision for lump sum payments of any national Service Life Insurance policy.

Q. Will a veteran who had ninety days service but who served half of his time prior to September 16, 1940, be eligible for education under the G. I. Bill?

A. Pes if the veteran had ninety days or more fo service and any part of it was after September 16, 1940, he is eligible for this benefit. The length of time he may receive schooling depends on the period of service on or before Sept.

Q. Will the pension of a dependent parent cease by reason of remarriage?

A. The fact of remarriage does not operate to terminate such pension provided that dependency exists notwithstanding such remarriage. A new determination of dependency is required and if the remarried parent is found to be no longer dependent, payments will be discontinued.

Q. Must premiums on National Service Life Insurance policies contain a provision for the waiver of payment of premiums during a period of total disability which continues for six or more continous months, provided such disability commences subsequent to the date of application for insurance while insurance was in force under premium paying conditions and prior to the attainment of age 60 by the insured.

Q. Can a veteran making application know how much his pension will be when he applies?

A. No a rating board must determine from the evidence if a disability exists, if it is service incurred and to what extent it is disabling. Until such determinations have been made by the rating board no one can foretell whether a pension will be awarded or know how much it will be.

Q. If a veteran goes AWOL from a veterans Administration Hospital or leaves it against medical advice, will he be barred from readmission to the hospital?

A. He will be barred from readmission for a period of three months for the first infraction and six months for two or more infractions. However in case of medi-


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



May a veteran at school under the provisions of the G. I. Bill and at the same time secure a guaranty on a loan to buy a home?

A. There is nothing in the law to prevent a veteran from participation in the benefits of both of these provisions of the servicemen's Re-adjustment Act.

Q. May the widow of a Spanish-American or a World War I veteran receive pension if she has remarried and the second marriage had been dissolved by divorce or death?

A. The widow of a Spanish-American veteran who has remarried and has subsequently had the second marriage dissolved may receive a pension by making a new application. The widow of a World War I veteran may not receive a pension under such circumstances.

Q. Is there any time limit in which a dependent parent must make application for death compensation based on the death of a son in service during war time?

A. There is no limitation as to when application for this benefit shall be made. The only requirement is that the parent be dependnt as defined at the time of application.

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


