Houston, Tex --Offers to estab lish 12 one-year fellowships in
the fields of science and engineer ing have been made by Humble Oil \& Refining Company to five leading universities in the Southwest and South and to Massachusetts Institute of Tech

Three fellowships
Three fellowships, one in geo ing, and one in chemistry, have been offered to the University of Texas; one in civil engineerin and one in mechanical engineer ng were extended to Texas A: M. Colege; one in physics and one in chemistry to the Rice In stitute; one in petroleum engin both the University of Oklahom and to Louisiana State Univer sity; and one in chemical engin ering to M. I. T.
Humble established these fellowships, the announcement said, because of its interest in the adancement of study in these fields and as a stimulus to stronger ment by outstanding students The Humble Company tudents. ith other industrial units, is keenly interested in the development of men and women who have shown marked ability and promise in the fields of science and technology.
The fellowships will pay the ooders the sum of $\$ 1,250$ per the fellowships in geology will provide an extra $\$ 500$ to co
field work in the summer. In extending the offers to several institutions the Humgle Company explained that the fellowships wou'd be established on a year to year basis, but that the
