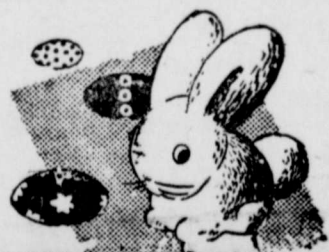

"STALIN WOULDN'T ACUSE NAZIS" SAYS RIB!

NUERNBERG, Germany, April 1 (AP)—Joachim Von Ribbentrop testified today before the International Military Tribunal that Prime Minister Stalin agreed in Moscow in August, 1939, he "would never accuse Germany of aggression because of her actions in Poland". The agreement was "if aggression was spoken of both parties would be guilty", Ribbentrop said.

KAI SHEK ASKS REDS FOR TROOP MOVEMENTS

CHUNGKING, China, April 1 (AP)—Generalissimo Chiang Kai Shek said today China has requested Russia to give previous notice of Soviet withdrawal from Manchuria points to permit Government troops entering to assure smooth transfer of garrison duties. Chiang blamed Communists for the Manchurian situation.

HIGH COURT GIVES "DEATH" TO UTILITY ACT

WASHINGTON, D. C. April 1, (AP)—The Supreme Court today upheld the constitutionality of the "death sentence" clause of the public utility holding company act, requiring interstate gas and electric holding companies to limit operations to a single integral system.

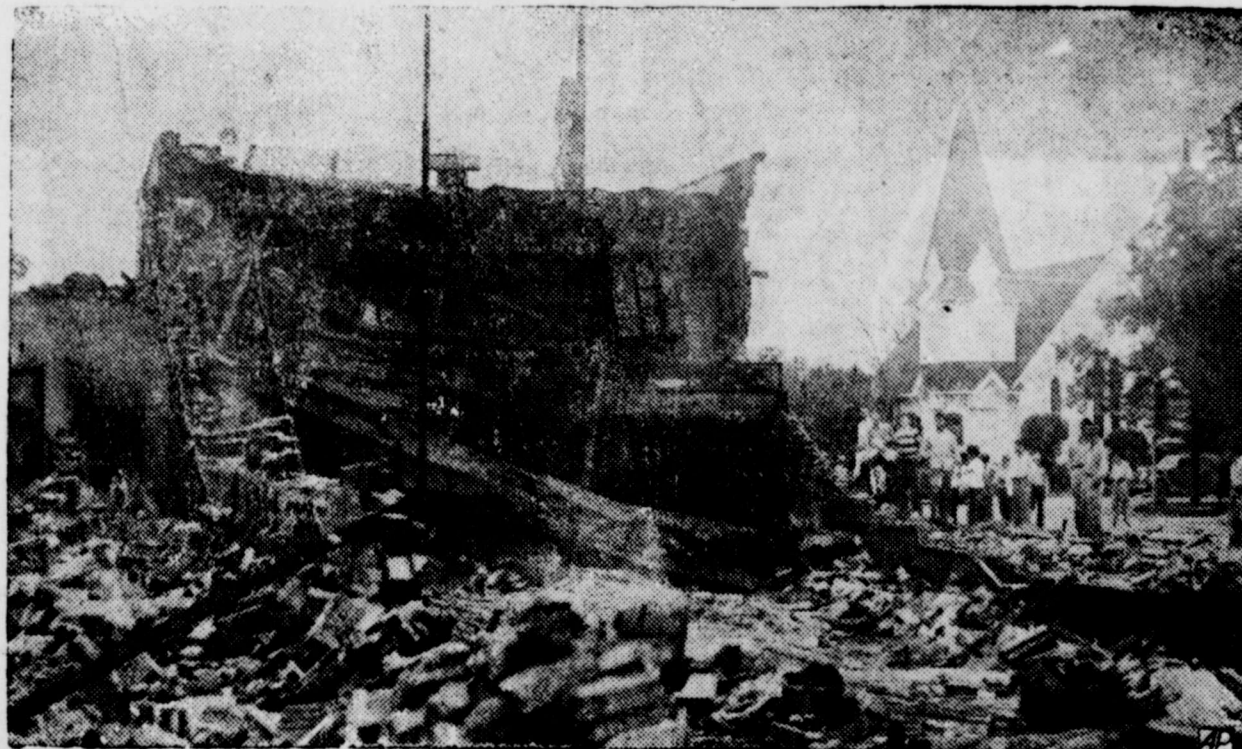

She was married to R. E. L. Smith on October 16, and to this union were born three children. Mrs. Smith was a member of the First Baptist Church, of which she became a member many years ago.

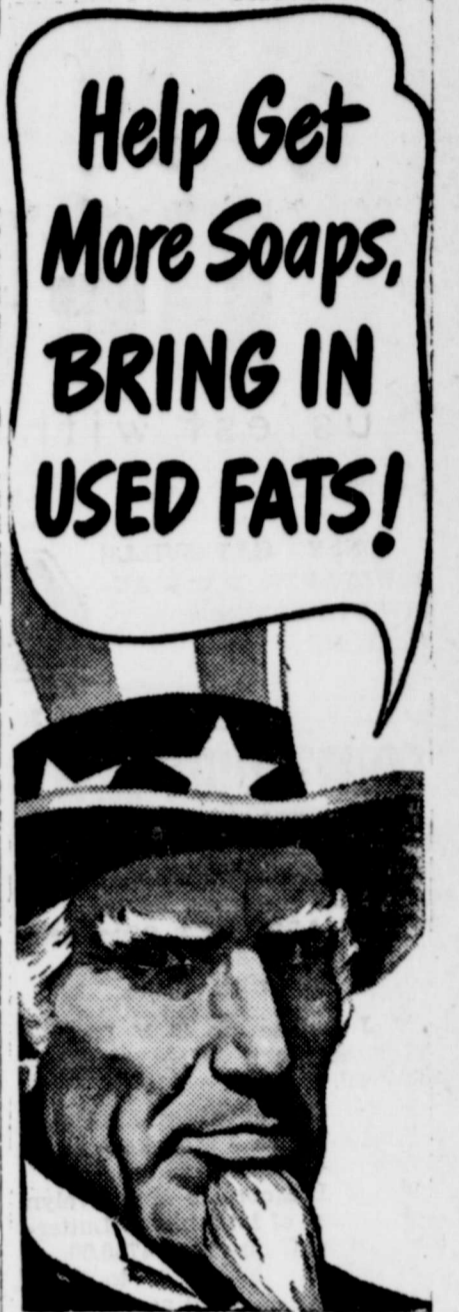

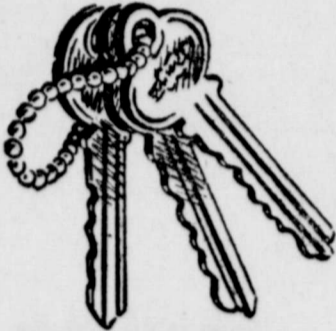

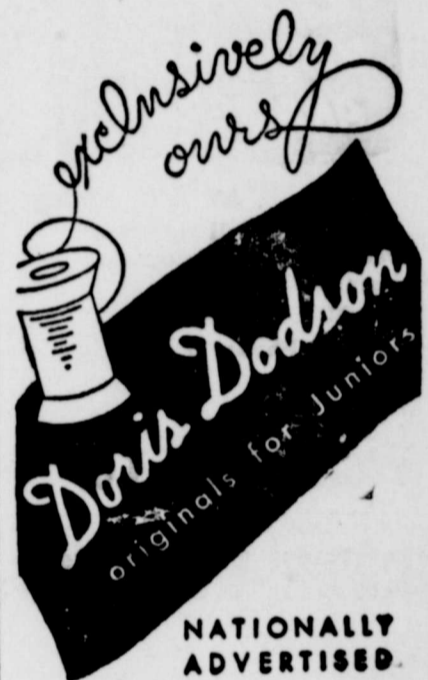

NEWS FARM AND

DDT SPRAYING SHOWN BY COUNTY AGENT THURSDAY 4TH

The County Agricultural Agent has arranged a spraying demonstration at Joe Hanna's ranch near Pidcoke for next Thursday, April 4, at ten o'clock.

This demonstration is for the control of horn flies and lice. The latest equipment in automatic spraying will be used, showing how 100 cows might be sprayed in thirty minutes.

Invitations have gone out to a group of interested livestock men in this vicinity. There will be signs on the Pidcoke road directing you to the headquarters of the Hanna Ranch.

This is the first of a series of demonstrations the county agent will sponsor during the year using DDT in the control of the horn fly. Be sure to see this demonstration.

USDA FARM CONTROL MET ON FOOD SITUATION SATURDAY

The U. S. D. A. War council of Coryell County met Friday, March 29. This council was called in session to carry out the plans of the national war food administration. The President of the United States and the Secretary of Agriculture are urging the people of this county, as well as all the other counties in the United States, to make a big sacrifice in the consumption

of food in order that the starving people of Europe and Asia might receive a part of what we have been wasting.

The Coryell County Council is recommending the following procedure on the part of the people of this county in the fulfillment of their part of the obligation.

(1) The economical buying and consumption of scarce commodities
(2) Everybody grow his own vegetables in order to have fresh vegetables and enough to can. Do as much canning as sugar rationing will permit.

(3) Produce as much meat, milk, eggs, pork as possible, preserving a portion of these products for use throughout the year.

(4) Conserve waste fats to be carried to your butcher at regular intervals.

(5) Cut down the consumption of wheat products by substituting fruits for pastries in the regular diet.

(6) Farmers are urged, before it is too late, to give some thought to the production of feed on their farms, such as grain sorghums, hay crops, and other crops that might reduce the amount of commercial feed to be bought later.

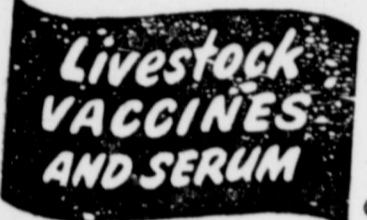

additional agency. In fact, I fear such a long time board which would be responsible to no one. I, therefore voted against the bill as did every Member of the Texas Dlegation who was present.

Yesterday we passed another bill from our committee which will give veterans a chance to buy at "earning capacity" prices the farm units still owned by Farm Security. I felt this was a proper consideration of our veterans. I therefore, voted for this bill. I also voted for a bill to bring the control of all fur-bearing animals under the department of agriculture. In the past, this control was divided between the Departments of Agriculture and Interior.

None of these measures are as important as the problem of fair farm prices. I was deeply disappointed when Secretary Anderson in his Kansas City speech appeared to repudiate his previous stand and announced that he considered the inclusion of farm labor costs in the parity formula as inflationary. Of course, it would raise farm prices to include farm labor costs in the parity formula at this time, but why should it not? It could only increase the price of farm products to the extent that the farmer's production costs have increased. Certainly it is impossible for the farmers to pay five dollars a day for an eight hour day and still produce his cotton, corn, or cattle as cheaply as when he only paid a dollar and a half from sun to sun, and certainly the farmer who does his own work is entitled to the same kind of increase for his own labor as the man who works in the automobile factory or the coal mine. He can only get such an increase by increasing the price of his products. I cannot, therefore, for the life of me see anything unfair about this proposal, which is what we generally know as the Pace Bill.

Too often, those who don't want to see the farmer get his fair share of the national income forget that right now in spite of high prices the average American is spending a smaller percent of his income for food than ever before in the history of the world. Let everyone who feels like complaining about the price of wheat remember that with much lower farm wages wheat brought almost fifty percent more in 1919 than it does today. Early this week the House passed a bill to take all farm lending agencies, like the land banks, Farm Security, Production Credit, etc., out of the Department of Agriculture, where they are now all located and place them under a

new and independent agency to be known as the "Farm Credit Agency". This new agency would be under an administrator and six deputy administrators. These officials would in turn be under a "super-duper" board of seven full time members who would hold office for 14 years and draw \$12,000 per year each. Not a single office would be abolished without creating more offices and officers to take its place. Personally, I cannot see that our Farm Credit system will be improved in the slightest by creating this new and

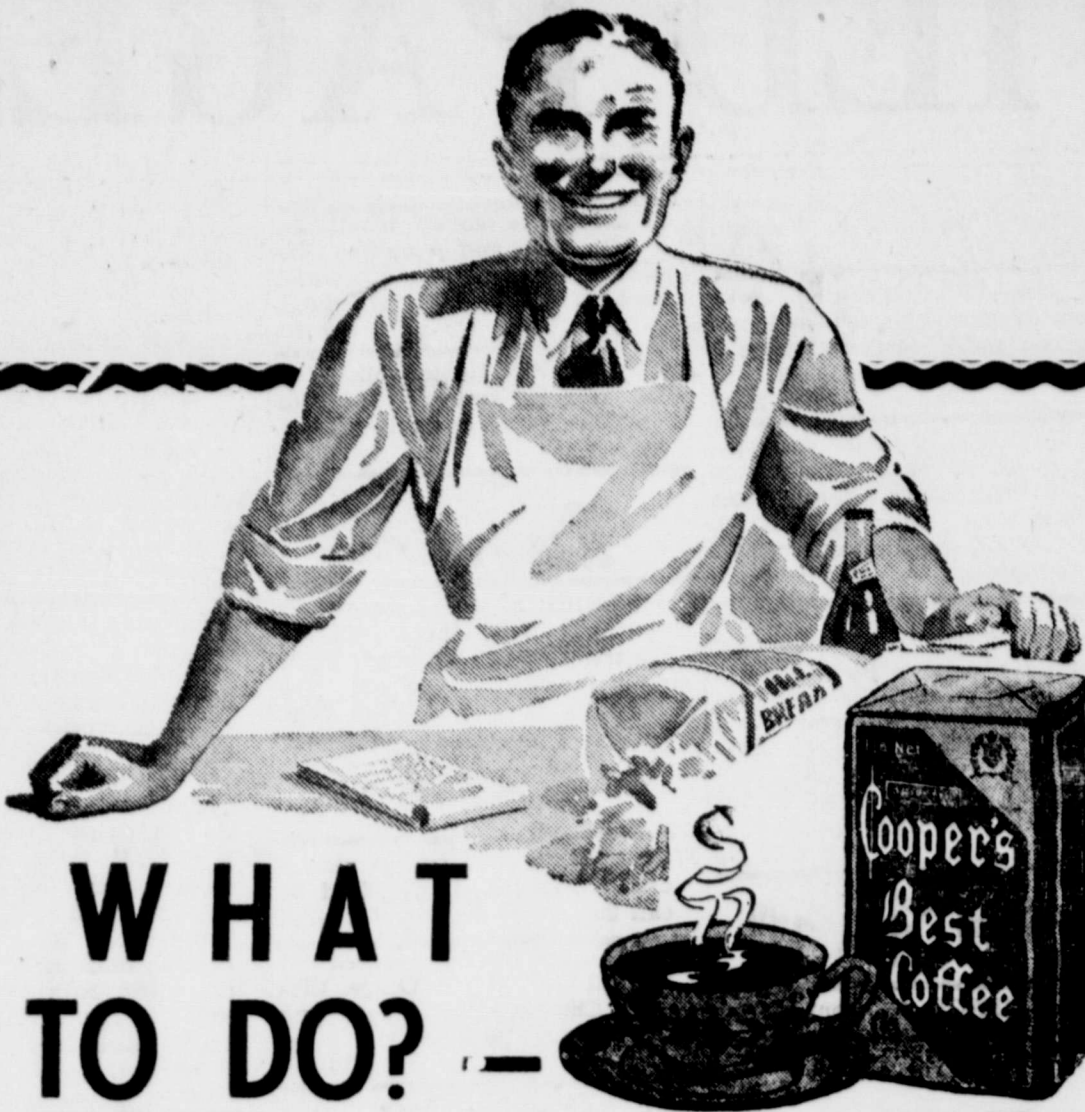
